

The Immigration and Naturalization Service had its beginnings on March 3, 1891, when Congress provided that there should be in the Treasury Department, under the control and supervision of the Secretary of the Treasury, a Superintendent of Immigration. In 1903, the Bureau of Immigration was established, and Immigration functions were transferred to the newly established Department of Commerce and Labor; in 1906, the Bureau of Immigration became the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization; in 1913, the consolidated Bureau was transferred to the new Department of Labor and divided into two bureaus known as the Bureau of Immigration and the Bureau of Naturalization; and in 1933, the Bureaus were consolidated as the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the Department of Labor.

On June 14, 1940, the Immigration and Naturalization Service was transferred from the Department of Labor to the Department of Justice after Congressional approval of a plan submitted by the President under a general reorganization act which had been passed in 1939. Under terms of the plan, the office of Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization and all powers and functions previously exercised by the Secretary of Labor relating to immigration and nationality were transferred to the jurisdiction of the Attorney General. Since June 14, 1940, the Service has functioned as a part of the Department of Justice under the direction of the Attorney General of the United States.



REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION

General

The Immigration and Naturalization Service administers and enforces Federal immigration and nationality laws. With limited manpower and resources, every effort has been made to effectively perform the broad range of duties which are necessary in fulfilling these responsibilities.

The mission of the Service includes the inspection of aliens to determine their admissibility into the United States; adjudication of requests for benefits under the law; prevention of illegal entry into the United States; investigation, apprehension, and removal of aliens in this country in violation of the law; and the examination of applicants wishing to become citizens through naturalization.

The activities of the various organizational units of the Service this year are summarized in subsequent pages of this report.

Office of the Deputy Commissioner

In conjunction with the realignment of the Service's responsibilities which took place in fiscal year 1975, four distinct units functioned directly under the Deputy Commissioner. The basic mission assigned to these units was to insure optimum efficiency and effectiveness in the accomplishment of the Service's mission.

PLANNING AND EVALUATION

Under the Associate Deputy Commissioner for Planning and Evaluation, there is a Director of Planning and a Director of Evaluation. The Office of Planning and Evaluation is responsible for the development, review, and evaluation of policies, programs, structures, missions, objectives, resource utilizations, systems, and the review of special manage-

ment problem areas to insure that the Service's use of resources and estimates of future requirements are consistent with the optimum accomplishment of the Service's mission.

The first year of research and development activities, fiscal year 1975, was principally spent in: (1) Defining problem areas meriting consideration for applied technology; and (2) determining and recommending technological alternatives for solutions. The most notable programs initiated and/or completed this year were: (1) The feasibility of developing a portable device for detecting the presence of persons entering illegally in vehicles (autos, moving vans, railroad cars, etc.); (2) the development of a high performance, easy-to-install vehicle detector; (3) the operational test and evaluation of portable radars for detecting and tracking the illegal entry of aliens and vehicles; and (4) the development of a computer simulation for evaluating linewatch operations. A process of technical information interchange was initiated with other Government agencies and broadened to include research and development centers in universities and industry. The purpose of this interchange is to inform the research and development community at large of INS interests.

Program planning is mainly involved in basic resource analysis and budget preparation. The Program Planning Staff was instrumental in the formation of the Domestic Council Committee on Illegal Aliens. The staff prepared a statement of intent and definition of issues for the Committee and served as the principal INS staff resource for the Committee. At the direction of the Commissioner, the Commissioner's Program Progress Reporting System (COPPRS) was installed to process and present timely information to assist program managers in central planning and decisionmaking.

The primary functions of the Systems Planning Staff are: Formulations of long range ADP plans; evaluation of systems performance; conceptualization

of systems design and initial administration of new systems projects. The major fiscal year 1975 project in this area was the Alien Documentation, Identification, and Telecommunications (ADIT) System. A report of the preliminary design for the basic component of the ADIT System, a new machine readable alien identification card, which is counterfeit-proof, imposter-proof and virtually unalterable, was submitted in January of this year. After a further refinement of specifications, the final report of the design and fabrication process of the card will be submitted in January 1976.

The Evaluation Staff initiated a variety of projects in fiscal year 1975. After careful study it recommended a reorganization of the regional offices along the lines of the 1974 Central Office reorganization. A realignment of the regional boundaries was also recommended to create more equal distributions of workload, personnel, and span of control within the regions. Program Priorities became effective on September 30, 1974, in order that the Service perform effectively the principal tasks for which it is responsible with the limited resources available to it. Program Priorities have now evolved into an ongoing control mechanism which has resulted in the field being more responsive to the directions set by the Commissioner. In November 1974, the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration granted a contract for the design of an extensive illegal alien population study to determine the size, characteristics, and impact of the illegal alien population on the United States. The design was completed on May 30, 1975. Objectives for the internal Management by Objective System, the Commissioner's Planning System (COMPS), were formulated in fiscal year 1975. Training for COMPS is in progress and implementation will begin in fiscal year 1976.

INTELLIGENCE

The Service's Intelligence mission is to supply the intellectual material needed to lay out strategy in accomplishing Service programs and to support operational plans. This mission includes, but is not limited to, the gathering of valuable information to aid in combating organized alien smuggling, counterfeiting of immigration documents, and other immigration frauds.

All birth and baptismal certificates used by Mexican, Central, and South American aliens to support false claims to U.S. citizenship are forwarded with copies of all related reports to the Fraudulent Docu-

ment Center in Yuma, Ariz. The number of cases received averaged 100 per month during the first 6 years of the Center's operation; but by mid-1974, new cases were being added at the rate of 500 per month.

The El Paso Intelligence Center began operation October 15, 1974. It is managed jointly by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Immigration and Naturalization Service. EPIC, since its beginning, has been involved in preparing an up-to-date base regarding narcotic violators. This data base has been expanded to include illegal aircraft entry, organized smuggling and document counterfeiting rings. EPIC operates on a 24-hour a day, 7-day a week schedule in order to provide the most effective intelligence coordination possible to support officers in the field.

FIELD INSPECTIONS

Field inspectors make surveys and special studies of Service activities to provide the Commissioner and his top staff with independent, objective, and constructive appraisals of the effectiveness, efficiency, and economy with which the operational responsibilities of the Service are being performed. They inspect to assure that assigned responsibilities and planned objectives of management are being carried out in the manner prescribed and with the results intended.

During fiscal year 1975, on-site surveys of 14 districts and 15 Border Patrol sectors were completed. Improvements resulting from these surveys included the elimination or reduction of unnecessary 1931 Act overtime through scheduling improvements, tightening of parole procedures, improved methods for processing various types of applications, better quality of primary inspections, and improved control of alien records, files, funds, and fees for security and/or safeguarding purposes. This program has also assured that field offices have properly implemented the Service's priority program.

INTERNAL INVESTIGATIONS

This particular unit was formed to monitor employee conduct within the Service. Throughout the year numerous investigations were conducted into alleged cases of misconduct of Service employees, with the resulting determination that in the majority of the cases the complaints were unfounded. However, this unit continues to determine to what extent any incident of misfeasance, malfeasance, or even corrupt activity exists at all levels of the Service.

Examinations

INSPECTIONS

The Service enforces and administers the immigration and nationality laws with respect to the inspection for admission of all persons arriving at ports of entry in the 50 States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Guam and all persons departing from preclearance facilities in Canada, Bermuda, and the Bahamas for entry into the United States. Service inspectors must determine the nationality of each person seeking admission and, if it is determined that a person is an alien, it must be further determined whether that alien is eligible for admission under the statute.

In fiscal year 1975, over 258 million aliens and U.S. citizens were inspected and admitted; 233 million were admitted at land border ports and the remainder entered by air and sea. Of the total, 429,329 aliens destined to foreign countries were granted transit through the United States without a visa. Total admissions were down by 3 percent, almost all of which is accounted for in the 8.7 million decrease in land border crossings.

The 5.2 million persons arriving by sea numbered little less than the 5.3 million who chose vessel travel last year. Also, there was little change in air arrivals with 19.8 million this year and 20 million in 1974. The energy crisis which adversely effected travel during the last quarter of fiscal year 1974 likewise continued the trend in July and August of 1974. During the remaining months, however, persons arriving were essentially the same as last year.

Air arrivals this year were recorded at 1 percent less than 1974. However, the volume continued to strain physical facilities during peak traffic periods. The building and planning of new facilities and expansion and improvements to existing facilities are never ending activities. At year's end, a new inspectional facility designed to service international charters was opened by Lockheed Aircraft at Atlanta, Ga. The new Eastern Airlines Satellite Terminal at San Juan, Puerto Rico, was undergoing major expansion, which included additional arrival and departure gates. Expansion and improvements of the inspectional area at the Baltimore-Washington International Airport were near completion. At Phoenix, Ariz., plans were approved for a new international airport complex. In addition to the airports, new facilities are contemplated at a number of border ports of entry. Work had started on a new

port at Lukeville, Ariz. A new bus inspectional facility was being prepared at Rainbow Bridge, Niagara Falls, N.Y., while at Peace Bridge, Buffalo, the new bus facility had been completed and operational.

To help reduce some of the pressure at overcrowded U.S. ports of entry, passengers are inspected at certain ports outside the United States. The procedure, which is referred to as "preclearance" or "preinspection", is in effect at Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Victoria, and Winnipeg, Canada; and Nassau and Bermuda. Recent agreements have been entered into with the Canadian Government to increase our aircraft inspections at Vancouver and Winnipeg. In the fall of 1977, it is anticipated that preclearance will also be conducted at Calgary and Edmonton, Canada. Preinspection at Nassau increased as a result of longer port hours of operation and the extension of the privilege of preinspection to additional carriers. Over 5 million total aircraft and vessel passengers were preinspected and admitted to the United States compared to 4.4 million in 1974.

One of the Service's principal duties is to insure that aliens who have no right to enter the United States or whose entry would not be in our country's best interests do not, in fact, enter. The inspection procedures are designed, therefore, to facilitate the entry of aliens who meet the qualifications set out by law, to establish time limits for control on the departure of those who have been admitted for temporary periods, and to turn back aliens who do not qualify for admission. Entry was denied to 790,232 aliens, up 49 percent from last year's record high. Of that number, 29,927 were crewmen who were denied the privilege of landing; 354 were stowaways found and detained on the vessels on which they arrived; 593,464 applied as border crossers; and 165,493 others withdrew their applications for admission rather than face formal exclusion proceedings, while


994 aliens were denied entry after being accorded hearings by immigration judges.

The Service continues to play a major role in the prevention of the smuggling of marijuana, narcotics, and dangerous drugs. All immigration inspectors are aware of alien involvement in illicit drug traffic and direct their attention to the detection of possible drug violations while pursuing their primary mission. The participation of Service officers in the control of marijuana, narcotics, and dangerous drug traffic is covered in the "Enforcement" section of this report.

Admissions

Immigrants

A total of 386,194 immigrants were admitted to the United States, a 2-percent decrease from fiscal year 1974. Of the total, 303,161 obtained immigrant visas abroad and were admitted to the United States, and 8,745 entered conditionally as refugees under the seventh preference. The remaining 74,288 were





already in the United States and had their status adjusted to that of aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence.

The Immigration and Nationality Act was amended by the Act of October 3, 1965, which went into effect on December 1, 1965. Under the Act, immigrants can be separated into two major groupings, those subject to numerical limitations and those who are not numerically restricted. About three-fourths of the immigrants were of the numerically limited group, which consists of the Eastern Hemisphere seven preference and the nonpreference categories and the Western Hemisphere classes.

For the Eastern Hemisphere, there is an annual ceiling of 170,000 aliens who may be issued immigrant visas or who may have their status adjusted to that of permanent residents or enter conditionally as refugees. Within the 170,000 ceiling, there is a limit of 20,000 for any one country and no more than 200 for any dependent area. The numbers are allocated on a basis of seven preference categories, four of which provide for the reunion of families of U.S. citizens and resident aliens; two for professional, skilled, or unskilled alien workers needed in the United States; and one for refugees. Numbers not used by these seven preferences

are then available to qualified nonpreference immigrants.

This year, 95,945 close relatives of citizens and resident aliens were admitted under the first, second, fourth, and fifth preferences. Admitted under the third preference were 8,363 aliens who were members of the professions or who possessed exceptional ability in the sciences and arts; and under the sixth preference, 6,724 aliens were admitted to fill positions requiring skilled or unskilled workers. The spouses and children of aliens admitted under these two occupational categories numbered 14,247. In cases of preference aliens admitted for employment, the Department of Labor had certified a shortage of workers existed. Seventh preference refugees totaled 9,129. Also admitted were 25,961 aliens who obtained visas under the nonpreference classification.

The Service processes applicants for conditional entry (refugees under the seventh preference) in Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Lebanon, and the Crown Colony of Hong Kong. Conditional entrants are able to acquire permanent resident status after they have resided here for 2 years. In addition, certain persons who have been continuously physically present in the United States for at least 2 years after being inspected and paroled or admitted other than as conditional entrants, who established that they qualify as refugees, are eligible to apply for lawful permanent resident status pursuant to the proviso to Section 203(a)(7) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended. This year, 384 such refugees became permanent residents.

For immigration purposes, the law considers natives of the Western Hemisphere and their spouses and children classifiable as "special immigrants". Since July 1, 1968, there has been an annual numerical limitation of 120,000 for natives of the Western Hemisphere and their spouses and children. There are no individual country limitations or preferences within that total. The numbers are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis in the order in which applicants are found qualified for those visas. However, if one spouse may be charged to the Eastern Hemisphere by virtue of birth therein, the other spouse and children may also be charged if such chargeability is to their benefit. During the year, 121,101 immigrants were admitted subject to the numerical limitation of the Western Hemisphere. (A visa is valid for up to 4 months, therefore, a portion of the visas would have been issued during the fiscal year prior to the immigrants admission.)

The balance of 104,633 immigrants were not subject to numerical limitations. Approximately 87

percent or 91,504 were of the "immediate relative" classes, i.e., the spouses, children, and parents of U.S. citizens. (In the case of parents, such citizens must be at least 21 years of age.) Among the other classes without numerical limits are certain employees or honorably retired former employees of the U.S. Government abroad and their accompanying spouses and unmarried minor children; and ministers of religious denominations and their spouses and unmarried minor children.

Indo-Chinese Refugee Program

In late March and early April 1975, prospects of a political settlement to the conflict in South Vietnam had begun to fade. Orphanages run by various U.S.

voluntary agencies began to fear that children already petitioned for by U.S. citizens, but not fully processed, would be trapped in that country. Accordingly, a parole program was undertaken to get these children to the United States while it was still possible. The first of many flights of orphans took place on April 2. Congress authorized the parole of 2,279 such Vietnamese orphans, and by mid-April, most of that number had been paroled into the United States by immigration inspectors at ports of entry.

On April 18, 1975, the President asked 12 Federal agencies "to coordinate * * * all U.S. Government activities concerning evacuation of U.S. citizens, Vietnamese citizens, and third country nationals from Vietnam and refugee and resettlement problems relating to the Vietnam conflict." The Commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service is a member of that group which came to be known as the "Interagency Task Force".

On April 22, 1975, the Task Force asked the civil and military authorities on Guam to prepare a safe haven for 90 days to provide care and maintenance for an estimated 50,000 refugees. The next day, the Task Force sent an advance party to Guam to make plans to receive Vietnamese evacuees. The advance party arrived the morning of April 25 to find that the evacuation had begun 2 days earlier and that 10,334 refugees had already arrived on the island. The processing of Vietnamese evacuees for travel to the U.S. Mainland began immediately. By April 29, 1975, the INS Inspections Task Force Group on Guam totaled 83 persons. Processing of immediate relatives of U.S. citizens and lawful permanent resident aliens and other evacuees meeting established criteria had reached 17,766 by May 1. Another group of nine officers similarly processed refugees on Wake Island.

On May 1, 1975, the judiciary committees in Congress authorized the grant of parole of up to 130,000 Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees. Camp Pendleton, Calif., was designated as a reception center for further processing of evacuees other than immediate relatives of U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents. This was followed shortly by the opening of three more reception centers: Fort Chaffee, Ark.; Eglin AFB, Fla.; and Fort Indiantown Gap, Pa. By June 30, 1975, 106,030 refugees had been processed on Guam for travel to the United States; 101,841 of whom had been airlifted out of Guam. The four reception centers had received 102,686 refugees and processed to completion for INS purposes 78,145 of that number.

Although the Service has administered and implemented refugee parole programs in the past, it has never in its history processed so many under such adverse conditions and in so short a period of time.

Cuban Refugees

The airlift from Cuba, which ended on April 6, 1973, was followed by an expanded program for the parole of Cubans residing in third countries. The 1-year program was authorized on October 26, 1973. During the year, 6,940 Cubans were paroled into the United States. Most of the parolees were persons who had managed to leave Cuba for another country and were the parents, spouses, or children of permanent resident aliens or refugees in the United States.


Political Asylum

"The United Nations Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees" was approved by the U.S. Senate on October 4, 1968, and entered into force with respect to the United States on November 1, 1968. The Protocol provides that countries party thereto will undertake to apply Articles 2 through 34 of the 1951 Geneva Convention relating to the status of refugees. The Service has adopted procedures, in collaboration with the Department of State, to insure that the principle of asylum inherent in the Protocol and Convention, and their explicit prohibition against the forcible return of refugees to conditions of persecution, will be carried out in the case of any such alien who comes within the jurisdiction of the Service. Every precaution is taken to insure that anyone requesting asylum is given an opportunity to fully present his case. This year, 2,432 aliens requested asylum, and 562 requests were granted. Many requests were found to be frivolous and were being used as stratagems to remain longer in the United States or to avoid deportation.

The Commuter Program

In *Saxbe v. Bustos*, 419 U.S. 65, the Supreme Court decided on November 25, 1974, that the practice of the Immigration and Naturalization Service of admitting daily and seasonal commuters as lawful permanent residents returning from temporary absences abroad is proper. The Court upheld, 5 to 4, the program's legality; it reaffirmed the commuter's immigrant status; and refused to differentiate between so-called "seasonal" and "daily" commuters. The decision was straightforward and dealt only with the question of the legality of the program; yet, the admission of commuters will continue to pose some problems for Service personnel.

While there are only some 60,000 aliens with commuter status, the frequency with which they cross the border gives them a much larger proportion of admissions than their numbers might suggest. For generations, prior to establishment of the present program, foreign nationals crossed our borders daily to



work in the United States and then returned to their homes in contiguous territory.

The seasonal commuter program has been a much more recent development. Although its origin has been traced back as far as 1943, it acquired much more importance with the termination of the bracero program in 1964. Briefly, it provides for special documentation of the Mexican agricultural worker who holds an Alien Registration Receipt Card and who works only part of each year in the United States. Much smaller than the "daily" commuter program the number of seasonal commuters has been estimated to be in the neighborhood of 9,000—less than 15 percent of the commuting total.

It can be validly argued that the commuter program has remained essentially the same for nearly 50 years, despite changes made in the documentary requirements. The commuter is required initially to obtain an immigrant visa, and is charged to an appropriate quota. The visa is carried to a port of entry, and there an Alien Registration Receipt Card is issued. If the alien is identified as a commuter who anticipates steady employment and frequent trips home, his card is grommeted. If he is to participate in the seasonal commuter program, an "S" is punched in the lower left corner of the card's obverse. In either case, he is given an additional card stamped with the number of a month 6 months from date of issuance. The commuter is to show both cards on crossing the border, and at the end of each 6-month period, his employment situation is investigated. If he proves to be still eligible, he is issued another card valid for an additional 6 months. In this way, the Government assures itself that the commuter has not abandoned status.

Nonimmigrants

Nonimmigrants are aliens who come to the United States for temporary periods of time. The various classes of nonimmigrants include diplomats and their families, attendants, servants, and personal employees; visitors for business or pleasure; aliens transiting the United States; treaty traders and investors; representatives of international organizations and their families, attendants, servants, and personal employees; temporary workers or trainees; representatives of foreign information media; exchange visitors; fiance(e)s of U.S. citizens; intracompany transferees; NATO representatives; and the spouses and children of aliens in several of the aforementioned classes. With the exceptions of citizens of Canada and Mexico who enter frequently as border crossers, and of alien crewmen, 7,083,937 nonimmigrants were admitted to the United States, about 3 percent more than 1974.

Included in this count are 799,951 permanent resident aliens who returned from temporary visits abroad.

As in past years, visitors for pleasure were the largest group of nonimmigrants with 5,060,023 or 71 percent of the total. Next in order of volume were 527,387 visitors for business, 7 percent. Other significant classes were 107,495 foreign students, who entered to attend educational institutions, accompanied or followed by their 10,465 spouses and children. There were 137,042 foreign students in the United States at the close of the fiscal year. Exchange visitors numbering 46,001 were admitted to participate in Government and in privately sponsored programs designed to further international cultural exchange. Accompanying or following them were their 17,377 spouses and children.

Nonimmigrants admitted to engage in employment are of four classes, all of which require approved visa petitions establishing their eligibility. (Covered in more detail in section entitled Nonimmigrant Visa Petitions.) The general grouping of temporary workers and trainees consists of the three "H" classes. Admitted were 15,550 "H-1" workers to perform services which require distinguished merit and ability, 37,460 "H-2" workers to perform temporary services or labor for which qualified labor cannot be found in this country (require certifications by the Department of Labor), and 3,756 "H-3" trainees. Spouses and children of these three classes numbered 10,568. The fourth class relates to 12,570 "L-1" intracompany transferees, who continued to render managerial, executive, or other services involving specialized

knowledge to the same international firm or corporation. They were accompanied or followed by 9,769 spouses and children.

As can be seen in the accompanying table, Non-immigrants Admitted, all but four classes showed a decrease. These lower figures, however, were offset by the increase in visitors for pleasure resulting in an overall near 3-percent increase.

ADJUDICATIONS

The Examinations Division of this Service is responsible for processing and decisionmaking on some 31 various actions involving applications for benefits under the immigration laws and proceedings to revoke benefits under those laws which were obtained improperly.

Chronic shortages of personnel and lack of funds with which to recruit and train replacements to fill vacancies resulting from normal attrition compelled the Commissioner to implement a priorities program which became effective on September 30, 1974. The realignment placed several of the more time-consuming applications in lower priorities and provided for more emphasis on the quality of adjudications. Also, on February 16, 1975, the decision to discontinue authorizations of extensions of stay for temporary visitors for pleasure was put into effect. Mainly as a result of the latter decision, the total volume of applications and petitions received decreased slightly, for the first time in several years, from an alltime high of 1,449,337 received during fiscal year 1974 to 1,392,192 received during 1975. Despite this 4-percent decrease in receipts, the overall pending figure increased by 17 percent, from 154,980 at the end of fiscal year 1974 to 180,716 at the end of this year.

This singular unfavorable fact is more than compensated for by the improved quality of adjudications and by the favorable results of the implementation of a fraud detection program. It is interesting to note that receipts in two fraud-prone areas, i.e., applications for adjustment of status submitted by beneficiaries of approved fiance(e) petitions and border crossing card applications decreased considerably during 1975.

Nonimmigrant Visa Petitions

Visa petitions must be filed with and approved by the Service for certain classes of nonimmigrants. Upon receipt of an approved petition by a U.S. consular officer, a nonimmigrant visa may be issued

to the alien claiming to be in one of the classes, which are described in the paragraphs that follow.

The classification "H-1" is accorded to an alien of distinguished merit and ability coming to perform services of an exceptional nature requiring such merit and ability; "H-2" is accorded to an alien coming to perform temporary services or labor, if unemployed persons capable of performing such service or labor cannot be found in this country; "H-3" is for a trainee; and "L-1" is for an intracompany transferee coming to continue to render his services to the same employer or a subsidiary or affiliate thereof in a capacity that is managerial, executive, or involves specialized knowledge. Petitions approved for the "H" and "L" classes showed a 35-percent increase, from 24,406 in 1974 to 33,067 in 1975. The unusually large increase is attributed mainly to "H-2" petitions for workers in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Ironically, widespread job layoffs resulted in the increase since a large volume of the terminated aliens attempted to obtain new employment.

A visa petition is also required for an alien fiance(e) of a U.S. citizen who seeks to enter the United States solely to conclude a valid marriage with the petitioner within 90 days after entry. This is one of the aforementioned fraud-prone areas. During 1975, there were 10,503 such petitions representing an 11-percent decrease from last year's 11,770 approvals.

Immigrant Visa Petitions

Visa petitions are required for immigrant applicants in the immediate relative and first through sixth preference categories. Only after a petition has been approved may consular officers abroad issue immigrant visas to aliens or may the status of eligible aliens in the United States be adjusted to that of permanent residence on the basis of immediate relative status or one of the six preferences.

The "immediate relative" classification applies to the unmarried minor children and spouses of U.S. citizens and the parents of adult U.S. citizens. Included are orphans who have been adopted or will be adopted by U.S. citizens and their spouses. Orphan petitions approved continued to increase with 6,187 in 1975 compared to last year's 5,325. Immediate relatives are admitted to the United States without numerical limitation.

Natives of Eastern Hemisphere countries and their dependent areas are subject to a limitation of 170,000 immigrant visas which may be issued annually. Within this numerical limitation, there are seven preferences, the first six of which require visa petitions. Four of the

preferences are for specified relatives of U.S. citizens and resident aliens. The first preference is for unmarried adult sons and daughters of U.S. citizens. The second preference is for spouses and unmarried sons and daughters of aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence. The fourth preference is for married sons and daughters of U.S. citizens, and the fifth is for brothers and sisters of U.S. citizens. In these four preferences, there were 185,186 petitions approved, slightly less than the 185,845 in 1974.

The third and sixth preferences are based on occupational qualifications. The third preference is for members of the professions and persons of exceptional ability in the sciences or arts. The sixth preference is for aliens capable of performing specified skilled or unskilled labor for which a shortage of employable and willing persons exists in the United States. Third and sixth preference petitions may not be approved unless a labor certification is issued by the Secretary of Labor. A labor certification is a determination that sufficient qualified workers are not available in the area of the United States to which the alien is destined to perform the work in which he will engage, and that his employment will not adversely affect the wages and working conditions of residents of this country similarly employed. Approvals of third and sixth preference petitions decreased to 18,724 from 20,197 in 1974.

The law does not provide preference classification for natives of the independent countries of the Western Hemisphere. Such natives are subject to an annual limitation of 120,000 immigrant visas which are issued on a first-come, first-served basis.

Adjustment of Status

The majority of immigrants acquire permanent residence status by admission to the United States with immigrant visas issued by American consular officers abroad. Additionally, the law provides for the acquisition of permanent residency by the adjustment of status of eligible aliens in the United States. Of the total 386,194 immigrants this year, 74,288 or 19 percent had their status adjusted.

Section 245 Adjustments

Under Section 245 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, natives of the Eastern Hemisphere (other than crewmen) who have been inspected and admitted or paroled into the United States may seek adjustment of status to that of permanent residence while in the United States. Applicants must be eligible to receive immigrant visas and be admissible to the United States for permanent residence. Also,

the visas must be immediately available to them. This year, persons adjusted under Section 245 numbered 42,958 compared to 50,265 in 1974.

Cuban Adjustments

Cuban refugees, the next largest group of aliens adjusting status, may become permanent residents of the United States under Section 1 of the Act of November 2, 1966. To be eligible to apply, applicants must have been physically present in the United States for at least 2 years. Almost all Cuban refugees are subject to the Western Hemisphere annual numerical limitation of 120,000 visa numbers. During the fiscal year, 34,944 applications under the Act were received, 26,514 were granted, and 2,725 were denied. Compared to last year, cases completed were 61 percent greater while receipts decreased by only 2 percent. Though the pending caseload went up from 70,719 on June 30, 1974, to 74,296 on June 30, 1975, the increase is significantly smaller than last year, which opened with 55,648 pending. Directly associated with a portion of the pending caseload is a lack of available visa numbers.

Other Adjustments

Applications for the creation of records of lawful entry under Section 249 of the Act, as amended, decreased from 1,051 in 1974 to 863 in 1975. Since applicants under this section must have entered the United States before June 30, 1948, continued decreases in applications for this benefit are expected.

Also this year, 375 aliens were granted permanent residence status as refugees under the proviso to Section 203 (a) (7) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, following 2 years' continuous physical presence in the United States.

The Act of April 7, 1970 provides for the alien fiance(e)s of U.S. citizens to enter the United States as nonimmigrants to marry the citizen petitioner within 90 days of entry. Applications for permanent residence status were received from 6,093 fiance(e)s who had concluded valid marriages with the petitioners. Compared to last year's 7,983 receipts, there is a decrease of almost 24 percent.

Other Applications

Under Section 212(e) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, exchange aliens are subject to a 2-year foreign residence requirement if their participation in an exchange program was financed by the U.S. Government, or the government of their nationality or last residence, or their home country has been designated by the Secretary of State to be

in need of their skills. Waiver of the 2-year foreign residence requirement may be granted by the Service on the basis of exceptional hardship, persecution, interest of a U.S. Government agency, or a "no-objection" statement by the alien's government provided that the Secretary of State recommends that the waiver be granted. In fiscal year 1975, the Service granted 543 such waivers.

During the year, 393,139 applications by nonimmigrants to extend their temporary stay in the United States were received compared with 443,797 in 1974. Extensions were granted in 351,487 cases. The decrease, of course, is attributable to the cessation of processing applications for extension of stay for "B-2" visitors for pleasure. The Service issued 170,310 alien border crossing cards to residents of Canada and Mexico having frequent need to enter the United States, compared to 171,529 last year. This decrease is mostly attributed to the emphasis on fraud detection. A total of 25,277 applications by nonimmigrants in the United States to change to another nonimmigrant classification were approved, also showing a decrease from last year's 27,774.

On August 1, 1973, regulations authorizing the issuance of travel documents to eligible refugees went into effect. The document enables the alien to whom it is issued to return to the United States during the period of its validity and provides the refugee with a booklet form document in which foreign governments may affix visas. Last year, 2,915 such refugee travel documents were issued. During 1975, the first full year of issuance, there were 5,518.

Schools desiring to accept nonimmigrant students for enrollment must first be authorized to do so by the Service. Foreign students or exchange visitors wishing to transfer to another school or exchange program also require Service authorization. Students who seek to engage in employment must apply to the Service for permission to do so. In these various categories, there were 70,589 applications approved, compared with the 1974 total of 75,836.

There were 14,115 certificates of identity issued to U.S. citizens residing in this country and desiring to facilitate reentry to the United States after a visit to Canada or Mexico, or who desired identification as U.S. citizens for other reasons.

Duplicate alien registration receipt cards and reentry permits issued or extended for lawful permanent residents of the United States numbered 195,256, a slight decrease of 2 percent from last year's 199,192.

Permission to reapply for admission into the United States after deportation was granted to 2,729 aliens. Advance permission to return after a tem-

porary absence abroad was given to 139 resident aliens who without such permission would have been inadmissible upon application for reentry.

Under Sections 212(g), (h), and (i) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, the Attorney General has the authority to waive certain grounds of inadmissibility for prospective immigrants who are the spouses, parents, or children of lawful permanent residents or citizens of the United States. Approved were 1,991 such waivers. Additionally, the temporary admission of 14,154 nonimmigrants was authorized, notwithstanding an existing ground of inadmissibility, under the authority contained in Section 212(d)(3) of the Act.

Aliens who have defected from communism may be admitted into the United States if they can establish that they have been actively opposed to the ideology for at least 5 years prior to their application for admission, provided it is determined that their entry would be in the public interest. This year, 28 defectors were granted permission to immigrate.

SERVICE OPERATIONS OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES

Pursuant to law, a limited number of Service officers are stationed in foreign countries. In addition to processing applications for conditional entry, they are authorized to adjudicate specified applications and petitions filed by U.S. citizens and permanent resident aliens who are abroad. They consider cases of inadmissible aliens referred by U.S. consuls to determine whether to grant relief from inadmissibility. Service officers abroad also help combat fraud against the immigration laws by verifying authenticity of documents and employment experience. During 1975, these officers approved 9,832 applications by refugees for conditional entry and adjudicated 32,541 other applications.

Enforcement

One of the primary responsibilities of the Service is the enforcement of the regulatory and criminal provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act and related Federal statutes. The Service enforcement programs are directed toward the prevention and detection of illegal entry into the United States and the apprehension and removal of foreign nationals who entered the country surreptitiously or are present in violation of the terms of lawful admission. These law enforcement responsibilities are

carried out by the Border Patrol and Investigations Divisions, with the added support of the Detention and Deportation Division.

The continuing flood of illegal entries over the Southern Border and the attendant rise in other immigration violations reached such proportions during the year that the Service was forced to establish operational priorities within the enforcement program. Thinly spread manpower and other resources were consolidated in key areas and assigned to key functions. Primary emphasis was directed toward the strengthening of controls in the immediate border areas and to the location and removal of illegal aliens found working in well-paying jobs in the United States. Priorities were also established to provide the fiscal and other resources necessary to back up the realigned programs.

DEPORTABLE ALIENS LOCATED

For the first time in more than a decade, the number of deportable aliens located by Service officers did not reflect a significant increase over the prior year. The 766,600 deportable aliens located during fiscal year 1975 represents a decrease of 21,545 from the 1974 record high of 788,145. Despite the decrease from last year, the 1975 figure still reflects a staggering increase of 595 percent over the number located during 1965. The decline in total deportable aliens located is largely attributable to a decrease of 29,567 in the number of deportable Mexican nationals located. Of the deportable foreign nationals located during fiscal year 1975, 680,392 or 89 percent were nationals of Mexico. The remaining 86,208 deportable aliens include natives of virtually every country of the world and represent an increase of 10 percent over the number located last year.

The following table provides a comparison of immigration law violators located during the past 2 fiscal years:



Status at Entry

A total of 667,689 or 87 percent of the deportable aliens located had entered the United States illegally at other than ports of entry. Fully 99 percent (661,997) of these surreptitious entries were made across the Mexican border. Among the 98,911 aliens admitted at ports of entry who became deportable as the result of violations of the terms of their admissions, there were 55,294 temporary visitors, 8,869 foreign students, 3,502 immigrants, 15,127 alien crewmen, and 16,119 other persons.

An important element in the overall enforcement program is the rapid apprehension of illegal aliens. Prompt apprehension and return to the country of origin has proved to be a positive deterrent to illegal reentry and related violations. Aside from the 9,781 crewmen who technically violated their terms of admission because their ships were unable to depart from the United States within the time specified, the time that elapsed in locating the other 756,819 deportable aliens was as follows: 57 percent within 72 hours; 15 percent within 4 to 30 days; 16 percent within 1 to 6 months; 4 percent within 7 months to 1 year; and 8 percent over 1 year.



Area Control

The Investigations Division carries out area control operations designed to locate illegal aliens present in the major urban and suburban centers of this country. Illegal aliens attracted into these industrialized areas by employment opportunities often have a negative impact on wages, working conditions, and employment for the American labor force. This year, priorities were designed to locate illegals employed in high paying jobs that are attractive to U.S. citizens and lawful alien residents.

During fiscal year 1975, emphasis was placed on an operation entitled "Program Cooperation", which sought to enlist the support of employers in combating the employment of illegal aliens. In many cases cooperation was excellent and many employers took action to terminate the employment of illegal aliens. Despite increased cooperation, area control forces continue to face resistance in their efforts to seek out illegal aliens who are employed. In March 1975,

investigators from the New York District Office were refused permission to conduct interviews inside a factory, after information obtained from apprehended aliens indicated that other illegals were employed at the firm. A judicial search warrant was obtained and 30 deportable aliens were located. Similar experiences were reported by other Service offices.

Efforts of area control forces throughout the Nation led to the apprehension of 122,170 deportable aliens, a 5-percent increase from the previous year.

Smuggling

During fiscal year 1975, Border Patrol agents apprehended 80,385 aliens who had been induced or assisted to enter unlawfully or who had been transported unlawfully after entry, 2,729 fewer than last year. The 6,860 smugglers of aliens and violators of statutes relating to unlawful transportation of aliens apprehended is 1,214 less than the number found in 1974. It is hoped that these decreases represent the

beginning of a reversal of an upward trend that has existed continuously since 1964. However, it is too early to consider the declines as conclusive evidence of a downturn.

Alien smuggling patterns were similar to those of recent years, with large-scale, highly organized operations very much in evidence. Illegal aliens, legally resident aliens, and U.S. citizens are members of smuggling rings, which are organized to include leaders, recruiters or arrangers, guides, hired transporters, scout car drivers, and operators of drop houses where illegals are placed temporarily before being moved to their ultimate destinations in this country. The demand for assistance, the complexity of the organizations, and the distances involved have contributed to large fees, often in excess of \$300 per alien. Loads of 15 to 20 aliens produce a lucrative income for the smugglers, whether the group is destined for Los Angeles or more distant points such as Chicago. The following cases are examples of smuggling operations encountered by Service officers.

Early in 1974, Chula Vista antismuggling agents began an investigation of a well-organized and sophisticated smuggling operation. In all, 20 persons were thoroughly investigated. Members of this ring had been active in smuggling operations dating back to 1964, bringing aliens from Central and South America to Chicago, New York, and Newark. Infiltration of the ring was accomplished by a Service informant, who provided advance information that led to photographing of the entire operation beginning the moment the aliens were smuggled into the United States and continuing through their movement into and out of drop houses from San Ysidro to Los Angeles in conjunction with the Los Angeles Anti-smuggling Unit. Three houses were searched in Los Angeles producing voluminous evidence, including lists of hundreds of aliens who had been smuggled by the conspirators and information furnishing leads for subsequent investigations of other large rings centered in Tijuana, Mexico. Indictments were obtained from the San Diego grand jury and nine of the smugglers were arrested. Final sentencing of these persons totaled 19.5 years in jail.

Border Patrol agents of the West Palm Beach, Fla., Station, together with the sector antismuggling agent, and with tactical assistance from the U.S. Coast Guard and Florida Marine Patrol, apprehended 3 U.S. citizens and 1 Haitian late in 1974 who were attempting to land 13 Haitian aliens and 1 Bahamian alien at West Palm Beach. One week earlier, the same four principals had smuggled a group of aliens into this country from West End, Grand Bahama, Ba-

hamas. Eleven of the aliens were apprehended en route to Miami, Fla. Sufficient information was obtained from the apprehended aliens to identify the smugglers and successfully apprehend them on their subsequent attempt to land aliens in Florida. The owner/master of the vessel used in this operation pled guilty to 25 counts of smuggling aliens and immigration fines in excess of \$22,000 were levied. The vessel, valued at \$125,000, was seized by U.S. Customs.

Deserting Crewmen and Stowaways

The Service carries forward a coordinated program of coastal control directed toward the prevention and detection of illegal entry by alien crewmen and stowaways. Located in New York City, the Marine Intelligence Unit disseminates current data regarding violations, trends, schemes, and other information to Service officers in the field. This information and close liaison with shipping agents, steamship companies, and law enforcement personnel from other agencies have made the coastal control program highly effective. Of the 2,598,849 alien crewmen permitted to land temporarily in the United States, 15,127 were located after having failed to depart with their vessels. Of this total, 4,267 had willfully violated the terms of their admission.

Air Operations

The 25 fixed wing, single engine aircraft maintained by the Service perform aerial observation along the Mexican border. These aircraft are strategically located and piloted by experienced Border Patrol agents. Service aircraft provide important support in meeting the varied operational problems related to border enforcement, e.g., interception of illegal entrants in close proximity to the border, tracking through desert and remote areas, locating aliens employed in agricultural pursuits, and covert surveillance of alien smuggling activities. These problems require aircraft with the capability to fly at minimum heights at extremely low air speeds to permit effective observation of ground activity. During fiscal year 1975, Border Patrol pilots assisted in the location of 33,625 deportable aliens. In addition to their regular mission, Service pilots also assisted other agencies in the location of contraband and performed numerous search and rescue missions.

Cooperation With Other Law Enforcement Agencies

A major element of Service enforcement programs is continued liaison with Federal, State, local, and

foreign country law enforcement agencies. The 92,884 violators of immigration and nationality laws who were turned over to the Border Patrol by other law enforcement agencies is proof of the success of these cooperative efforts. Border Patrol agents in turn encountered and released to appropriate agencies 2,776 violators of other laws, including 1,509 violators of narcotics laws. Border Patrol agents also recovered and transferred to appropriate agencies merchandise valued at more than \$2.5 million, including firearms, vehicles used in smuggling, and other contraband.

In addition to the maintenance of liaison in direct enforcement activities, Service officers lectured at numerous police schools and academies, conducted courses and field visits for enforcement officers from foreign countries, and presented programs to school groups and service organizations.

In response to a growing need from both the public and private sectors for counseling on the many individual and collective problems relating to immigration, several major district offices have extended counseling services under the auspices of independent organizations. In Chicago, Service officers counseled nearly 1,200 individuals during participation in 16 field seminars conducted in neighborhoods of predominantly Hispanic residents. Similar assistance is being extended to major business establishments seeking to screen current and prospective employees to assure compliance with the immigration statutes and to contribute in the alleviation of national unemployment.

Liaison with other agencies does not only extend to the exchange of criminal suspects. The Border Patrol has on numerous occasions assisted local

authorities in search and rescue of lost persons on the deserts and in mountainous regions. In providing this support the unusual, exceptional skill of Border Patrol agents in the art of sign cutting (tracking) has proven invaluable. In one particular case, in which the search effort for a kidnapped 7-year-old girl was nearly abandoned, the agents of the El Cajon Patrol Station were called upon for assistance. Border Patrol Agent Doug Knoell recognized a heel print that he had first seen 5 days before at the original site of the kidnapping 10 miles away. With the aid of additional trackers and air support the rescue of the child and the apprehension of the kidnapper were effected immediately.

Service Participation in the Control of Marijuana, Narcotics, and Dangerous Drug Traffic

Officers of the Service continued to contribute substantially to the national drug abuse control effort. Illegal drugs valued at over \$41.8 million were seized by Service officers incident to their immigration law enforcement duties. These seizures included 134 tons of marijuana valued at over \$26 million; 3,659 ounces of hard drugs valued at over \$14 million; and nearly 50,000 dangerous drug pills with a value of \$14,000. Examples of the Service role in combating illicit drug traffic can be seen in the following cases.

On February 27, 1975, only hours after electronic sensors were implanted along the international border in the desert area west of the El Paso Border Patrol Sector, the largest known marijuana seizure made by officers of the Border Patrol was carried out by agents of the Lordsburg, N. Mex., Station. Alerted to the intrusion by the Sector radio operator, as he monitored the computer readouts, the Border Patrol agents apprehended two resident aliens of Mexican nationality driving two 2.5-ton grain trucks loaded with a combined weight of 16,130 pounds of marijuana hidden beneath bales of hay.

On October 2, 1974, a Border Patrol agent of the Chula Vista, Calif., Station apprehended an illegal entrant Mexican citizen in San Ysidro, Calif., driving a 1974 pickup truck containing 1,111 pounds of marijuana. The smuggler, after loading the cargo of bricks of marijuana, had placed a layer of several inches of steer manure on top of the packages to disguise the cargo and to negate the odor of the marijuana. The alien was nonchalantly driving his cargo into San Ysidro and was unaware that the tailgate of the truck had dropped, clearly exposing the multi-colored bricks of marijuana.

Service investigators in the New York City area worked throughout the year with officials of the Drug Enforcement Administration, New York City Police, and New York State Police in efforts to immobilize major drug trafficking organizations. Between May and September 1974, the task force coordinated all investigative intelligence and techniques to accomplish its objective. During September, the collective effort led to the procurement of indictments against 210 subjects, as well as other arrests and seizures. As a result of this operation, the Service received drug arrest referrals on 228 aliens. Of this number, 106 were permanent resident aliens and 122 were aliens illegally present in the United States.

On October 15, 1974, in a joint effort with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), the Service opened the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC). As an aid to border enforcement efforts, the mission of this facility is to provide information to field units engaged in the pursuit of illegal drug traffic, as well as smugglers of aliens and other illegal contraband.

Encounters With Armed Law Violators and Aliens Apprehended With Prior Records of Criminal and Immigration Law Violations

During fiscal year 1975, Border Patrol agents arrested 184,610 aliens who had previously violated the immigration laws. Of the repeat violators apprehended, 10,308 had prior criminal records. Persons arrested who were armed at the time of arrest numbered 202, up 100 percent from last year. The usual range of dangerous weapons, including handguns, rifles, shotguns, and knives, was encountered.

Shortly after midnight on June 9, 1975, Supervisory Border Patrol Agent Allen H. Fry and Border Patrol

Agent James P. Moody of the Brownsville, Tex., Station, observed an automobile stopped under suspicious circumstances on a road east of Brownsville. As the officers approached, the vehicle departed but was eventually stopped. The occupants of the rear seat fled and were pursued by Agent Moody, who quickly apprehended one suspect. Hearing a shot and returning to the car, Moody found that Agent Fry had been seriously wounded. While loading Fry into the Border Patrol automobile, Moody came under fire from the surrounding brush. He fired several shots toward the gunman's location and the shooting ceased. Examination of the suspect vehicle revealed approximately 300 pounds of marijuana. Six suspects have been arrested in connection with this incident.

CARIBBEAN INVESTIGATIONS COORDINATION PROGRAM

The primary mission of the Caribbean Investigations Coordination Program and its related index is the prevention of entry into the United States of Latin American aliens of the criminal, immoral, narcotic, and subversive classes. In some cases index has proved valuable in the identification of fraudulent documents. The index is available to Service officers and other Government investigative agencies on a 24-hour basis.

The index contains some 220,315 references, with 1,150 new reference cards being added during fiscal year 1975. As a result of information found in the index, 82 aliens were deferred for further inspection or investigation during the year, and 195 Cuban refugees were refused clearance for travel to the United States from third countries. The 8,552 requests for index checks resulted in the location of relating records in 395 cases.

FOREIGN-BORN LAW VIOLATORS

Internal Security and the Foreign Born

Continued emphasis was placed on Service programs designed to detect, identify, and investigate foreign-born subversives in order to prevent the entry of such persons into the United States, or, where warranted, to remove such persons from the country through expulsion proceedings. The Service, as a member of the Cabinet Committee to Combat Terrorism, has actively carried forward programs designed to combat the activities of both foreign and domestic terrorist groups.

The following are examples of the types of cases developed through Service antisubversive programs.

Elizabeth Debray, nee Elizabeth Burgos-Tortolero, was granted a visitors visa at Paris, France, on May 16, 1973. She identified herself as a citizen of France and gave her place of birth as simply Valencia. She was admitted to the United States as a visitor on August 30, 1973, at Los Angeles, Calif. Subsequent inquiry, initiated to determine if she had violated her non-immigrant status, elicited information that she was born in Valencia, Venezuela, and was the wife of Jules Regis Debray, the internationally known French Marxist author and guerrilla warfare theoretician who was a confidant of Fidel Castro and a close associate of Che Guevara. When questioned regarding her background, Mrs. Debray refused to answer on the grounds that the answers might incriminate her. Mrs. Debray's visa was canceled on July 8, 1974, to depart voluntarily. She departed from the United States en route to Mexico on July 11, 1974.

The Service's investigation into the backgrounds of approximately 70 individuals against whom allegations of Nazi war crimes had been made was intensified during the year as information was received from previously unknown sources and additional individuals were accused of being Nazi war criminals. This program attempts to reconstruct the alleged war crimes, locate eyewitnesses, and establish admissible evidence concerning events that took place in foreign countries 30 to 35 years ago. This is a monumental task, frequently complicated by formidable barriers of protocol, international law, language, and accessibility. Despite these obstacles, the Service has made considerable progress toward resolution of the many allegations. War crimes authorities and documentation centers in Europe and the Near East are being used in the inquiry. Coordination and control of the program has been assigned to the Service's New York District Office, subject to the supervision of a senior investigator at Service headquarters whose sole assignment is to monitor and control this far-reaching program. In order to ensure maximum effort and response from the Federal Republic of West Germany and other foreign governments, the overall inquiry is being coordinated with the U.S. Department of State.

Foreign Born of the Criminal Classes

Service investigators completed 14,591 investigations involving aliens of the criminal, immoral, and narcotic classes. Applications for orders to show

cause in deportation proceedings were made in 3,615 such cases, and 812 aliens of these classes were deported from the United States.

Among those expelled was Norman McCaud, a notorious Canadian criminal with a record in Canada that included convictions for theft, armed robbery, conspiracy, possession of narcotics, counterfeiting, possession of a police radio, and bail jumping. While in this country, McCaud was suspected of smuggling heroin, passing counterfeit money and stolen checks, and burglary. He was arrested in April 1974 by Tonawanda, N.Y., police officers and charged with cutting telephone cables in order to disrupt police telephone service and burglar alarm equipment in several businesses targeted for burglaries. McCaud was deported to Canada on January 16, 1975, to face fugitive charges arising from his escape from prison in 1971.

Frauds

Activity concerning aliens and other persons involved in schemes devised to circumvent immigration laws continued to increase during fiscal year 1975. The 21,195 fraud investigations completed represent a 27-percent increase over the previous year. These investigations revealed continued use of altered, counterfeit, or fraudulent documents, as well as "sham" marriages and fraudulent labor certification of aliens designed to obtain benefits under the immigration laws to which the aliens were not entitled.

In one Service office, a pilot project established that only 6 out of 50 suspect labor certifications for job offers were valid. In another office, indictments were obtained on three arrangers of 19 known "sham" marriages. As the result of an investigation initiated by this Service, a Florida circuit judge recommended that five Miami notaries public be held in contempt of the Florida Supreme Court and fined. Charges were filed against the five notaries by the State after investigation established that they were conducting an immigration counseling racket, charging hundreds of thousands of dollars for their services. In some cases they collected up to 90 percent of the aliens' paychecks. The services performed by these notaries would have been provided free by the Immigration Service.

In Chicago, an attorney was indicted by a Federal grand jury on June 19, 1975, in an 11 count indictment charging that he had falsified job background information and supplied the U.S. Department of Labor and this Service with false job qualification information regarding alien applicants for permanent

residence. The attorney, in collusion with a sponsor, would provide false job information which would conform with the Department of Labor's standards and result in approval of labor certification for the alien clients. With approved labor certification, the nonimmigrant aliens were able to adjust to permanent residence status. The aliens involved in this case paid fees ranging from \$1,750 to \$4,000.

The Fraudulent Document Center, located at Yuma, Ariz., was established in 1958 as a repository for documents used by Mexican aliens to support false claims to U.S. citizenship. The facility has accumulated almost 52,000 case files which are referred to upon receipt of inquiries for record checks. There were 7,417 inquiries handled during the year, and 6,127 new cases received and processed.

The Border Patrol reported 4,547 false claims to U.S. citizenship and 2,892 cases in which alien registration cards, Mexican border crossing cards, and other documents were used to support fraudulent claims to legal status in the United States.

CRIMINAL PROSECUTION

U.S. attorneys authorized prosecutions incident to 14,325 violations of the immigration and nationality laws during fiscal year 1975. Of this number, 12,811 (89 percent) resulted in convictions. Defendants found guilty in these cases received sentences totaling 5,313 years, of which 3,137 were suspended. There were also fines imposed in the amount of \$754,746, of which \$213,290 were suspended.

Detention and Deportation

There were 23,438 aliens deported under formal orders of deportation, a 25-percent increase over last year. Of the aliens deported, 18,425 had entered without inspection or without proper documents, 3,649 failed to comply with their nonimmigrant status, 812 were deported on criminal, immoral, or narcotic charges, 526 had been previously deported or excluded, and 26 were deported on other charges.

Among the aliens deported as the result of convictions on criminal, immoral, or narcotic charges was John Wesley Egan, a citizen of Australia. Egan, a member of a large Australian organization engaged in smuggling heroin from Hong Kong into the United States, was originally arrested on January 3, 1967, and charged with conspiracy to distribute heroin. He posted a \$12,500 bond and was released to this Service pending trial on criminal charges. His deportation, ordered on March 22, 1970, was deferred

pending trial and Egan was released on \$2,500 bond. He absconded and a fugitive warrant was issued by the U.S. district court, New York. Egan was arrested in France on May 10, 1970, and was extradited to the United States on June 19, 1971. He was subsequently convicted of violating U.S. narcotic laws and sentenced to 8 years in prison. Egan was paroled to this Service on March 10, 1975, and deported the same day.

Aliens required to depart without formal orders of deportation numbered 655,814, a decrease of 9 percent from the prior fiscal year. Of these persons, 91 percent (597,941) were required departures under safeguards, chiefly nationals of Mexico who entered this country without inspection.

Faced with increasing costs for detention and expulsion of illegal aliens, the Service places emphasis on programs designed to speed removal and reduce transportation costs. For example, of 183,862 Mexican nationals removed from points of apprehension in the Service's Southwest Region to the Mexican border on Service buses or on private buses operating under charter agreements, 89,836 paid all or part of their transportation costs at a savings to the Government of \$970,090. In addition, of 45,707 Mexican nationals removed to the interior of Mexico by air, train, or bus, 44,404 paid \$809,721 towards the cost of transportation.

Aliens admitted to Service and non-Service facilities during fiscal year 1975 numbered 109,138 and 103,888, respectively. Ninety-two percent (196,437) of the 213,026 total admissions were nationals of Mexico.

Hearings and Litigation

EXCLUSION AND DEPORTATION HEARINGS

The 46,628 deportation cases referred to immigration judges during fiscal year 1975 again represents a record high number of hearings; more than double the 19,475 cases referred a decade ago. Formal exclusion hearings referred to immigration judges totaled 2,523 during the year, more than three times the number referred in 1965.

LITIGATION

General Counsel

The General Counsel is the chief law officer of the Service. He is the legal adviser to the Commissioner and other officers on questions of law that arise in the administration and enforcement of the immigra-

tion and nationality statutes. He reviews the decisions of the various courts and the Board of Immigration Appeals to advise whether appellate or other action should be taken. He analyzes proposed legislation and advises on the implementation of new laws. The General Counsel also provides executive and professional direction to four regional counsels, who maintain professional supervision over trial attorneys whose primary responsibility is to represent the Service in formal exclusion, deportation and rescission hearings before immigration judges. Regional counsels and trial attorneys, when requested, assist U.S. attorneys in civil and criminal actions arising under the immigration and nationality laws. Through two appellate trial attorneys the General Counsel also represents the Service before the Board of Immigration Appeals in all appellate matters.

Trial Attorneys

Trial attorneys appeared in 2,556 exclusion hearings, 11,387 deportation proceedings and 1,953 other cases. Compared with the previous year, appearances in deportation proceedings increased 79 percent; in exclusion hearings appearances increased 37 percent. Trial attorneys also reviewed 17,615 orders to show cause and filed 6,019 legal briefs and memoranda.

The Board of Immigration Appeals has jurisdiction over appeals in exclusion, deportation, rescission of adjustment of status, fines and visa petition cases. During the year, the Board received 2,729 cases, 1,977 of which were reviewed by the appellate trial attorneys to determine whether oral argument by the Service before the Board was necessary. There was a substantial increase of appellate trial attorney work in nearly every category. Three hundred and ninety-three cases were argued before the Board and 20 briefs and 6 motions were submitted.

Litigation

In the district courts of the United States there were 83 petitions for writ of habeas corpus and 305 declaratory judgment actions, nearly the same number as in fiscal year 1974. The district courts decided 45 habeas corpus cases favorably to the Government and 4 unfavorably. Eleven cases were withdrawn or otherwise closed. In the U.S. courts of appeals, 366 petitions for review of deportation cases were filed under Section 106 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, 8 U.S.C. 1105(a), an increase of 69 percent over fiscal year 1974. The number of cases disposed of by the courts of appeal during the fiscal year 1975 was 244; of those 204 were favorable

to the Government, 6 were unfavorable, and 34 were withdrawn or otherwise closed.

The Supreme Court decided a number of important cases in immigration and nationality matters in fiscal year 1975.

In *Reid v. INS*, 43 L.W. 4388, March 18, 1975, the Supreme Court narrowly limited the availability of relief under Section 241(f) of the Act. The Court held that immunity from deportation based on the existence of a U.S. citizen child is not available to an alien who, though he did commit a fraud in gaining entry, is charged with entry without inspection by means of a false claim to citizenship.

In *Saxbe v. Bustos*, 419 U.S. 65 (and *Cardona v. Saxbe*, 419 U.S. 65), the Supreme Court upheld the legality of the commuter system as to both daily and seasonal workers.

Four decisions were issued resolving questions arising out of the Supreme Court's 1973 decision in *Almeida-Sanchez v. United States*, 413 U.S. 266.

In *United States v. Brignoni-Ponce*, 43 L.W. 5028, June 30, 1975, the Supreme Court held that it was a violation of the Fourth Amendment for a roving patrol, without a warrant, to stop a vehicle away from the border for questioning of the occupants under Section 287(a)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act merely because they appeared to be of Mexican descent. The Court said the officer must be aware of specific articulate facts from which he drew a reasonable suspicion that there were illegal aliens in the vehicle.

In *United States v. Ortiz*, 43 L.W. 5026, June 30, 1975, the Supreme Court held that, in the absence of probable cause, it was a violation of the Fourth Amendment for Border Patrol agents at a traffic checkpoint away from the border to search an automobile without consent or probable cause. The Supreme Court stated that it was leaving undecided a number of questions, including whether checkpoints and roving patrols must be considered the same for all purposes, how far a checkpoint "inspection" of an automobile might go before it constituted a "search", and whether a warrant could issue approving checkpoint searches based only on information about the area as a whole.

In *United States v. Peltier*, 43 L.W. 4918, June 25, 1975, the Court ruled evidence seized during a Border Patrol roving patrol search of an automobile would not be suppressed even though the search was illegal under the rule in *Almeida-Sanchez v. United States*, 413 U.S. 266, decided June 21, 1973, if the search occurred before the date of that decision.

Bowen v. United States, U.S.S.C. 73-6848, June 30, 1975, held that *Almeida-Sanchez* (supra), did not apply retroactively to fixed checkpoint searches.

In two cases the Supreme Court denied certiorari leaving undisturbed circuit court decisions which rejected a contention by overstayed seamen claiming to be refugees that they could not be deported under Article 32 of the United Nations Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees: *Kan Kam Lin et al. v. Rinaldi*, 419 U.S. 874 (C.A. 3, 493 F. 2d 1229) and *Chim Ming and Lam Yim Yim v. Marks*, 43 L.W. 3551, April 15, 1975, (C.A. 2, 505 F. 2d 1170).

Im v. Bork, 43 L.W. 3326, December 10, 1974, leaves undisturbed the unreported decision of the Third Circuit Court, which affirmed the dismissal of an action by minor U.S. born children of alien visitors to enjoin deportation of their parents on the ground that deportation would constitute defacto deportation of the children in violation of their constitutional right to enjoy the benefits of U.S. citizenship.

Denial of certiorari in *Barbour v. District Director*, 419 U.S. 873, left undisturbed the Fifth Circuit Court's decision that the Service had the right in deportation proceedings to detain an alien without bond in reliance on confidential information that he represented a threat to national security.

In *DiMattina v. INS*, 419 U.S. 1088, denial of certiorari left undisturbed the decision of the Third Circuit which had rejected petitioner's contention that it was unconstitutional for the statute to bar adjustment of status for natives of the Western Hemisphere but not the Eastern Hemisphere. The court held that Congress has plenary power to determine immigration policy.

In *Cartier v. Secretary of State*, 43 L.W. 3580, April 28, 1975, denial of certiorari left undisturbed the decision by the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia (506 F. 2d 191), which rejected Cartier's contention that the Attorney General was bound to follow a decision by the Secretary of State on loss of citizenship.

A petition for certiorari filed by the Government on June 11, 1975, in *U.S. v. Martinez-Fuerte* (Supreme Court 74-1560), requested the Supreme Court to review the Ninth Circuit's holding (514 F. 2d 308) that the Fourth Amendment requires suppression of evidence obtained by Border Patrol agents at a fixed checkpoint under a "warrant of inspection" authorizing vehicle stops for interrogation without founded suspicion.

Alien Address Reports

In January 1975, a total of 4,714,005 aliens reported their addresses to this Service in accordance with the requirements set forth by the Immigration and Nationality Act (66 Stat. 163). This total represents a very slight increase over last year. Of the total, 4,225,725 were permanent resident aliens and 488,280 were visitors, students, temporary workers, and others temporarily residing in the United States.

Over three-fourths of the 4,225,725 permanent resident aliens reside in the following 8 States: California, 1,058,991 (25 percent); New York, 728,526 (17 percent); Texas, 306,383 (7 percent); Florida, 302,770 (7 percent); Illinois, 255,540 (6 percent); New Jersey, 235,249 (6 percent); Massachusetts, 162,332 (4 percent); and Michigan, 126,769 (3 percent).


In 1975, as in previous years, permanent resident Mexicans far exceeded any other nationality residing in the United States. The six major nationalities are: Mexican (868,198); Canadian (325,410); Cuban (324,729); British (289,674); Italian (222,096); and Filipino (183,402).

Citizenship

An alien can only become a naturalized citizen through the judicial process before a Federal or State court which exercises naturalization jurisdiction. Directly concerned are the general attorneys (nationality), or naturalization examiners as they are commonly known, of the Naturalization Division of the Service who play an important and significant role. These officers exercise statutory authority to conduct formal hearings to determine the alien's eligibility for naturalization and to make recommendations to the courts and, in effect, act as hearing examiners for the courts. Thus, the courts and their officials are saved much valuable time in examining the applicants and their witnesses regarding eligibility for naturalization. The naturalization examiners generally develop a close working relationship with the courts and, in a vast majority of cases, the courts accept their recommendations. As a part of the naturalization process, the Service assists with and encourages citizenship education as well as naturalization ceremonies with emphasis on making them a more meaningful and significant event for the new citizen. A means of achieving this is by holding the ceremony at a historical site or in connection with a special event.

Under past and present statutes, Certificates of Citizenship may be issued to applicants born abroad of a U.S. parent or parents, to children who have become citizens by derivation through their parents' naturalization, and to women who have become citizens by their marriage to U.S. citizens. The Service adjudicates the relating applications and, if eligibility is found, an appropriate Certificate of Citizenship is issued. When a Certificate of Naturalization or Citizenship is lost, mutilated, or destroyed, the Service issues a replacement. A special certificate may be issued on behalf of a naturalized citizen who is required by a foreign government to produce evidence of U.S. citizenship. Statutory authority exists for the cancellation of these administratively issued certificates if it is determined that such were procured by fraud or illegality, however, such cancellation under the governing statute affects only the document and

not the citizenship status of the person in whose name the document was issued.


NATURALIZATION ACTIVITIES

Persons Naturalized

The resident alien population has increased most every year since World War II and thus has generated an increase in the number of naturalization applications and the number of persons naturalized. During fiscal year 1975, 207,985 applications for naturalization were received, 11 percent more than the 187,457 received the preceding year. Persons naturalized increased by .8 percent, from 131,655 in 1974 to 141,537 this year, a high that has not been surpassed since 1956. Also contributing to the upward trend of naturalization applications is the Service's ongoing program to furnish information on the naturalization

process to educational institutions, to civic and patriotic organizations, and through Service publications.

As in past years, 80 percent or 113,289 of those naturalized filed their petitions under the section of law which requires 5 years' continuous residence in the United States. Spouses of U.S. citizens was the next largest group with 15,416 or 11 percent. Two other significant groups were the 6,214 servicemen and veterans and 6,568 children under 18 years of age, who were naturalized on petitions filed by their citizen parents. The majority of persons naturalized, 76,324 or 54 percent, came from 8 countries: Cuba (15,546), the Philippines (15,330), China and Taiwan (9,683), Italy (8,798), the United Kingdom (8,532), Greece (6,647), Korea (6,007), and Mexico (5,781). The remaining 65,213 naturalized represent some 135 other countries.

Though the naturalization examiner and clerical work force was seldom at full strength, the high volume of work accomplished was possible through better program management and increased efficiency. Also instrumental in achieving the improved results

was the creation and implementation of program priorities. Travel by examiners to lower volume courts was reduced and a lower priority was assigned to the adjudication of citizenship applications. The closing of low-volume courts further reduced expenses and travel time resulting in the more efficient use of available manpower and resources.

The recruiting and training of qualified personnel continued. One session of the Naturalization Examiners Training Course at the Officer Development Center, Port Isabel, Tex., was conducted this year, and Extension Training Program courses continued to be offered to all personnel. Additionally, many of the field offices continued to hold monthly training sessions or conferences during which new laws, regulations, court decisions, and Service procedures, policies, and programs were discussed.

The Service continued to assist and expedite the naturalization of certain groups such as servicemen and veterans, spouses of U.S. citizen servicemen accompanying or joining them abroad, and for a period of time certain Vietnamese and Cambodian aliens who required expeditious naturalization in

order to facilitate the departure of relatives from Vietnam prior to the fall of that country to communism. Special consideration and assistance were also extended to those applicants for naturalization who for health reasons were physically unable to appear in court for the naturalization proceedings. In such cases, with the court's consent and permission, the examination and the naturalization of the alien was effected at a designated location, such as at a nursing home, hospital, or residence. Continuing efforts were also made to make naturalization a more meaningful and significant event and together with the cooperation and participation of the State and Federal courts, bar associations, civic, fraternal and educational organizations, veterans organizations and their auxiliaries, and schools, the naturalization ceremonies became more memorable events for thousands of aliens. Special naturalization ceremonies commemorating Law Day, Citizenship Day, and Constitution Week were also conducted with some of these proceedings receiving television coverage. One of the more elaborate and significant ceremonies was the naturalization hearing in the Senate Chamber, State Capital, Honolulu, Hawaii, on September 17, 1974, when 187 were naturalized. Concerted efforts will be made in the forthcoming year to persuade other courts, in cooperation with bar associations and other interested organizations, to conduct more meaningful and significant naturalization ceremonies in an effort to avoid any sterile, impersonal hearings and instead make the attainment of citizenship a more pleasant and memorable event. At some of the naturalization hearings, although more noticeably in the smaller courts, the presiding judge personally greeted each new citizen, and informal coffees and receptions, sponsored by various organizations, were conducted after the naturalization hearings. In some cities, annual dinners or banquets were held in honor of newly naturalized citizens.

Special cases and events of human interest received the continued attention of the Service. One 90-year-old woman was physically unable to travel, so with the consent of the court she was naturalized in her home in New Jersey and the presiding judge presented her with her naturalization certificate. Another proud citizen received expeditious naturalization just 7 days before he was scheduled to report to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md. In one court, high school students who participated in the naturalization hearing donated a "Pledge of Allegiance" cake, and after the hearing, the presiding U.S. district court judge assisted with the cutting.

Naturalizations Denied

Of course, not all applicants for naturalization are admitted to citizenship. The Service is charged with the responsibility of examining applicants for naturalization to ensure that the eligibility requirements under the various laws have been met. As shown in the accompanying table, there were 2,300 unsuccessful petitioners, an increase of 4 percent over 1974. However, of that number there were 1,136 who for varying reasons decided to withdraw their petitions because of their inability to meet certain basic statutory requirements for naturalization; 1,053 petitioners who failed to prosecute their petitions; and 111 petitions which were denied on the merits after a court hearing. In almost all instances where petitions are denied on the merits, such as for inability to meet the educational requirements or lack of good moral character during the statutory period, the petitioners are not foreclosed permanently from seeking citizenship at some future date. Further study may enable them to comply with the educational requirement whereas, in the latter case, the naturalization laws and judicial decisions recognize the principle of reformation. The applicants who were found ineligible, either before or after filing of a petition, were advised of the corrective actions

they could take or at what point in time they would assume eligibility. Where issues of eligibility arose, they were not only advised of their right to file a petition if they chose to do so but also of their right to counsel.

Citizenship Education and Responsibility

The current Immigration and Nationality Act requires that applicants for naturalization, with certain exceptions, must demonstrate an ability to read, write, and speak English. Each applicant is also required to demonstrate a knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of the history and principles and form of Government of the United States. In furtherance of its statutory duty to assist the prospective citizens in preparing themselves for naturalization, the Service furnished public schools that conducted adult education courses the names and addresses of 158,792 newly arrived immigrants so that information on the availability of courses or programs could be furnished to them. The Service also distributed 97,849 Federal textbooks on citizenship, free of charge, to applicants attending public school classes or who were enrolled in home study courses. Also distributed free of charge to qualifying schools and organizations were the Service's 18 films, depicting, for example, the Nation's heritage and the rights and duties of citizenship.

In addition to 15,368 applicants for naturalization who were unable to meet the educational requirements when they filed their petitions, 174,171 aliens were referred to schools or were advised of the availability of home study courses. Pamphlets describing the requirements for naturalization under various sections of the law were also distributed to the public. As evidence of their desire to qualify for naturalization and become productive, useful citizens, 109,530

candidates attended public school classes and 3,557 enrolled in home study courses.

As mentioned earlier, program priorities were instituted in the latter part of calendar year 1974 by the Service to better enable it to make more efficient use of its manpower and resources and to place emphasis on higher work volume areas. The travel of naturalization examiners to citizenship classes was thereby curtailed. However, it is hoped that improved Service resources will once again enable our officers to fully perform this vital function, not only of meeting prospective candidates for citizenship but to aid and assist the instructors and teachers in whatever way possible.

The Service continued its efforts in encouraging and participating in observances of Law Day, Citizenship Day, and Constitution Week. A memorable naturalization program was held on Law Day, May 1, in Old City Hall, Philadelphia, which housed the United States Supreme Court during the early days of the American Republic. On the Fourth of July, impressive naturalization ceremonies were held at Fort McHenry, Md., the home of the Star Spangled Banner; at Thomas Jefferson's home, "Monticello", in Charlottesville, Va.; and at the Bay Front Park Auditorium in Miami, Fla.

For many aliens the greatest hurdle in attaining naturalization is passing the literacy and Government examinations. Naturalization examiners endeavor to use the utmost tact, courtesy, and consideration and exercise common sense in administering these examinations as their depth and scope should be commensurate with the alien's educational, cultural, and social background.

DERIVATIVE CITIZENSHIP

This year, 36,481 applications for Certificates of Citizenship were received and 27,731 issued. Both

categories reflected an appreciable decrease caused principally by the institution and implementation of the program priorities. The procedure by which alien parents could apply as a part of their own naturalization process for Certificates of Citizenship in behalf of eligible children was suspended. In addition, a lower priority was assigned to the issuance of Certificates of Citizenship.

Continuing in operation was the program whereby Service officers traveled to the Panama Canal Zone to conduct interviews and issue Certificates of Citizenship. The Canal Zone is the only area outside of the United States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Guam in which these certificates can be delivered. During the year more than 400 certificates were issued under the program, thus bringing total issuances to more than 4,000.

OTHER CITIZENSHIP ACTIVITIES

The procedure to replace Certificates of Naturalization and Citizenship which became lost, mutilated, or destroyed continued and 8,095 of these documents were issued in 1975. Also issued were Special Certificates of Naturalization to obtain recognition as a U.S. citizen by foreign countries and Certificates of Naturalization in changed names.

Another critically important area of the Service's responsibility is requests for determination of citizenship status involving issues of possible expatriation. Where prior findings of loss of citizenship were reversed, and where appropriate, any previously issued citizenship document was either returned or replaced. In those instances where the subject was not entitled to the issuance of any citizenship document, a record was created reflecting the Service's decision on citizenship status.

Management

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES DIVISION

The Administrative Division has responsibility for furnishing fiscal support to Service operations, maintaining records, performing statistical compilation and analysis, and the carrying forward of building, communications, equipment, and procurement programs.

Automated Data Processing Systems

In order to support the records keeping, statistical and operational functions of the Service, the Automated Data Processing Systems Branch has respon-

sibility for development and operation of various automated systems. To further the effectiveness and efficiency of these operations several important steps have been taken, in addition to the partial automation of the annual Alien Address Report.

Among these steps was the completion of detailed plans for the conversion and implementation of a fully automated master index system scheduled for completion in fiscal year 1976. The present, partially implemented, Automated Master Index System was modified so that name check requests for 4 of the 6 agencies and appropriate index records were generated for approximately 130,000 Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees. This made it possible to complete the majority of these name checks in a far shorter period of time and with much less manpower than would normally be required.

The Service's Automated Centralized Nonimmigrant Document Control System programs were streamlined so that a savings in operational costs of approximately \$65,000 were accomplished in spite of ever-increasing volumes and higher costs for computer resources. Also, in an attempt to provide further economies in operations, the Service's computer was placed on a long term lease-purchase plan which will provide approximately \$24,000 savings in fiscal year 1976 and further economies in future years.

A long range ADP plan has also been formulated to insure the orderly development of automated systems and application is consistent with resources which the Service anticipates will be made available.

Engineering

Construction, space planning, and the reformation of substandard facilities form a substantial part of the Service building programs workload.

During the year, several construction projects were implemented and new space was acquired for the relocation of district offices in Anchorage, Alaska, and Philadelphia, Pa., and the suboffice in Boise, Idaho.

Legislation was passed to increase the amount authorized to be expended to provide facilities along the border for enforcement of the Customs and Immigration laws (19 USC 68, as amended) from \$100,000 to \$200,000 for each construction project.

Requirements and plans for various border station facilities and residences, numbering 29 in all, are in the process of being reviewed by this Service together with the General Services Administration.

Collaboration with the other inspection agencies, airport authorities, etc., continues in the planning of

inspection facilities for new and existing airports. During the year, 26 airports received attention.

Throughout the year the Service maintained a continuous review of its communications systems to insure maximum capability and reliability, and to provide a higher degree of officer safety. During the year, projects were completed in upgrading 275 radio communication base stations at a cost of \$685,000 and initiating 196 mobile radios at a cost of approximately \$276,000. In addition, numerous other contracts were awarded and purchase orders issued to insure continued effectiveness of the Service's essential communications network.

The Electronics Section of the Engineering Branch also monitored the effectiveness of the Service's Intrusion Detection System along the United States-Mexican border. Having proven to be an excellent program to augment the Service's enforcement efforts, contracts for additional systems were awarded during the year and 50-line sensors were purchased for use on both the Southern and Northern borders.

Finance

The role of the Finance Branch is to undertake the responsibility for prescribing, publishing, and implementing Servicewide procedures concerning fiscal matters.

In so doing, a total of 877,341 remittances were received and collections of fees, fines, etc., rose to \$17,441,256, an increase of 4.1 percent over last year. Collections from carriers of extra compensation for night, Sunday, and holiday inspection duties by immigration officers and employees summed up to \$5,587,058. Approved payment for all types of contractual obligations, taxes withheld, imprest fund replenishments, refunds, and claims resulted in 75,927 vouchers examined, totaling \$188,171,906 in expenditures.

Management Improvement and Forms Control

Continuous attention to improved work methods, streamlining or changing existing procedures, reducing paper work wherever possible, and maximum utilization of manpower are the prime duties of the Management Analysis Branch in administering the Management Improvement Program of the Service.

During the past fiscal year, 12 I, N, and G forms were eliminated and 14 created. Regional forms canceled during the year totaled 7, while 4 regional forms were created. In the Central Office 6 forms were created and 10 eliminated.

Suggestions adopted under the Forms Improvement Program totaled 19 of the 38 suggestions submitted by Service employees.

Management Improvement projects consist of an extensive review of the Service's procedures relating to the internal control over security-type forms resulting in the issuance of guidelines for the maintenance of accountability and responsibility for these documents. The prompt implementation of the guidelines insured that security forms will be processed under strict and uniform procedures.

Property Management and Office Services

During fiscal year 1975, a number of important projects were launched and contracts awarded in areas unique to the Service. Contracts were awarded to support the growing Research and Development Program of the Service, as were contracts relating to the extensive Alien Documentation Identification and Telecommunications System (ADIT) and facets of the illegal alien study.

Annual replacement of motor vehicles and aircraft were made. With the addition of 50 sedans and 45 trucks, the automotive fleet now exceeds 2,000 vehicles. With the purchase of 2 additional aircraft, the Service now has 28 units available to enhance our enforcement efforts.

Records Administration and Information

The Records Administration and Information Branch received and processed 4,714,005 Alien Address Report Cards (Form I-53). With the centralization of these cards, an address index is available for search in the Central Office. Prior to this time, a search of each File Control Office was required for a record relating to an alien who filed his card in January.

Over 10 million arrivals and departures were processed through the Automated Centralized Non-immigrant Document Control System during fiscal year 1975. The computerized system was utilized to process all visas received at ports of entry throughout the United States, and the relating immigrant data was stored in the Automated Master Index System.

The efficient handling of records, which encompassed the disposing of 3,040 cubic feet and the transferring of 7,023 cubic feet of records, generated considerable storage space equivalent to 1,342 five-drawer file cabinets.

The continued increasing volume of inquiries at offices throughout the Service, either in writing or telephonically, or by personal appearance at infor-

mation desks, has become an overwhelming burden on limited manpower resources at nearly all of the offices. Over 8 million telephonic and personal inquiries were received during the year at our information centers. In some locations this heavy volume has unfortunately resulted in unduly long waiting lines, and the inability of Service employees to offer desired expeditious service.

Statistics

Timely and accurate compilation of statistics relating to the work performed in accomplishing the Service's mission is the prime concern of the Statistics Branch. Once generated, the Service's Work Measurement Report System aids first line supervisors and program managers in the effective allocation of manpower and resources. This reporting system, which shows the man-hours expended and work units completed, is used to evaluate program effectiveness, estimate cost of operation, prepare the budget, plan personnel actions, and measure overall productivity.

The second major collection of statistical data pertains to immigration, naturalization, nonimmigrants, passenger travel, alien address reports, and Service actions relating to aliens. Tables compiled from this data base are contained in this report, which is the principal publication of the Service. Additionally, the "Report of Passenger Travel Between the United States and Foreign Countries", issued monthly, semiannually, and annually, is available on a subscription basis. The latter report is a compilation of data on sea and air travel by aliens and U.S. citizens.

Statistical information is prepared regularly for branches of the Service, as well as other Government agencies. Requests for statistical data are numerous

and come from various sources, including Congress, foreign governments, publishers, industry, private organizations, and the general public.

Personnel

The restructured Central Office Personnel Division provided emphasis and leadership in the area of personnel program design, development, and monitoring during fiscal year 1975. Some of the major accomplishments include redelegations of personnel management authority to the regions for all field positions with the exception of a few key positions. The regions, in turn, have redelegated some of their new authority down to the districts and sectors.

The division, as a result of developing procedures to substantially reduce the amount of time required to fill position vacancies, has a new work force reporting system throughout the Service. The Service now has the capability of determining projected recruitment and attrition levels on a monthly basis, by office location and occupational category.

Through contact with numerous clubs, organizations, and Career Days at high schools and colleges, the various recruiting efforts used Servicewide con-

cerning the utilization of women, minorities, and youths have been expanded.

During fiscal year 1975, a total of 1,711 training completions occurred among the men and women comprising the Service's work force who participated in a variety of internal training programs. For these internal training programs, which were 8 or more hours in duration, a total of nearly 400,000 "enrollee hours" were expended at an economical cost of \$2.40 per hour.

In addition to the internal training programs, over 3,000 hours were expended in interagency training

and nearly 2,400 hours were expended by Service employees at nongovernment training facilities.

The Service and the National Border Patrol Council and National Council of I&NS Locals signed an agreement on April 29, 1975.

Two classes of Border Patrol agents entered on duty during the fiscal year. There were 166 of the grand total, 390, starting in November 1974 and the remaining 224 graduating in April 1975. For the first time in the 50-year history of the Border Patrol the spring class contained 5 women and 87 Spanish-surnamed trainees.
