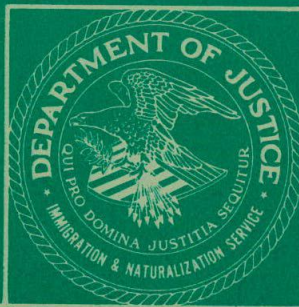

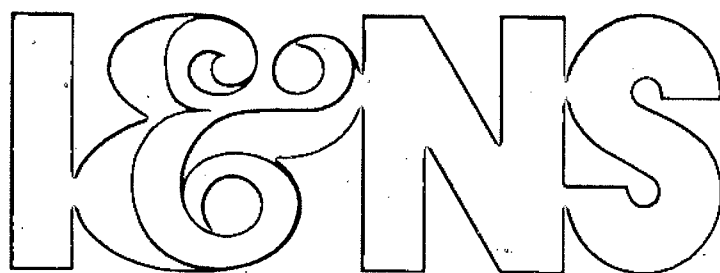

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REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION

General

The Immigration and Naturalization Service (I&NS) administers and enforces Federal immigration and nationality laws—a complex body of statutes governing and regulating alien admission, traffic, and benefits. As shown in this report, the magnitude of this task is enormous, requiring the consistent effort of I&NS management and personnel to streamline Service administrative, systems planning, and program implementation functions through the introduction of new and developing technologies, policies, and procedures.

The broad range of Service responsibilities is formidable, and includes: inspection for determination of alien admissibility into the United States; adjudication of requests for benefits under the law; prevention of illegal entry into the United States; investigation, apprehension, and removal of aliens found to be in violation of the law; and the examination of applicants wishing to be naturalized.

While enforcement of immigration laws constituted a substantial portion of I&NS activity, effort, and resources in fiscal 1976 and the July–September 1976 transition quarter, naturalization processes took on special significance and required considerable effort on the part of a substantially reduced workforce during the Bicentennial year. In gearing up for and celebrating America's 200th birthday, I&NS became a focal point in the national observance of our heritage and foundations—one of diversified origins, visions, and beliefs of migrant people from all quarters of the world.

Naturalization proceedings in fiscal year 1976 and the transition quarter highlighted the Bicentennial celebrations and were accented by specially designed certificates, displays, and programs. Of particular significance was nationwide television coverage of mass proceedings, many of which were held outside the

courtroom at sites of historical interest and importance. Here great care had to be taken to preserve the inherent dignity and intent of this legal ceremony, requiring the full cooperation, coordination, and efforts of I&NS, the courts, civic and patriotic groups, and the media as well.

These activities, and the activities and responsibilities of the various other Service organizational units, are further depicted in the subsequent pages of this report.

Office of the Deputy Commissioner

Accomplishment of the Service's mission with optimum efficiency and effectiveness has always been a top priority of agency management. The Office of the Deputy Commissioner is the operational center for the efficient achievement of these goals.

On-line responsibility for the effectual management of Service activities has been entrusted to the Associate Deputy Commissioner for Planning and Evaluation; and to the support offices of Intelligence; Field Inspections; and Internal Investigations, which have reported directly to the Deputy Commissioner since Service reorganization in 1975.

PLANNING AND EVALUATION

The Office of Planning and Evaluation is responsible for the operative efficiency of the Service, and is comprised of Research and Development, Systems Planning, Program Planning, Program Evaluation, and Social Science Research Branches. Supervision of Branch Chiefs and functional activities is entrusted to the Director of Planning and the Director of Evaluation, who report directly to the Associate Deputy Commissioner.

The duties attributed to this Office include full accountability for the development, review, and evalu-

ation of policies, programs, systems, and structures, as well as goal formulation and execution. Further responsibility is extended to the effective utilization of resources, the cogent assessment and establishment of future functional requirements and mission objectives, and the reconciliation of special managerial problem areas to insure congruence with mission objectives.

The Research and Development Branch was heavily involved in selectively initiating programs defined in the 1975 R&D Plan. The most important of these relate to techniques of preventing illegal intrusions between ports of entry. Among the many programs illustrating the significant advances made by the Research and Development Branch during its second year of operation were: (1) laboratory proof of techniques for detecting persons hidden in autos, vans, railroad cars, etc.; (2) concept development of remote video systems for remotely monitoring vehicular traffic at unguarded roads; (3) evaluation of long range radar devices for the detection and tracking of personnel and vehicles; (4) comparative evaluation of the effectiveness of helicopters in detections and apprehensions; (5) experimentation with space satellites serving as relays to

enhance vehicular and sensor communications; (6) analysis of the potential value of remotely piloted balloons for carrying sensors and communications relays; and (7) development of a computer simulation of Border Patrol linewatch for the evaluation of technological and budgetary alternatives. In addition, the Research and Development Branch established significant interchanges with the R&D activities of the Army, Navy, Treasury, Drug Enforcement Agency, and various industrial and professional associations.

The Systems Planning Branch is responsible for the formulation of long range ADP plans, the evaluation of systems performance, the initial administration of new systems projects, and the concept development of systems design. Among the many projects initiated by Systems Planning during fiscal year 1976 were: (1) distribution of the initial draft of a long range ADP plan to I&NS managers; (2) initiation of a Program Information Requirements Study for the evaluation and analysis of the information needs of program managers; (3) initiation of plans for integrating the I&NS system of tracking fines with the Vessel Violation Profile system, a subsystem of the Treasury En-

forcement Communication System (TECS); (4) completion of the initial administration phase of the Alien Documentation, Identification, and Telecommunications System Project (ADIT), with the hiring of an ADIT program manager, for the production of the new alien identification cards; and (5) initiation of plans for the testing of remote access from the I&NS field offices to the Central Index of Alien Files in Washington, D.C., ultimately turning over final design and implementation responsibility to the Automated Data Processing Systems Branch of the Information Services Division.

The Program Planning Branch is primarily involved in basic resource analysis and budget preparation. Early in fiscal year 1976, the staff completed the installation of the Commissioner's Planning System (COMPS) to link Service resource requests with objectives. This was followed by the design and implementation of a Servicewide Integrated Planning System, which refined and extended COMPS capabilities by allowing for forward planning, resource planning, budget execution, management conferences, and program analysis. This system has been of great benefit to the Service in its efforts to identify and budget for critical Service needs and to channel I&NS efforts in new, directed, and purposeful ways through the development of long range forecasts and short term impact plans.

The Program Evaluation Branch is responsible for evaluating the effectiveness and efficiency of all I&NS programs. The Branch's functions include design of evaluative research; review and evaluation of program structure, content, impact, and effectiveness; and development of alternative programs. The Branch is charged with determining the relationship between input and output for each of the Service's programs and for developing data gathering mechanisms which will allow program managers to continually judge the effectiveness and efficiency of their programs. In fiscal year 1976, the Investigations casework and the Adjudications programs were the subjects of evaluations. Evaluations of the Inspections and the Detention and Deportation programs were also initiated.

The Social Science Research Branch was involved in several major projects during the fiscal year. Perhaps the most important of these was the Illegal Alien Study, which itself consists of several studies designed to estimate the size, characteristics, flow, and impact of the undocumented alien population. The Fraudulent Entrants Study and the Border Patrol Staffing and Sensor Reporting Experiments, both parts of the Illegal Alien Study, were initiated during September

1975. The results of the Fraudulent Entrants Study indicate that during 1975, over 500,000 illegal entries were successfully made into the United States at airports and Southern land border ports of entry. The results of the year-long Border Patrol experiments will be analyzed during fiscal year 1977. Additionally, a final design was developed for the major Residential Survey which will provide a major portion of the data necessary on undocumented aliens, and the development of this study was initiated late in the year. Another major project was the review of the present I&NS Work Measurement System, undertaken jointly with the Statistics Branch to evaluate the utilization of existing information and the needs of program managers for additional data.

In September 1975, under the new regional organization, offices of Planning and Evaluation were also established in each of the Service's four regions, under the general direction of the Deputy Regional Commissioners. During the first year of operation, the regional P&E staffs were involved primarily in resource analysis and budget preparation, including forward planning and COMPS objective formulation. The P&E staffs in each region also became involved in regional program evaluations, organizational studies, and regional projects which crossed activity lines. The extension of the planning and evaluation function to the regions has served to greatly enhance regional capabilities in budget and objective formulation as well as program management and evaluation at that level.

INTELLIGENCE

The mission of the Immigration and Naturalization Service Intelligence Unit is the formulation of policies and procedures for the collection, production, and utilization of tactical and strategic intelligence in support of the various Service operating and management functions. The Intelligence program sustains the entire Service in the conduct of this mission by combating organized alien smuggling, counterfeited immigration documents, false claims to citizenship, and other immigration fraud. The Intelligence Unit also plays a vital role in the prevention of international terrorists and narcotics traffic and activities in the United States.

Terrorism has become a major national and international problem. The concurrent Canadian Olympics and U.S. Bicentennial caused an unprecedented flow of alien visitors to the Western Hemisphere and unusually heavy traffic along the eastern portion of the U.S.-Canadian border. To combat the terrorists threat during this time, the Border Patrol

Sector Headquarters in Swanton, Vt., was designated as the Liaison Communication Center for coordinating antiterrorist efforts during the summer of 1976. The Center functioned on a 24-hour-a-day basis from June 1 through August 30, 1976, and was operated jointly with the U.S. Customs Service. Further, the Intelligence Unit established an Immigration Intelligence Center at the Washington, D.C., Central Office, which served as the focal point for processing and assessing terrorist threat information funneled through the Swanton Liaison Center and other Government agencies.

The El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC), operated jointly with the Drug Enforcement Agency, continued its 24-hour-a-day operations in support of enforcement activities. Studies were launched to cultivate optimum utilization of EPIC and the PATHFINDER data base capabilities which provide extensive information on narcotics violators, illegal aircraft violators, organized alien smuggling and counterfeiting rings.

Furthermore, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of State Passport and Visa Offices, I&NS expanded its training activities for the detection of fraudulent I&NS documents and identities, counterfeited or altered U.S. passports and visas, and foreign passports. This training program for I&NS Intelligence Officers and operational personnel is expected to generate continued enhancement of I&NS capabilities in the detection and apprehension of counterfeiters, vendors, and users of fraudulent documents. According to data compiled at the Fraudulent Document Center of EPIC, the number of documented false claims to U.S. citizenship averaged 156 per month, a slight decrease from the number detected and reported in fiscal year 1975.

FIELD INSPECTIONS

The Field Inspections Unit is engaged in the surveying of Service field offices. These on-site surveys serve to provide the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner, and Associate Commissioners with independent, objective, and constructive appraisals of the consistency, efficiency, and economy with which operational responsibilities are being performed. They further serve to assure compliance with and proper implementation of the I&NS priority program.

During fiscal year 1976, on-site surveys of 12 districts and 3 Border Patrol sectors were completed, with additional surveys of 4 districts and 3 Border Patrol sectors accomplished during the transition quarter. Among the many advances resulting from the execu-

tion of these surveys were: (1) elimination or reduction of overtime through scheduling improvements for Inspection and Deportation activities; (2) reduction of travel time for naturalization examiners by combining petition filing and final hearing dates; (3) increased productivity through the elimination of excessive clerical review and reduction of officer review of adjudications applications, as well as through the scheduling of large group rather than individual interviews of Indo-Chinese refugee cases; (4) improvements in traffic flow and inspection quality as a result of changes in primary inspection procedures; and (5) the reduction of Investigations backlogs and Naturalization processing delays by eliminating mandatory referrals of certain categories of cases by naturalization examiners to Investigations.

INTERNAL INVESTIGATIONS

Internal Investigations is a special investigations Unit located at the Central Office. Its primary function is to assist the Deputy Commissioner, to whom it reports directly, in the promotion and maintenance of the integrity of all I&NS programs, activities, and personnel.

The general functions of the Unit are reception and review of information or allegations of misconduct on the part of Service employees at all levels. The results of all investigations of alleged malfeasance, misfeasance, or failure to comply with laws, regulations, orders, or applicable standards are reported and filed with the Deputy Commissioner and, when appropriate, with the Regional Commissioner, U.S. attorney, and States attorney. Through the year, numerous investigations of alleged employee misconduct were completed by the unit, with the resulting determination that the vast majority of the allegations were unfounded.

Examinations

INSPECTIONS

The Inspections Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service administers immigration and nationality laws with respect to the inspection for admission of all persons arriving at ports of entry in the 50 States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Guam. It also administers the preinspection of persons departing from preclearance facilities in Canada, Bermuda, and the Bahamas for entry into the United States. Immigration inspectors determine the nation-

ality of each person seeking admission. If a person is determined to be an alien, the Immigration inspector conducts an examination and concludes whether the alien is eligible for admission into the United States. In fiscal year 1976, 272.2 million persons were inspected for entry into the United States. Of this figure, 164 million were aliens.

Of the 272.2 million total persons inspected in fiscal year 1976, 20,728,669 arrived by air; 5,064,487 by sea; and 246,381,949 by land at border ports. These figures represent a slight decrease by sea, a fractional increase by air, and a 4-percent increase by land at border ports, when compared to these categories in fiscal year 1975.

The Inspections Division is the keystone of effective immigration law administration, with policies and procedures designed to facilitate the entry of aliens who meet the qualifications set by law and to deny entry

to those aliens unqualified for admission. This responsibility extends to support and control programs keyed to alien compliance with Federal statutes and lawful conduct of immigrant and nonimmigrant aliens. During fiscal year 1976, Inspections personnel successfully undertook functional responsibilities for overseeing compliance with the strict controls individually placed on the 10.3 million nonimmigrant aliens, including 2,644,929 crewmen, who entered the United States on a temporary basis.

As an indication of the emphasis and importance given the enforcement function, 840,871 aliens were found to be inadmissible by immigration inspectors in fiscal year 1976, which represents an increase of 50,639 aliens denied entry over last year. Furthermore, during the transition quarter, entry was refused to an additional 253,497 aliens who did not exhibit the necessary qualifications for admissions.

In addition to the enforcement requirements inherent in the Inspections Program, there is equally strong pressure to facilitate entry of qualified aliens. Due to the continual increase in entry applications, the broadening of the Inspections function, and the chronic shortage of manpower, the response to both enforcement and facilitation pressures has been less than adequate. To reconcile workload inflation within the bounds of a static workforce, the Service was forced to assign priorities to the conduct of inspections. Issuance of border crossing cards at land border ports was curtailed to meet the demands of increased traffic. The ratio of air passengers examined by each inspector had to be increased with resultant processing delays encountered by arriving passengers at all international airports. Despite the delays, over 14 million more aliens and U.S. citizens were inspected and admitted in fiscal year 1976 than in the previous year. In addition, 80 million inspections were conducted during the transition quarter, which represents an increase of 1.6 million over the same period last year.

When the task of denying entry to ineligible applicants comes into serious conflict with the duty of expeditious facilitation of qualified applicants, the scales must tip toward the Inspection enforcement responsibilities. Internal studies illustrate the seriousness of this challenge to Service administration: the Fraudulent Entrants Study noted that as many as 500,000 aliens successfully entered the United States through the use of fraudulent documents or claims to admissibility. Furthermore, these half-million undocumented aliens are but a small segment of the growing undocumented alien population.

Drug Interdiction

Due to mounting pressures on all inspection agencies to eliminate illicit drug traffic, immigration inspectors contributed significantly to the interception and seizure of contraband, particularly narcotics and dangerous drugs. In fiscal year 1976, the interception of \$61 million in illicit drugs was attributed to immigration inspectors at ports of entry, a four-fold increase over fiscal year 1975. At San Ysidro, Calif., an immigration inspector in training was responsible for the interception of 31 pounds of heroin with a street value of \$11 million, representing the largest drug seizure ever made at this border station. Similarly, immigration inspectors have been responsible for the interception of several suspected terrorists, identified through the introduction of special liaison programs, who have applied for, but were denied, entry into the United States.

Admissions

Immigrants

In fiscal year 1976, 305,071 immigrants were admitted into the United States at ports of entry. Of the aliens already in the United States, 81,981 had their status adjusted to that of permanent residents. Additionally, 11,534 conditional entrants entered as refugees under the seventh preference and 373 were adjusted in the United States under the proviso to Section 203(a) (7).

During the transition quarter, 81,974 immigrants were admitted; 19,594 already in the United States had their status adjusted to permanent residents; and 2,108 entered conditionally under the seventh preference as refugees.

In fiscal year 1976, approximately 54 percent of all immigrants were nationals of eight countries: 57,863 came from Mexico; 37,281 from the Philippines; 30,803 from Korea; 29,233 from Cuba; 18,823 from China or Taiwan; 17,487 from India; 12,526 from the Dominican Republic; and 11,392 from the United Kingdom.

For the first time in 13 years, more immigrants indicated an intention to reside in the State of California than in New York. Seventy-two percent of these aliens gave their State of intended residence in the following seven States: California (88,700); New York (85,928); Illinois (27,497); Florida (25,182); New Jersey (24,905); Texas (23,805); and Massachusetts (12,493).

Of the 398,613 immigrants admitted or adjusted in fiscal year 1976, 213,750 were female, and 184,863

male. Sixty-three percent of the total were under 30 years of age.

The October 3, 1965, amendment to the Immigration and Nationality Act which became effective on December 1, 1965, separates immigrants into two major groupings: those subject to numerical limitations and those not numerically restricted. Nearly three-quarters of the immigrants were of the numerically limited group, comprised of seven preference categories and the nonpreference categories of the Eastern Hemisphere and Western Hemisphere classes.

For the Eastern Hemisphere, there is an annual ceiling of 170,000 aliens who may be issued immigrant visas, have their status adjusted to that of permanent residents, or enter conditionally as refugees. Within that 170,000 ceiling, there is a limit of 20,000 from any one country and a maximum of 200 from any one dependent area. These numbers are allocated on the basis of seven preference categories, four of which provide for the reunion of families of U.S. citizens and resident aliens; with two additional preference categories for professional, skilled, or unskilled alien workers needed in the United States; and one for refugees. Also, qualified nonpreference immigrants are issued numbers not used by the seven preferences. During the transition quarter, the numerical ceiling was 42,500 with a limit of 5,000 per country.

In fiscal year 1976, 102,007 close relatives were admitted under the first, second, fourth, and fifth preferences. Admitted under the third preference were 8,318 aliens who were members of the professions or who possessed exceptional abilities in the sciences or arts. An additional 4,792 aliens were admitted under the sixth preference to fill positions requiring skilled or unskilled workers. The spouses and children of aliens admitted under the two occupational categories numbered 13,251 in fiscal year 1976. A total of 11,907 seventh preference refugees were also admitted or adjusted to permanent residents, and nonpreference aliens numbered 25,775 during this year.

Applicants for conditional entry are processed as refugees under the seventh preference in Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Lebanon, and the Crown Colony of Hong Kong. In addition, pursuant to the proviso to Section 203(a) (7) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, certain persons who have established refugee qualifications and have been physically present in the United States on a continuous basis for a minimum of 2 years are eligible to apply for lawful permanent resident status. This year, 373 such refugees became permanent residents.

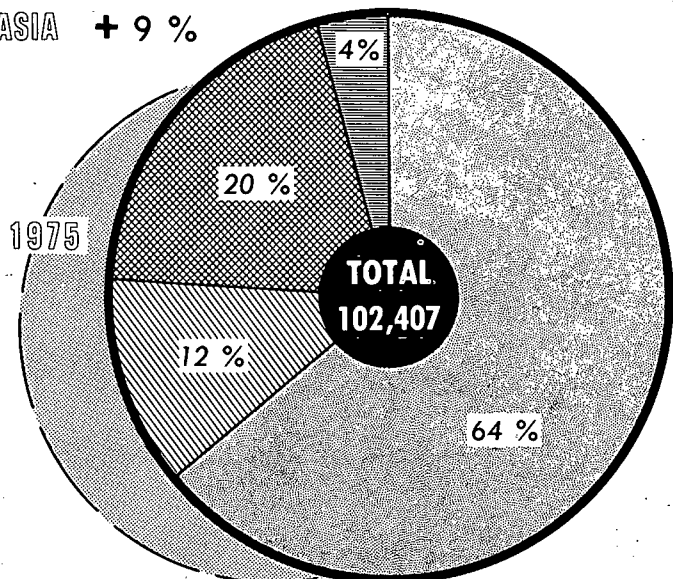
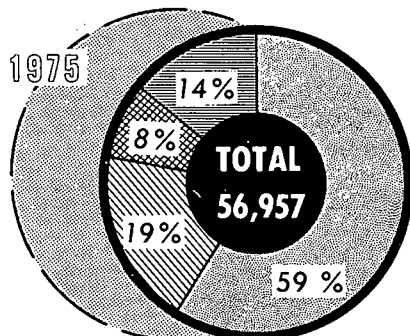
PREFERENCE AND NONPREFERENCE IMMIGRANTS ADMITTED *

For immigration purposes, the law considers natives of the Western Hemisphere, their spouses and children classifiable as "special immigrants." Since July 1, 1968, there has also been an annual numerical limitation of 120,000 natives of the Western Hemisphere, their spouses and children, with no individual country restrictions of preferences within that total. The numbers are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis in the order of establishment of visa qualifications. However, if one spouse may be charged to the Eastern Hemisphere quotas by virtue of birth, the other spouse and children may also be so charged if doing so is to their benefit. During the year, 118,569 immigrant visas were issued, subject to numerical limitations of the Western Hemisphere. The balance of 113,840 immigrants were not subject to numerical limitations. Of these, 107,033 were immediate relatives (spouses, children, or parents) of U.S. citizens. Among the other classes without numerical limitations are certain employees or honorably retired former employees of the U.S. Government abroad, their accompanying spouses, and unmarried, minor children. Ministers of

religious denominations, their spouses, and unmarried, minor children are also eligible under this class.

Refugee Programs

The Service concluded inspection requirements for the Indochinese program which brought over 135,000 Indochinese refugees to the United States in fiscal year 1975-76. Temporary processing posts at Guam and Wake Island, at which immigration officers were stationed, were closed in October 1975. Stateside processing centers at Camp Pendleton, Calif.; Fort Chaffee, Ark.; Eglin AFB, Fla.; and Camp Indiantown Gap, Pa.; wound up their activities toward the end of calendar year 1975.

During fiscal year 1976, 2,341 Cuban refugees were paroled into the United States. Most of the parolees were persons managing to leave Cuba for another country, and were the parents, spouses, or children of permanent resident aliens or refugees in the United States.

Political Asylum

The Service, in collaboration with the Department of State, adopted procedures ensuring the principles

of asylum inherent in "The United Nations Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees" and in Articles 2 through 24 of the 1951 Geneva Convention. Every precaution is taken to ensure that anyone requesting asylum is given an opportunity to fully present his case, with explicit prohibition against forcible return of refugees to conditions of persecution. In fiscal year 1976, 2,733 aliens requested asylum, of which 590 requests were granted.

The Commuter Program

In *Saxbe v. Bustos*, 419 U.S. 65 of November 1974, the Supreme Court upheld the I&NS practice of ad-

mitting daily and seasonal commuters as lawful permanent residents returning from temporary absences abroad. The 5-4 decision upheld the legality of the program, reaffirmed the commuter's immigrant status, and refused to differentiate between "seasonal" and "daily" commuters. Despite the straightforward decision, admission of commuters will continue to pose some problems for Service personnel.

While there are only about 64,000 aliens with commuter status, the frequency with which they cross the border gives them a much larger proportion of admissions than their numbers suggest. For generations, foreign nationals have crossed our borders daily to work in the United States and then return home. The seasonal program has been a much more recent development, with origins traced back to 1943; however, it acquired its importance with the termination of the Bracero Program in 1964. Seasonal commuters who work only part of each year in the United States and hold Alien Registration Receipt Cards are provided special documentation, but they number less than 15 percent of the commuting total.

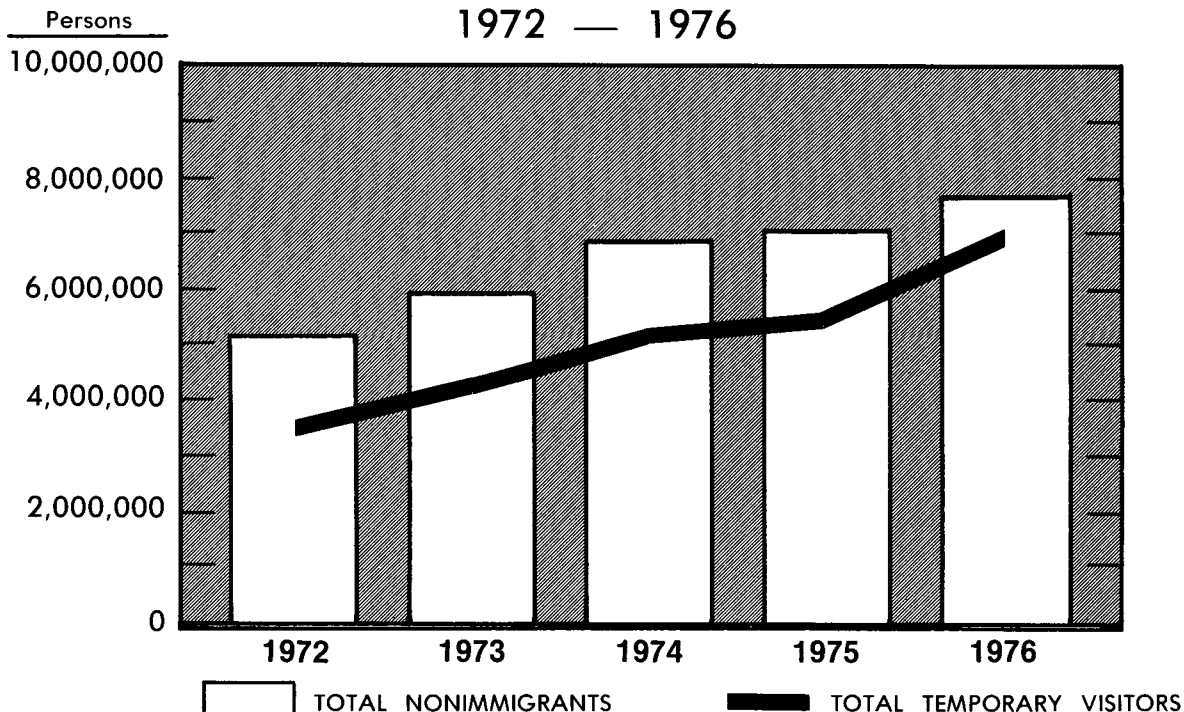
The commuter is required initially to obtain an immigrant visa, and is charged to an appropriate numerical ceiling. The visa is presented at a port of entry where an Alien Registration Receipt Card is issued. Both daily and seasonal commuters are also given a card stamped with the number of a month, 6 months from date of issuance, which they are to show with Alien Registration Receipt Cards on crossing the border. At the end of each 6-month period, their employment status is reaffirmed by the Service to assure maintenance of status, with additional cards issued and validated upon proof of eligibility.

Nonimmigrants

An alien who comes to the United States for a temporary period is called a nonimmigrant. Included in this group are: diplomats and their families, attendants, servants, and personal employees; visitors for business or pleasure; aliens transiting through the United States; treaty traders and investors; students; representatives to international organizations and their families, attendants, servants, and personal employees; NATO representatives; temporary workers or trainees; fiancé(e)s of U.S. citizens; representatives of foreign information media; exchange visitors; intra-company transferees; as well as spouses and children of aliens in several aforementioned categories. Exclusive of citizens of Canada and Mexico who enter as border crossers, and alien crewmen, a total of 7,654,491

1972 — 1976



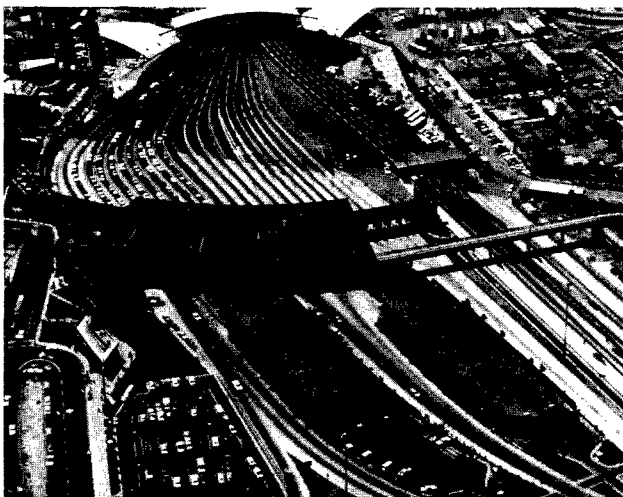
documented nonimmigrants came to the United States in fiscal year 1976.

During the transition quarter, 2,673,652 nonimmigrants entered the United States.

As in years past, visitors for pleasure in fiscal year 1976 comprised the largest segment of documented nonimmigrants, numbering 5,513,255 or 72 percent of

the total. Next in the order of volume were 583,638 visitors for business, representing 8 percent of the total. Other significant classes were 121,317 foreign students attending educational institutions, who were accompanied or followed by 11,696 spouses and children. At the close of the fiscal year, the inventory of foreign students in the United States totaled 116,333. Also, 44,486 exchange visitors were admitted to participate in Government or privately sponsored programs designed to further international cultural exchange, followed or accompanied by their 18,279 spouses and children.

Four classes of nonimmigrants were admitted temporarily for employment, all of which required visa petitions establishing eligibility as detailed in the Non-immigrant Visa Petition section. Admitted in fiscal year 1976 were 14,831 "H-1" workers who performed services requiring distinguished merit and ability; 29,778 "H-2" employees who performed temporary services of labor for which, upon certification by the Department of Labor, qualified labor could not be found in this country; and 2,778 "H-3" trainees. Spouses and children of these three classifications numbered 9,161. In addition, intracompany "L-1" transferees comprised the fourth class of nonimmigrants.

grants, numbering 15,112 during fiscal year 1976. This group rendered managerial, executive, or other specialized skills to their international firms or corporations. They were followed or accompanied by 11,175 spouses and children.

As shown in the accompanying table of Nonimmigrants Admitted, all but six classes reflected an increase in admissions.

ADJUDICATIONS

The Adjudications Division exercises authority for the decision-making functions of the Service which relate to more than 30 actions connected with the granting or revocation of benefit privileges under immigration laws.

Long standing difficulties in the acquisition, training, and retention of experienced adjudicator personnel continue to plague Service efforts in effecting prompt, efficient applications work. However, due to administrative persistence, some notable alternatives and solutions were achieved.

The Adjudications Task Force Study completed in late Spring 1976 was a marked success. The Study resulted in the adoption and, in many cases, implementation of a number of promising recommendations aimed at isolating and identifying program deficiencies and problems. At varying stages of implementation

are: Adjudications Remote Processing (a redistribution of workloads from district offices to underutilized ports of entry); On-Site Inspections (of field offices by supervisory personnel); Fraud Detection Program; Quality Control Program; Adjudications Operations Monitoring Report (computerized work measurement report); Optimum Procedures (streamlined processing); and a Clerical Handbook.

Two fiscal year 1975 programs were continued through the period to provide assistance in husbanding the Service's limited resources. The first was the Commissioner's priorities program which, with some small modifications, provided guidelines for channelling available resources into the most productive areas. The second was a corrective regulatory action withdrawing extension authorization to B-2 nonimmigrants for pleasure, here on temporary stay. Since this program was implemented late in fiscal year 1975, fiscal year 1976 provided the first full period for gaging the full impact of this regulatory amendment, and revealed a decline in the number of applications for extension of temporary stay from 393,139 in fiscal year 1975 to 269,873 in fiscal year 1976.

Overall adjudications receipts declined for the second consecutive year, and reflected a drop of 196,868, or decrease of 14 percent, over the previous year. This decline in receipts was attributable to Service efforts in decreasing extensions of stay and to border crossing card limitation programs.

Once again, operational emphasis was placed on the quality of work production rather than indiscriminate pursuit of record completions. Fraud detection activities were expanded and intensified, resulting in a net drop in completions and negating the advantages gained from the decline of receipts. Consequently, work arrearages worsened, with 222,335 backlogged reports at the close of business for the transition quarter on September 30, 1976.

In response to budgetary requests by I&NS, Congress authorized 122 additional examiner positions for fiscal year 1977. Coupled with an energetic application of the Adjudications Remote Processing program as delineated in the Adjudications Task Force Study, foundations were laid for a two-thirds overall reduction in applications arrearages during fiscal year 1977 and for assumption of a current work position in the following fiscal year.

Nonimmigrant Visa Petitions

Visa petitions must be filed with and approved by the Service for certain classes of nonimmigrants. Upon

receipt of an approved petition by a United States consular office, a nonimmigrant visa may be issued to the alien claiming to be in one of the classes, which are described in the paragraphs that follow.

The "H" classification covers aliens who perform services of an exceptional nature requiring outstanding merit or ability (H-1), those who will perform temporary services for which qualified labor cannot be found (H-2), and trainees (H-3). The "L" classification is for an intracompany transferee coming to continue to render his services to the same employer or a subsidiary or affiliate thereof in a capacity that is managerial, executive, or involves specialized knowledge. Approved petitions in those categories exhibited a decline from 33,067 in fiscal year 1975 to 28,363 in fiscal year 1976, attributed to the spotty economic situations prevalent during the period.

A visa petition is also required for an alien fiance(e) of a United States citizen who seeks to enter the United States solely to conclude a valid marriage with the petitioner within 90 days after entry. Extreme care is taken in the adjudication of these petitions since "K" applicants have shown a high incidence of fraud. Yearly receipts rose from 11,868 to 12,104 during the reporting period.

Immigrant Visa Petitions

The immigration laws are so structured as to restrict the number of immigrants who may take up lawful permanent residence in the United States during the course of a year; 170,000 natives of Eastern Hemisphere countries and 120,000 from the Western Hemisphere are accorded this privilege annually. However, spouses, children, and parents of United States citizens are classified as immediate relatives and exempted from numerical limitations. Furthermore, within the limitations, preference categories have been provided for certain family members of United States citizens and permanent residents, as well as certain professional or occupationally skilled aliens.

A visa petition must be approved by the Service certifying satisfactory demonstration of the required relationship or occupational skill in order to establish exemption or preference eligibility. In dealing with these petitions, an inordinate amount of fraud, particularly in relation to claimed marriages, has been uncovered. Whole armies of "marriage arrangers" prey upon these aliens desperately seeking admission to the country. For a fee, partners are provided and marriages contracted to establish eligibility under the statutes for visa issuance benefits. A considerable por-

tion of the Service's resources is expended to search out and expose the perpetrators and participants in such sham marriages.

Relative visa petitions received during fiscal year 1976 is listed at 206,319, down from the 224,012 shown last year. Credit for this reduction is given to the increased efforts in fraud detection.

A significant degree of misrepresentation and unlawful practices have also been detected in occupational skills petitions as well, with many false certifications to nonexistent academic achievements, untruthful claims to job training, and past experience being uncovered.

As part of the third and sixth preference petitioning process, labor certification must be obtained from the Secretary of Labor, establishing that sufficiently qualified workers are unavailable in the region where the alien is to be engaged for work; and that alien employment will not adversely affect the wages and working conditions of similarly employed residents. This certification process has been equally tainted by misrepresentations and untruths by petitioners and beneficiaries.

It is suspected that the decrease in third and sixth preference petitions from 27,060 in fiscal year 1975 to 19,319 in fiscal year 1976, was due to increased fraud detection efforts.

Adjustment of Status

While the majority of aliens taking up permanent residence in the United States arrive as immigrants in possession of visas issued by American consular offices abroad, the law does provide aliens already in the country with an adjustment process. Under the law, aliens may have their status adjusted to that of a permanent resident without having to depart and secure a visa from an American consulate in a foreign country. Of the total 398,613 immigrants this year, 81,981 or 21 percent had their status adjusted.

Section 245 Adjustments

Section 245 of the Immigration and Nationality Act provides that aliens, with the exception of crewmen, who have been inspected, admitted, or paroled into the United States, may apply for permanent resident status adjustments. Applicants must be eligible to receive immigrant visas and be admissible to the United States for permanent residence. Also, immigrant visas must be immediately available to them. Such adjustments this year numbered 47,947, a 12-percent increase over the 42,958 Section 245 adjustments in fiscal 1975.

Some 11,611 Section 245 adjustments were processed in the transition quarter.

Cuban Adjustments

Cuban refugees in the United States have had the adjustment process made available to them by passage of the Act of November 2, 1966. To be eligible, applicants must have been physically present in the United States for at least 2 years and be otherwise eligible. In 1976, 31,588 cases were completed, up from the 29,239 shown last year. Cases pending fell from 74,296 to 64,166 during the fiscal year. Through September 30, 1976, an additional 7,804, cases were completed.

Other Adjustments

Records of admission for permanent residence may be created under Section 249 of the Act for applicants who entered the United States prior to June 30, 1948. These numbered 734 in fiscal year 1976, an increase over the 592 reported in 1975. In the transition quarter, 199 Section 249 adjustments were processed.

Aliens granted permanent residence status as refugees under the proviso to Section 203(a)(7) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, totalled 1,437 during the year, and 196 during the transition quarter. This adjustment of status is granted to certain refugees after 2 years' continuous physical presence in the United States.

Also this year, 5,133 nonimmigrant fiance(e)s, who were admitted under the Act of April 7, 1970, and who subsequently married the petitioner within 90 days as agreed, were adjusted to permanent resident status. There were 1,429 adjusted during the transition quarter.

Other Applications

The Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, subjects exchange aliens to a 2-year foreign residence requirement if their participation in an exchange program was financed by the United States Government, the government of their nationality or last residence, or if their home country has been designated by the Secretary of State to be in need of their skills. A waiver of this 2-year requirement may be granted by the Service on the basis of exceptional hardship, persecution, interest of another United States Government agency, or a "no objection" statement by the alien's home government, provided the Secretary of State recommends granting the waiver. In fiscal year 1976, 850 such waivers were granted.

Nonimmigrant applications for extensions of temporary stay decreased from the 393,139 received in fiscal year 1975 to 269,873 in fiscal year 1976, and an additional 75,946 during the transition quarter. The drop was directly attributable to the withdrawal of authorization for extension of stay to B-2 nonimmigrants. Nonresident border crossing cards issued to Canadian or Mexican residents who demonstrated the need to frequently enter the United States totalled 165,215, as compared to 219,225 for 1975, illustrating the effect of fraud detection efforts and the priorities program. In the transition quarter, 31,996 additional cards were issued. A total of 27,844 applications by nonimmigrants in the United States to change to another nonimmigrant classification were approved, an increase of 10 percent over the 25,277 approved last year.

Reentry permits are issued to lawful permanent residents in order to satisfy documentary requirements upon return from temporary visits abroad. Issuance or extension of reentry permits totalled 84,542 in fiscal year 1976, up from the 81,522 shown last year. Refugee Travel Documents, which provide similar documentary benefits to refugees, totalled 8,690 during fiscal year 1976, as compared to 5,518 in fiscal 1975. During the transition quarter, 25,025 reentry permits were issued or extended, in addition to 3,003 Travel Documents.

Schools desiring to accept nonimmigrant students must first be authorized to do so by the Service. Foreign students or exchange visitors wishing to transfer schools or exchange programs also require Service authorization. Permission to accept employment must also be authorized by the Service. Approvals in those categories totalled 70,573 during fiscal year 1976 and 17,235 for the transition quarter.

There were 14,195 citizen identification cards issued to United States citizens for the purpose of facilitating their travel between this country and contiguous territories, as well as for other identification purposes. The number of duplicate or replacement Alien Registration Receipt Cards issued during the year amounted to 132,987, an increase over the 115,844 issued last year. During the transition quarter, 4,758 citizen identification cards and 37,458 Alien Registration Receipt Cards were issued.

Permission to reapply for admission into the United States after deportation was granted to 2,556 aliens during the fiscal year, and 938 during the transition quarter. Advance permission to return after a temporary absence abroad was afforded to 200 residents in fiscal year 1976 who would have been otherwise inadmissible, and 50 in the transition quarter.

Waivers of certain grounds of excludability are available to prospective immigrants who are the spouses, children, or parents of citizens or permanent residents under Sections 212 (g), (h), and (i) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. Approval was granted to 2,431 such aliens in fiscal year 1976. Furthermore, an additional 17,461 nonimmigrants had grounds of excludability waived in their behalf to allow temporary admission pursuant to Section 212(d)(3) of the Act. During the transition quarter, 594 Section 212 (g), (h), and (i), and 4,236 Section 212(d)(3) waivers were approved.

Aliens who have defected from communism may be admitted into the United States if they can establish that they have been actively opposed to the ideology for at least 5 years, provided it is determined that their entry would be in the public interest. This year, 17 defectors were granted permission to immigrate. During the transition quarter, 9 were approved.

SERVICE OPERATIONS OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES

A limited number of Service officers are stationed in foreign countries according to law, in order to process applications for conditional entry and to adjudicate specified applications filed by U.S. citizens and permanent resident aliens abroad. They are authorized to consider cases of inadmissible aliens referred by U.S. consuls to determine whether relief from inadmissibility should be granted. These Service officers abroad also assist in combating fraud against immigration laws by verifying the authenticity of documents and employment experience. During fiscal year 1976, 10,220 applications by refugees for conditional entry were approved and 37,056 other cases were adjudicated by these officers.

Enforcement

The enforcement of criminal and regulatory provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act constitute one of the primary Service responsibilities, with programs implemented through the coordinated activities of the Investigations and Border Patrol Divisions and augmented by the support functions of the Detention and Deportation Division. Through their concerted efforts, the Service is able to carry out programs directed toward the prevention and detection of illegal entry into the United States, and the apprehension and removal of foreign nationals who surreptitiously enter the country or are present in violation of the terms of lawful admission.

The steady increase of illegal entries continue to overrun Service defenses on the Mexican border which, coupled with the accompanying increase in other immigration violations, gave rise to an unprecedented volume of undocumented aliens. Under a continuing program of operational priorities, the major thrust of consolidated enforcement efforts were directed toward prevention and detection of illegal entries in the immediate border areas, and the location and removal of undocumented aliens working, or seeking employment, in competition with American labor.

DEPORTABLE ALIENS LOCATED

After a brief decline in mid-year 1975, apprehension of deportable aliens resumed the rising trend evidenced in the previous decade. The location of 875,915 deportable aliens during fiscal year 1976 depicts an increase of 109,315 or 14 percent over 1975; 87,770 or 11 percent over the previous decade high in 1974; and well over 5 times the number located during fiscal year 1966. This year's increase was largely attributable to the location of 101,082 Mexican nationals by Service officers for a total of 781,474 deportable Mexican aliens—representing 89 percent of the total of all nationalities located. The remaining 94,441 deportable aliens include natives from virtually every country of the world, a 10-percent increase in non-Mexican apprehensions over the previous year. Deportable aliens apprehended during the transition quarter totalled 221,824.

The following table provides a comparison of deportable aliens located during the past 2 fiscal years.

Status at Entry

During fiscal year 1975, Service officers apprehended more than three-quarters of a million deportable aliens surreptitiously entering the country between

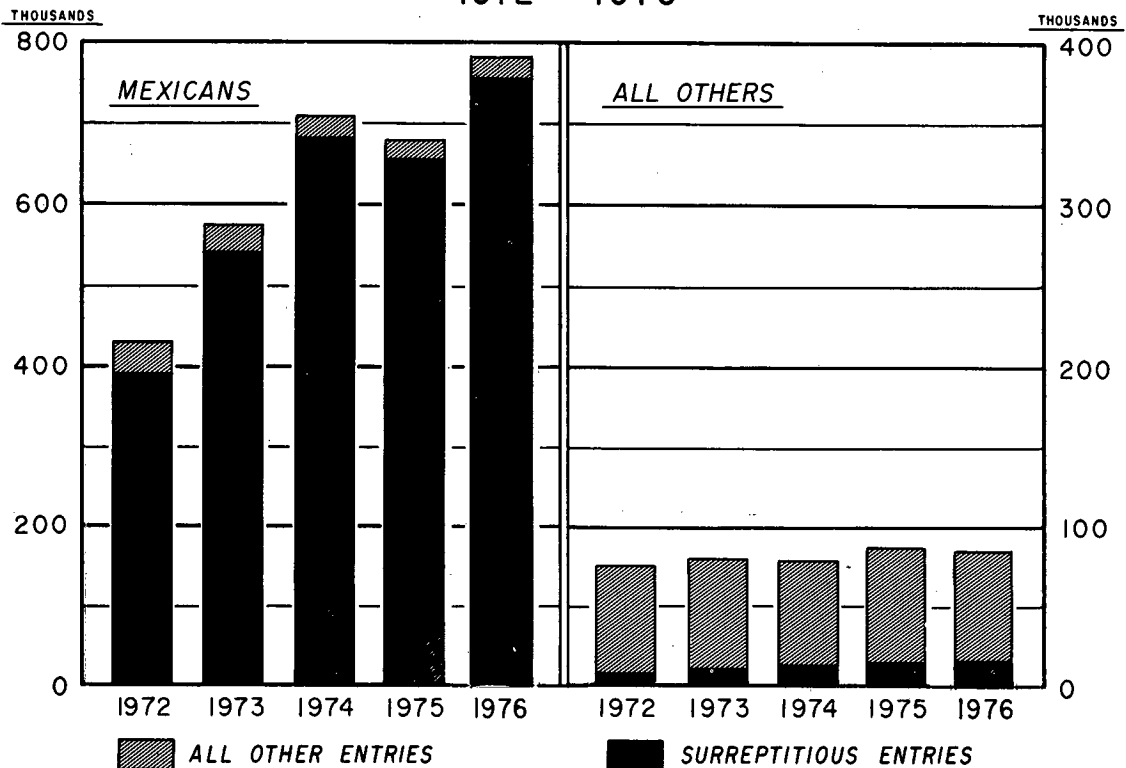
ports of entry. Of these, 769,271 or 99 percent came across the Mexican border; 3,431 over the Canadian border; and 758 by other routes, for a total of 773,460. The remaining 102,455 deportable aliens located during fiscal year 1976 entered through designated ports of entry and became subject to deportation as a result of violations of conditions of admission, including 58,945 temporary visitors; 13,701 alien crewmen; 10,353 foreign students; 2,659 immigrants; and 16,797 others.

The transition quarter accounted for 196,665 surreptitious entrants located by Service officers. Of these, 195,071 or 99 percent came across the Mexican border; 1,422 over the Canadian border; and 172 by other routes. The remaining 22,953 deportable aliens located during the transitional quarter entered through designated ports of entry and became subject to deportation as a result of violations of the conditions of their admission. Included were: 14,791 temporary visitors; 3,231 alien crewmen; 2,462 foreign students; 733 immigrants; and 1,736 others.

The prevention factor in the Service enforcement program is largely accomplished through the expeditious apprehension and removal of undocumented aliens. Exclusive of the 9,482 crewmen in technical violation due to the delayed departure of their vessels, the time lapse in locating the remaining 866,433 aliens found in illegal status was as follows: 61 percent at entry or within 72 hours; 13 percent within 4 to 30 days; 14 percent within 1 to 6 months; and 12 percent after 6 months:

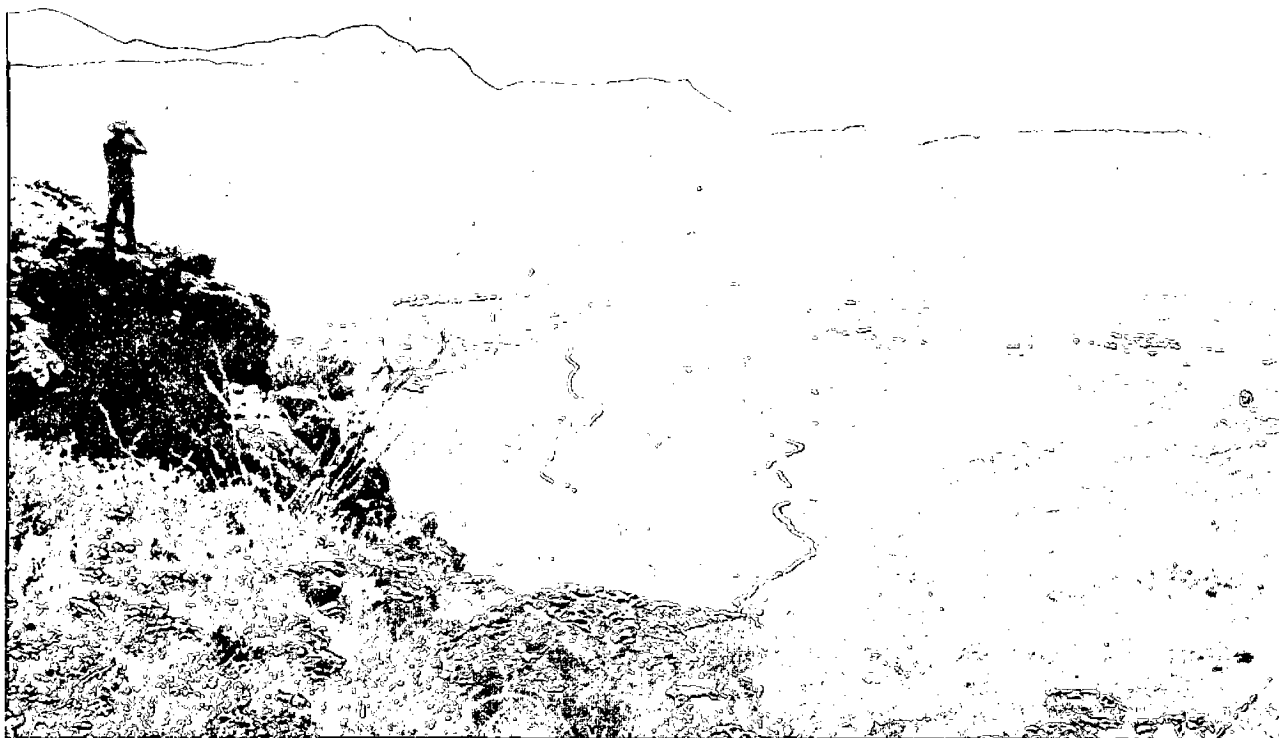
Area Control

The Investigation Division carries out area control operations designed to locate undocumented aliens present in major urban and suburban centers of the United States. Undocumented aliens, attracted into these industrialized areas by employment opportunities, often have a negative impact on wages, working conditions, and employment for the American labor force. Priorities designed to locate undocumented aliens in high paying jobs attractive to U.S. citizens and lawful alien residents remained in effect during fiscal year 1976.

The "Program Cooperation" operation, which seeks to enlist the support of employers in combating the

employment of undocumented aliens, received continued emphasis. The Denver District Office instituted this program as a result of requests by various local companies to have Service officers assist them in screening undocumented aliens from their payrolls. As a result, approximately 600 aliens were denied employment or were dismissed in the Denver area alone. Other Service officers also reported cooperation with many employers taking action to terminate the employment of undocumented aliens. Despite the excellent response and increased cooperation, area control forces continue to face resistance in their efforts to seek out undocumented aliens who are employed, resulting in a substantial increase of judicial search warrants.

Repeated reports were received by our New York office indicating the employment of undocumented aliens at Gurney's Inn, a seashore resort at the tip of Long Island. The use of an investigator in undercover employment at the Inn confirmed the allegations. Management attempted to stymie investigators' loca-

tion of hidden aliens with stalling tactics. Consequently, a judicial search warrant was obtained and, due to the terrain, the cooperation of the Coast Guard was solicited. On May 29, 1976, 12 investigators were landed by Coast Guard helicopter during the early morning hours, with other investigators entering the premises by automobile, thus cutting off avenues of escape. Seventeen aliens were apprehended and placed under deportation proceedings.

The Chicago District Office has been impacted by the temporary injunction placed on the area as a result of the court action, *Illinois Migrant Council v. Alva Pilliod, et al.*, effective July 29, 1975. That injunction has served to make a number of employers quite reluctant to cooperate with the Service.

In cooperation with State and county welfare agencies in California, Service investigators at Los Angeles and San Francisco are endeavoring to verify the legal status of foreign born applicants for public aid. Between November 1975 and June 1976, 4,317 applicants for welfare were requested to appear in Los Angeles in order to determine immigration status. Of that total, 1,809 or 42 percent were found to be unlawfully in the United States, and appropriate Service proceedings were instituted. The Los Angeles County Department of Social Service records the savings to taxpayers in excess of \$4 million annually.

Efforts of area control forces and other Investigations efforts throughout the Nation led to the location of 150,577 deportable aliens, a 5-percent increase over the previous year. During the transition quarter, 40,194 deportable aliens were apprehended by area control forces.

Smuggling

During the fiscal year, Border Patrol agents apprehended 82,910 aliens who had been induced or assisted in unlawful entry or had been illegally transported after entry. This depicts an increase of 2,525 or 3 percent over fiscal year 1975. The 9,600 smugglers or transporters apprehended this year indicates an increase of 2,740 or 40 percent more than the previous year. During the transition quarter, 22,587 aliens were smuggled into the country and were apprehended along with 2,478 smugglers and transporters.

The patterns of smuggling activities were similar to those of previous years and ran the gamut of one person assisting a friend or relative to evade inspection to that of intricately organized, well equipped commercial groups engaged in smuggling for prices as high as \$400. As smuggling and transporting methodology

become more sophisticated, improved cooperation among various agencies and their branches becomes imperative. Notably, cooperation with Mexican Immigration authorities has resulted in an increased number of prosecutions of persons involved in the illegal exportation of aliens from Mexico.

Modes of transportation utilized by smugglers were varied, as illustrated by the use of a Cessna 172 by one smuggler who transported three Mexican aliens from Weslaco to Abilene, Tex. In contrast, a Laredo anti-smuggling agent and two local station agents arrested an alien smuggler on the Rio Grande as he landed 10 aliens by boat a half-mile below the International Bridge at Laredo into the United States.

Another large scale operation utilized railroad box cars to move large numbers of undocumented aliens from Laredo to San Antonio, Tex., headed by a smuggler in Mexico. A previously convicted alien smuggler, who served as the principal U.S. contact, received the aliens as they arrived in locked box cars and arranged subsequent transportation from San Antonio to Houston, Tex., and Southern Florida. Both subjects were successfully prosecuted and sentenced to prison.

Anti-smuggling agents working with Harlingen, Texas, officers arrested a smuggler with 33 undocumented aliens being transported to Aurora, Illinois. This smuggler had been a subject of interest for some time and was believed to be connected with an Illinois-based smuggling operation.

In another important case, Rafael Castro-Ayon, an alien smuggler, was arrested by Border Patrol agents on August 29, 1975, as he was transporting 11 aliens illegally into the United States by van. Prosecution was authorized by the U.S. attorney for the District of California, and Castro-Ayon was indicted and convicted for violation of Title 8 U.S.C. 1324, after a lengthy jury trial.

What began as a routine prosecution changed when the testimony of three female alien material witnesses tended to clear Castro-Ayon of alleged crimes—a serious setback for the prosecution. However, upon arrest, an anti-smuggling agent had advised the aliens of their “Miranda” rights, placed them under oath, and interrogated them, tape recording the session. After the alien witnesses had testified in court, the prosecution asked questions as a foundation for impeachment, calling the antismuggling agent as a witness. He testified to the prior statements, with the defense objecting to admission of this evidence. At the close of the trial, the court instructed the jury to weigh the prior inconsistent statements of the witnesses, not only in testing their credibility, but also in considering the defendant’s guilt. The resultant conviction was appealed to the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit.

The Ninth Circuit, in a decision of vital interest and importance, upheld the conviction, stating in part that the prior statements were: (1) given under oath, (2) subject to prosecution for perjury, and (3) given in a trial, hearing, or other proceeding. The court held the interrogation by the agent to be a legal immigration proceeding bearing many similarities to grand jury proceedings in that: both are investigatory, ex parte, inquisitive, sworn, basically prosecutorial, held before an officer other than the arresting officer, recorded, and held in circumstances of some legal formality. The court further stated that more legal rights are provided witnesses in immigration proceedings than with a grand jury: the right to remain silent, the right to counsel, and the right to be informed of these rights.

Reports of aliens being held for ransom by smugglers when unable to pay the agreed price upon reaching their destination have been on the increase. In one case, officers at Los Angeles assisted the Mendocino County Sheriff’s Office in locating and apprehending two kidnap suspects. The victim, whose father and two brothers were smuggled into the U.S. but ran away without paying, was abducted near Ukiah, Calif., and transported to Maywood, Calif. He was held there while an attempt was made to extort \$1,200 from his

father. The kidnappers were tried on State charges, and received life sentences upon conviction.

In Houston, Tex., a female smuggler and transporter was apprehended for a controlled substance violation at Houston International Airport, in the company of two undocumented aliens who were interviewed by Houston investigators. As a result, a check of apartments in the vicinity of her home resulted in the apprehension of 28 undocumented Mexican aliens, all of whom had been smuggled into the United States by the suspect. Her account book was seized showing receipt of approximately \$19,000 from 93 smuggled aliens within a 3-month period. A 15-count complaint was filed against the subject for violation of 8 U.S.C. 1324(a) (2). Subsequent investigation of her immigration status as a Mexican national uncovered the use of an alias and many false claims to U.S. citizenship. Deportation proceedings were instituted.

Deserting Crewmen and Stowaways

The Service administers a coordinated program of coastal control directed toward the prevention and detection of undocumented entry by alien crewmen and stowaways. The Marine Intelligence Unit, located in New York City, disseminates current data regarding violations, trends, schemes, and other intelligence to Service officers in the field. This information and close liaison with shipping agents, steamship companies, and other law enforcement personnel have made the coastal program highly effective. Of the 2,644,929 crewmen permitted to land temporarily in the United States, 13,701 were located after failing to depart with their vessels. Of this total, 3,320 had willfully violated the terms of their admission.

An increase in organized smuggling-stowaway organizations operating within the seaport areas of the United States has been reported by several field officers. Since crewmen and stowaways are often involved in organized, widespread trafficking of illicit drugs by sea, other interested Federal agencies are coordinating investigations with Service offices.

Air Operations

The 28 fixed-wing, single engine aircraft, strategically located in border sectors from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific Ocean and in one interior sector, are maintained and operated by the Service for aerial observations for Border Patrol enforcement operations. They are piloted by Border Patrol agents experienced in flying at minimum safe altitudes and low air speeds to permit effective observation of ground activity.

These aircraft provide essential support in meeting the varied operational problems related to border enforcement. Among the many uses are: interception of undocumented aliens in close proximity to the border, the tracking of aliens through desert and remote areas, locating aliens employed in agriculture, and surveillance of alien smuggling and related activities.

During the fourth quarter of fiscal year 1976, a new dimension was introduced into Service air operations in the form of a helicopter, assigned to the Chula Vista sector and crewed by qualified Border Patrol pilots and observers. The unit has successfully provided the first close air support to ground teams during night operations and assist in improved sensor response. During fiscal year 1976, Service pilots assisted in locating 50,226 deportable aliens, with the helicopter operation accounting for 3,712 of these air assists.

During the transition quarter, 20,403 deportable aliens were located through air assistance, with helicopter crews responsible for 9,645 of the total. Service pilots, while performing their mission, also assisted other agencies in the location of contraband and violators of other laws, and performed numerous search and rescue operations.

Cooperation With Other Law Enforcement Agencies

The Service has continued to emphasize the value of meaningful liaison with other law enforcement agencies at Federal, State, and local levels, as well as those located in foreign countries. During fiscal year 1976, 94,372 violators of immigration and nationality law were turned over to the Border Patrol by other

law enforcement agencies. In turn, Border Patrol agents turned over 2,365 violators of other laws who were encountered and released to appropriate agencies, including 1,044 narcotics violators. I&NS agents also seized or recovered merchandise and property valued at more than \$18 million, including firearms, narcotics, vehicles, and other contraband which were transferred to appropriate authorities.

During the transition quarter, other law enforcement agencies released 25,982 violators of immigration and nationality laws to the Border Patrol. A total of 663 violators of other laws, including 276 narcotics violators, were returned to the custody of other law enforcement agencies with seized contraband and property recoveries exceeding \$5 million during the quarter.

A joint operation conducted by Border Patrol agents and U.S. Department of Labor compliance officers in the State of Florida resulted in the indictment and conviction of a farm labor contractor for violation of the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act. The contractor failed to obtain a registration certificate and willfully, knowingly, and unlawfully employed three undocumented aliens. This was the first such criminal action filed in the Nation, but resulted in two subsequent convictions against farm labor contractors.

Border Patrol agents near Sierra Blanca, Tex., encountered a couple hitchhiking and noticed blood on their hands and clothing. The couple had abandoned a car some miles back and, through a license check and interrogation, the agents learned that the couple had beaten and robbed a Texas State police officer, leaving him for dead along side the road. The agents were able to alert all area units who located and de-

livered the officer to the hospital. The couple has since been prosecuted.

Liaison with other agencies not only extends to the exchange of criminal suspects and seized contraband, but has also resulted in assistance to local authorities by the Border Patrol in search and rescue of persons lost in deserts and mountainous regions. The Border Patrol's skill in the art of sign cutting (tracking) has proved invaluable in rendering this support.

In addition, Service officers lectured at numerous police schools and academies, conducted courses, and field visits for enforcement officers from foreign countries, and presented programs to school groups and other civic organizations.

Service Participation in the Control of Marijuana, Narcotics, and Dangerous Drug Traffic

While pursuing their primary mission of immigration law enforcement, Service officers participated in the seizure of illegal drugs valued at more than \$77 million in fiscal year 1976, including 93 tons of marijuana valued at \$19 million; 4,347 ounces of hard drugs with a value of \$58 million; and over 900,000 dangerous pills valued at \$196,000.

During the transition quarter, the Service seized drugs valued at \$6.8 million. Included were seizures of 33 tons of marijuana valued at \$6 million; 283 ounces of hard drugs with a value of over \$340,000; and over 6,200 dangerous drugs in pill form valued at \$1,300.

The following cases illustrate the role played by the Service in combating drug traffic: On May 4, 1976, Hebbroville Patrol agents performing traffic check duties received information from sensor implants. They observed a large stake bed truck with a partial load

of baled hay followed closely by a late model automobile, with both licensed in the San Antonio area. The circuitous route traveled and the transport of hay from a drought area to an area where grass and hay were abundant alerted the suspicions of agents, who stopped the truck. Upon inspection, they found 2,844 pounds of marijuana. The driver was placed under arrest in the custody of an agent, while the other inspected the second vehicle, finding the driver to be armed with a fully loaded .22-calibre LR automatic rifle.

On October 7, 1975, sensors indicated a border intrusion approximately 10 miles east of Sasabe, Ariz. Shortly thereafter, a Border Patrol plane observed three vehicles traveling north on the Tres Bellotas Road. Agents of the Tucson station were given a description of the vehicles and, at 11:35 a.m., one of the vehicles passed. The subjects, seemingly Mexican, were hauling bales of alfalfa hay. Since hay is not imported from Mexico in this area, agents stopped the truck, arresting two undocumented Mexican aliens and netting 1,750 pounds of marijuana. The conviction was the direct result of efficient use of sensors and Service aircraft, knowledge of the area by Service officers, and prior experience with agricultural and import practices.

Service investigators in Chicago worked throughout fiscal year 1976 with officials of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), providing information and assistance in apprehending major area drug traffickers. This activity resulted in the arrest of 27 persons, and the seizure of 32 pounds of heroin, 3½ pounds of cocaine, and 14 vehicles by the DEA as a result of those arrests. The destruction of a heroin laboratory was also credited to the information provided by Service investigators performing their duties.

In September 1976, a narcotic investigation conducted by the DEA culminated in the arrest of 36 violators and the possible indictment of 20 to 25 others, with over 18 pounds of Mexican heroin seized. Six Border Patrol agents, fluent in Spanish, were assigned to work with DEA agents, the U.S. attorney's office and, with authorization of the court, a Federal Title III Wire Intercept. Agent interceptions, recordings, and translations ultimately lead to the arrests and seizures.

Encounters With Armed Law Violators and Aliens Apprehended With Prior Records of Criminal and Immigration Law Violations

During fiscal year 1976, Border Patrol agents arrested 186,861 aliens who previously violated the im-

migration laws. Of the repeat violators apprehended, 13,110 had prior criminal records. During the transition quarter, 42,925 aliens who had previously violated the immigration laws were arrested, with 2,755 of the apprehended repeat violators having prior criminal records. Persons arrested during the fiscal year who were armed at the time of arrest numbered 349, up 70 percent from last year. During the transition quarter, 98 were found to be armed when arrested. The usual range of dangerous weapons were encountered, including handguns, rifles, shotguns, and knives.

While working at the Greyhound Bus Terminal at Detroit, Mich., on January 30, 1976, a Border Patrol agent attempted to question a suspicious individual who had just purchased a one-way ticket to San Antonio, Tex. The subject refused to answer his inquiries regarding citizenship and began to run. The Border Patrol agent pursued and stopped the subject, but was assaulted before subduing him with the help of a terminal security guard. A search disclosed an 8-inch hunting knife carried in his belt. Subsequent identification revealed a history of assault on law enforcement officers and prior commitment to mental institutions.

CARIBBEAN INVESTIGATIONS COORDINATION PROGRAM

The Caribbean Investigations Coordinating Program and its related index continues to be effective in its role in combating the entrance of Latin American aliens of the criminal, immoral, narcotic, and subversive classes. The index, which has also been helpful in detecting fraudulent documents, is available to Service offices and other nationwide Government investigative agencies on a 24-hour basis.

The index contains some 220,825 references with 510 new reference cards being added during fiscal year 1976. As a result of index information, 74 aliens were deferred for further inspection or investigation during the year, and some 104 aliens were refused clearance for travel to the United States from third countries. The 6,105 requests for index checks resulted in the location of relating records in 302 cases. Comparable figures for the transition quarter were the addition of 76 new cards, and the location of 76 records from 2,030 requests for index checks.

The ending of the Cuban Airlift on April 6, 1973, resulted in a marked decrease in the input and output of the Caribbean Investigations Coordination Program Index. The number of Cubans attempting to flee Cuba by small boat or other improvised means has dropped

to a trickle with few successfully reaching the U.S. shores. There is no information available on unsuccessful attempts.

FOREIGN-BORN LAW VIOLATORS

Internal Security and the Foreign Born

Continued emphasis was placed on Service programs designed to detect, identify, and investigate foreign-born subversives in order to prevent entry into the United States or to remove such persons from the country through expulsion proceedings where warranted. A focal point is a program designed to ensure the welfare and safety of the citizenry against terrorist attacks. As a participating agency under the aegis of the Cabinet Committee to Combat Terrorism, the Service vigorously worked to combat terrorist guerilla activities, both domestically and internationally. The following is a typical example of the type of case developed through Service anti-subversive programs.

The FBI reported that three Mexican aliens (one male and two female) were wanted in Mexico for suspected terrorist activities related to membership in the 23rd of September League. They were found to be deportable aliens, were apprehended by Service officers without incident in Los Angeles, and were returned to Mexico under voluntary safeguards, where they were met by Judicial Police officials in accordance with prior arrangements.

Widespread interest in alleged Nazi war criminals continues with numerous war crime survivor groups, the news media, members of Congress, and the general public. As of September 20, 1976, 201 allegations had been received, of which 19 were rejected upon review, and 182 cases were assigned for preliminary inquiry. Subsequent to preliminary inquiry, 141 had been assigned for full-scale investigation. Domestic investigation in 94 of the assigned cases has been completed, with the remaining 47 under active investigation in this country and abroad. The domestically completed total includes 16 cases where the subject of the allegation cannot be identified; 8 cases where the allegations were not sustained; 22 cases where it has been determined that the subject is deceased; and 2 cases where the allegations have been sustained but there is no statutory provision under present law which could be used in the institution of deportation proceedings.

Furthermore, 32 pending cases are awaiting further action by the Department of State in their coordinated approach to sources abroad. Initiation of deportation proceedings have been recommended in 4 cases; revo-

cation of U.S. citizenship was recommended in 5 cases; and prosecution under Title 18 U.S.C. 1425 was recommended in 1 case. One subject has been found to be deportable, although deportation is being withheld under Section 243(h) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. Additionally, a complaint has been filed against another subject seeking judgment to revoke and set aside the order of the circuit court admitting him to U.S. citizenship.

Contact has also been maintained with the Israeli National Police, which has furnished statements from 90 individuals now residing in that country relative to 24 cases. During August 1976, four immigration trial attorneys journeyed to Israel to confirm information supplied by the witnesses, with their statements contributing to the development of prima facie cases of war crimes against nine individuals.

Foreign Born of the Criminal Classes

During the year, 14,794 investigations involving aliens of the criminal, immoral, and narcotics classes were completed as a result of Service efforts in the field of anti-crime and racketeering. In 3,420 cases, applications for Orders to Show Cause were made in deportation proceedings, resulting in the deportation of 744 aliens. During the transition quarter, 3,730 investigations were completed; 872 applications for Orders to Show Cause were filed; and 195 aliens were deported.

Several programs have been initiated that assist in measuring the extent of involvement in criminal activities by foreign-born persons.

An IBM Teleprinter and Hard Copy Printer became operational in Los Angeles on June 16, 1975, permitting immediate access to biographical and arrest data relating to all foreign-born persons booked into the Los Angeles County jail system by all local law enforcement agencies. A 2-month survey covering the period of June 17 to August 17, 1975, revealed that 2,321 foreign-born persons were booked therein. Of the total, 571 were booked on felony charges, while 1,750 were booked for misdemeanors. This number has steadily increased, with an estimated 1,500 foreign-born persons currently booked monthly. Under this system, information is available within minutes of booking, greatly increasing the number of persons available for interview. Under the old system, booking information was delivered once a week, resulting in the release of many deportable aliens on bond before they could be interviewed at the expense of many man-hours spent in the attempt to follow these cases through the courts.

In October 1975, the San Antonio office leased a computer terminal and printer from the Bexar County Criminal Justice Information System, for immediate access into the booking system at the Bexar County Jail and Texas Crime Information Center in Austin. Commencing April 1, 1976, the Texas Department of Public Safety began sending criminal history reports relating to foreign-born persons arrested throughout the State to the San Antonio office. During the first 6 months, more than 9,000 reports were received, with approximately 57 percent relating to crimes involving moral turpitude; 1,200 related to narcotics offenses; and 1,000 reflect previous handling by the Service. These referrals are screened and distributed to the appropriate offices with copies of drug related offense reports sent to the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC).

The index of persons of the criminal, immoral, and narcotics classes maintained at the Seattle office now contains over 56,000 cards relating to Canadian criminals. This office continues to be a focal point in identifying Canadian criminals along with other Service offices in the Western part of the United States.

An alien with a lengthy record of convictions for serious criminal violations was arrested by Cleveland investigators on August 4, 1976, and charged with reentry into the United States after deportation. He was convicted and sentenced to 18 months in prison. Investigation by another agency subsequent to his arrest by I&NS led to indictment for conspiracy and for the attempted bombing of commercial aircraft.

An alien identified by various intelligence sources as a top echelon figure in organized crime in Detroit

from the 1920's until his deportation in 1957, was apprehended by Detroit investigators on July 26, 1975. After deportation in 1957, he moved his illicit drug operation to Cuba, then to Canada. On August 7, 1975, he was convicted of reentry after deportation and, subsequently, deported.

Frauds

Schemes devised to circumvent immigration and nationality laws continue to increase significantly. Greater technological skill in reproducing and altering immigration and nationality documents was also evidenced, along with increased craftiness in arranging sham marriages and in applying for labor certifications based on false qualifications. Many of the counterfeit or altered documents are of excellent quality making detection extremely difficult. Such documents, once successfully used in the illicit market, are often resold and recycled for use by several undocumented aliens. During the fiscal year, 26,547 fraud investigations were completed, representing a 25-percent increase over fiscal year 1975. There were 5,558 fraud investigations completed during the transition quarter.

A main source of fraud continues to be fraudulent marriages, with aliens divorcing after adjustment of status. In one case, an alien entered into a bigamous marriage with a U.S. citizen, and was admitted into the United States on the basis of a visa petition submitted by his U.S. citizen wife. His lawyer appeared by himself at a Service interview, stating that he was in the process of obtaining a divorce for his client. After divorce from his first wife, the client would remarry his U.S. citizen wife. An Order to Show Cause was issued. The lawyer said he would appeal any adverse decision made by the Immigration Judge prior to the divorce proceedings in order to indefinitely delay deportation. The Immigration Judge ordered the respondent deported, with the facts of the case brought to the attention of the U.S. attorney concerning the alien's violation of 18 U.S.C. 1546.

Commencing January 1976, a sharp increase in the number of fraud investigations involving nationals of the Orient was evidenced, resulting in investigations to determine the scope of fraudulent activities by Orientals in obtaining immigration visas at the American Embassies. It was determined that a native and citizen of India, with the assistance of a local employee at the American Embassy in New Delhi, was providing visa applicants from the State of Punjab with fraudulent affidavits of support. For a fee of about 5,000 rupees (\$1,050) the clients, who were generally

registered nurses referred to him by the Embassy employee, would be provided with early appointments at the Embassy. The fee was split between the two.

An investigation of two New York attorneys and the owner of an employment agency culminated on January 5, 1976, with their indictment by a Federal Grand Jury on 26 counts of submitting fraudulently prepared applications for Alien Labor Certifications. The fees ranged from \$750 to \$1,500. "Runners" operating in Rochester, N.Y., the New Jersey area, and New York City testified that they had obtained signatures, some of them forged, on blank applications supplied by the employment agency on a commission basis.

An immigrant inspector at the airport in New Orleans alerted customs inspectors to the suspicious conduct of two Colombian natives. One was found to be in possession of a pound of cocaine and was charged with importation of narcotics. Service investigation established that both were traveling under assumed identities with altered Colombian passports. Both were prosecuted for violation of 18 U.S.C. 1546 for having presented false documents. One was convicted and sentenced to 30 months, had the prison term suspended, and was deported to Colombia. The other was convicted in a jury trial on visa violation and narcotics charges and is awaiting sentencing.

Another Colombian native arrived in New Orleans by air and applied for admission as a visitor for pleasure. Investigation revealed passport alteration. Customs inspectors were alerted and 2 kilos of cocaine were located in her luggage. Prosecution for violation of 18 U.S.C. 1546 was instituted by the Service and for violation of narcotics laws by the Drug Enforcement Agency. She was found guilty of the Service charges and sentenced to serve 5 years, but found not guilty of the narcotics charge.

Fraudulent registration of delayed Texas birth certificates continues to be a serious problem. A lawful permanent resident was recently prosecuted in the U.S. district court in Brownsville, after it was established by Service officers that he had registered large numbers of Texas birth certificates for Mexican aliens. Prior to sentencing, the court directed that he be interviewed by Service officers for possible cooperation in the identification of fraudulent birth certificates. He identified approximately 250 delayed certificates which he had arranged for Mexican aliens, for fees ranging from \$800 to \$1,400 each.

Another tool used in combating fraud is liaison with the departments of public welfare. In San Antonio alone, the Texas Welfare Department reported that,

as a direct result of liaison with that I&NS office, almost \$90,000 in fraudulent welfare payments to aliens and their dependents had been discovered.

CRIMINAL PROSECUTION

U.S. attorneys authorized prosecutions relating to 17,341 violations of the immigration and nationality laws during fiscal year 1976. Of this number, 15,772 or 91 percent resulted in convictions. Sentences received by defendants found guilty in these cases totalled 6,367 years, with fines amounting to \$1,050,148. There were 3,890 years in sentences and \$264,987 in fines suspended.

During the transition quarter, 3,573 prosecutions relating to the violations of the immigration and nationality laws were authorized, with 3,174 or 89 percent resulting in convictions.

Detention and Deportation

In fiscal year 1976, sizable staff increases in Detention and Deportation enabled the Division to strengthen its officer and clerical force, with the staff increased by 152, including 50 Deportation officers, 49 Detention officers, and 53 clerks. For the first time, division staff was able to concentrate on eliminating the case backlog on the deportation docket and to relieve some Border Patrol agents and investigators from conveyance and custodial duties.

During fiscal year 1976, a total of 793,092 aliens were expelled, of which 27,998 were deported and 765,094 were required to depart without issuance of formal deportation orders. For the most part, Mexican nationals who entered the United States without inspection comprised the largest portion of those required to depart without orders of deportation. Total expulsions represented a 16.8-percent increase over the 679,252 aliens expelled in fiscal year 1975, while deportations were up 19.5 percent from the 23,438 aliens formally deported last year. During the transition quarter, 199,207 aliens were expelled, of which 8,927 were deported and 190,280 were required to depart without the issuance of a formal order of deportation.

Due to the high incidence of repeat offenders, an Interior Repatriation Program was begun on July 20, 1976, returning a number of Mexican aliens to their homes in the interior of Mexico by non-stop commercial flights. The program also includes a test provision, requiring the fingerprinting of each alien flown to the interior and the selective fingerprinting of 5

percent of all aliens apprehended at the border. This provision will assist in determining the incidence of reentry by those aliens transported to the interior, as compared to those returned to border areas. More than 10,000 aliens were repatriated under this program in fiscal year 1976. While test results are not yet conclusive, the program will be continued in fiscal year 1977.

Aliens initially admitted to custody decreased in fiscal year 1976 from 213,026 last year to 201,982, representing a 5-percent decrease despite overall higher expulsions. A factor was the release of 8,213 aliens on bond during fiscal year 1976, with an additional 757 released in their own recognizance.

In the transition quarter, aliens initially admitted to custody totalled 63,453 with 2,103 released on bond and 216 released on their own recognizance.

The following are examples of Deportation activities during this 15-month period: A male citizen of Israel, accompanied by a 15-year-old girl, entered the United States as a stowaway at New Orleans. The two, apprehended by the Sheriff's Department in Florence, S.C., were referred to the I&NS Atlanta office. The young

girl claimed she had been kidnapped and forced to accompany the Israeli who, she said, was wanted by authorities there. The local consul in Israel confirmed the girl's story. Her parents sent a couple to Atlanta to accompany their daughter back to Israel, with her departure accomplished without expense to I&NS. The Israeli, who was wanted on several criminal charges in Israel, was ordered deported on July 6, 1976, with deportation accomplished on July 15, 1976.

A 31-year-old Canadian native and citizen entered the United States as a nonimmigrant visitor in August 1972, and was arrested by San Francisco police less than 2 weeks later, charged with robbery, receipt of stolen property, and being armed with a .357 Magnum revolver stolen from a Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) officer. He was convicted and sentenced to serve 5 years to life. A review of his record revealed several convictions on serious criminal offenses in Canada. He admitted escaping from the Matsqui Penitentiary in Abbotsford, British Columbia, entering the United States to evade Canadian authorities. Upon deportation to Canada on January 13, 1976, after serving time, he was delivered to the custody of the RCMP who had a warrant for his arrest.

A Filipino, wanted by the Philippine Government for the swindle of 8 million pesos (\$1,120,000) from his countrymen for the purchase of "stock", instead entered the United States on June 4, 1964, as a student, later adjusting his status to permanent resident through marriage to a U.S. citizen. He was convicted of grand theft on May 8, 1975, when his "investments" in a stock "holding" company showed a deficit of more than \$1.13 million. He was deported to the Philippines on September 12, 1975.

A 31-year-old native of China, who resided in Hong Kong from 1953 to 1963, was denied an immigrant visa in January 1963, due to failure to disclose two convictions for simple larceny in 1959. However, for humanitarian reasons, he and his family were paroled into the United States indefinitely. In March 1966, he was denied adjustment of status on the ground of ineligibility because of the previous convictions involving moral turpitude prior to entry. Subsequently, he became a leader in a Chinese youth gang terrorizing the San Francisco Chinatown area, and was convicted of receiving stolen property in 1968 and again in 1973. On April 21, 1975, he was convicted of assault with a deadly weapon. On February 18, 1975, he was ordered excluded from the United States on the basis of two convictions for having received stolen property, with appeal denied by the Board of Immigration Appeals. His motion of stay for judgment pending

appeal before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals was denied on October 28, 1975, and on November 18, 1975, he was excluded and deported from the United States to Hong Kong.

Hearings and Litigation

EXCLUSION AND DEPORTATION HEARINGS

The 57,340 deportation cases referred to immigration judges during fiscal year 1976 again represent a record high, a 23-percent increase over the number of hearings last year and more than triple the 16,767 cases referred a decade ago. Formal exclusion hearings referred to immigration judges totalled 2,693 during fiscal year 1976, more than 3 times the number referred in 1966.

LITIGATION

General Counsel

The chief legal officer of I&NS, who also serves as legal advisor to the Commissioner and other officers on questions of law and policy arising from the administration and enforcement of immigration and nationality statutes, is the General Counsel. He is responsible for reviewing various court decisions, as well as those rendered by the Board of Immigration Appeals, and advising whether appropriate appellate or other actions should be taken. The responsibilities of the General Counsel also include the analysis of proposed legislation having an effect on I&NS operations; the executive and professional direction of the four regional counsels; supervision of the activities of trial attorneys; and representation of the Service before the Board of Immigration Appeals through three appellate trial attorneys.

Trial Attorneys

Trial attorneys, who are under the supervision of the General Counsel through the Chief Trial Attorney and the four regional counsels, have primary responsibility for representing the Service in formal exclusion, deportation, and rescission hearings before immigration judges. When requested, these attorneys and the regional counsels also assist U.S. attorneys in civil and criminal actions resulting from the administration and enforcement of immigration and nationality laws.

Trial attorneys made more than 37,000 appearances before immigration judges in fiscal year 1976 and the transition period. They reviewed 27,019 Orders to Show Cause, appeared in 3,788 exclusion hearings, and 23,223 deportation proceedings instituted during the fiscal year. In addition, they filed 6,357 briefs. These figures represent a substantial increase in nearly every category for the 15-month period ending September 30, 1976.

Litigation

There were 88 petitions for writs of habeas corpus and 200 declaratory judgment actions in the district courts of the United States during the period. There were 38 favorable and 5 unfavorable decisions for the Government. Fifteen cases were withdrawn or otherwise closed. In declaratory judgment actions, the Government received 548 favorable decisions and 5 unfavorable. Twenty-three cases were withdrawn or otherwise closed. In the United States Courts of Appeals, 506 petitions for review of deportation cases were filed under Section 106 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, 8 U.S.C. 1105(a). Of the 506 petitions for review decided by the Courts of Appeals, 331 were favorable to the Government and 26 were adverse, with 27 cases withdrawn or otherwise closed. The Supreme Court granted certiorari in 2 I&NS cases and denied certiorari in 9. Opinions were rendered by the Supreme Court in 3 cases.

In *INS v. Bagamasbad*, 429 U.S. 24 (1976), the Court reversed the decision by the Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit (531 F. 2d 111), which held that the adjustment of status provision of the Immigration and Nationality Act required the immigration judge to determine the applicant's eligibility for adjustment before denying the application in the exercise of discretion. The Supreme Court held that where it is conceded that the alien's application would have been properly denied whether or not she satisfied statutory eligibility requirements, and where there is no express statutory requirement for making an eligibility finding, such a finding is not required.

In *United States v. Martinez-Fuerte*, 428 U.S. 543 (1976), decided together with *Sifuentes v. United States*, the Court ruled that the Border Patrol does not need judicial warrants or reasonable suspicion before stopping a vehicle and briefly questioning its occupants at permanent checkpoints which are reasonably located. As a result of these decisions, operation of permanent checkpoints in California and Arizona, which had been suspended the previous year after

an adverse decision by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, was resumed.

As a result of the Solicitor General's decision not to seek certiorari in the case of *Francis v. INS*, 532 F. 2d 268 (2d Cir. 1976), decided by the U.S. Court of Appeals, Second Circuit, the Service has decided to follow the court's decision, which accords the waiver contained in Section 212(c) to a permanent resident alien who never departed from the United States.

Alien Address Reports

In January 1976, a total of 4,775,559 aliens reported their addresses to the Service in accordance with the requirements set forth by the Immigration and Nationality Act (66 Stat. 163). Of this total, 4,265,034 were permanent resident aliens and 510,525 were visitors, students, temporary workers, and others temporarily residing in the United States. These figures represent a very slight increase over the previous reporting period.

More than three-fourths of the 4,265,034 permanent resident aliens reside in the following eight states: California, 1,096,948 (26 percent); New York, 703,623 (17 percent); Texas, 324,601 (8 percent); Florida, 315,079 (7 percent); Illinois, 254,933 (6 percent); New Jersey, 236,450 (6 percent); Massachusetts, 158,436 (4 percent); and Michigan, 121,960 (3 percent).

In 1976, as in previous years, permanent resident Mexicans far exceeded any other nationality residing in the United States. The 10 major nationalities are: Mexican (885,971); Canadian (306,647); Cuban (319,325); British (277,103); Italian (203,525); Filipino (188,671); German (162,798); Chinese (116,636); Portuguese (115,670); and Korean (110,177).

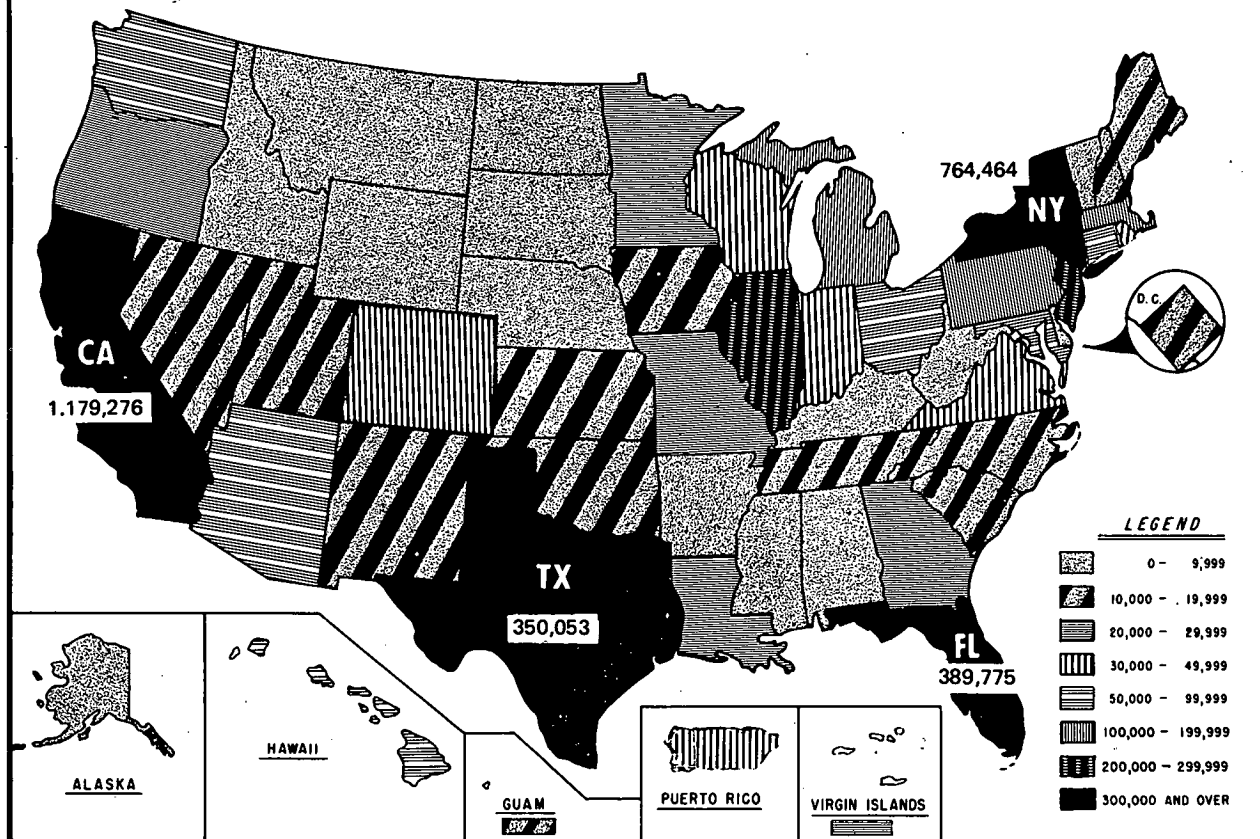
Citizenship

The Naturalization Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service plays a vital role in the processes leading up to and including final naturalization hearings. These hearings are held in open court where the pronouncement of citizenship is made by the judge.

General Attorneys (Nationality), often referred to as naturalization examiners, are charged with the responsibility of conducting formal preliminary hearings to determine eligibility for naturalization. At

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these hearings, testimony of the applicant and two witnesses is taken. As hearing examiners, the General Attorneys have statutory authority to render recommendations to the court which, for the most part, are accepted without review. As part of this process, the General Attorneys for Nationality exercise subpoena power, demand the production of documents, and prepare formal written findings for presentation to the court.

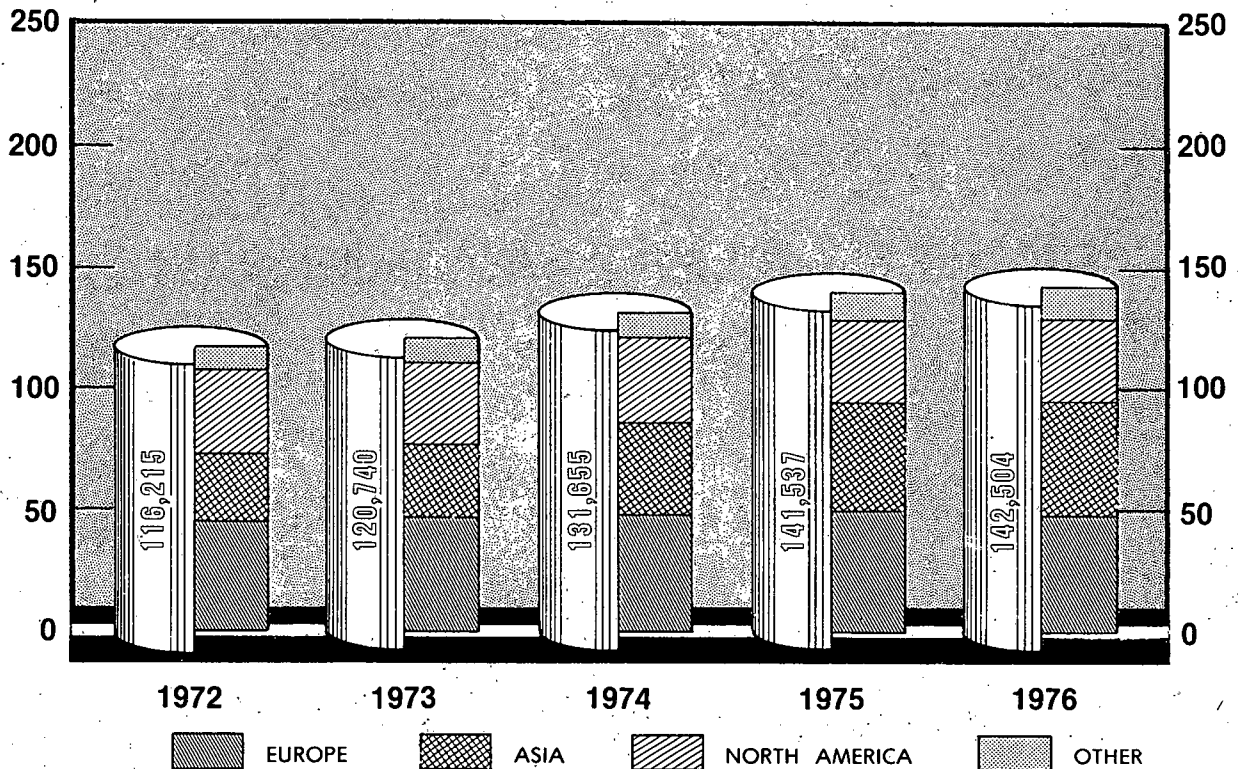
As a corollary to these duties, the Service encourages and assists aliens in obtaining citizenship education in both literary and governmental functions. It also assists in arranging naturalization ceremonies that are celebrative of significant national historical events in order to create a memorable occasion that will generate pride in the United States and the Service, and will enhance the quality of citizenship for viewer and participant alike. At no time in history was this philosophy more evident than during the Bicentennial year or the period leading up to it. For Service personnel, par-

ticularly those employed in the Naturalizations organization, fiscal year 1976 and the transition quarter was truly a star-spangled period, with many naturalization ceremonies taking place at sites of special historical significance.

Birth or naturalization does not preclude United States citizenship by other means. A long history of statutes serves to bestow citizenship, in certain cases, on those born abroad to a U.S. citizen parent or parents, or on children who derive citizenship through their parents' naturalization. The Naturalization Division maintains the responsibility of determining the sufficiency of a claim to U.S. citizenship, reviewing the supportive evidence submitted, and issuing Certificates of Citizenship in recognition of such claims. Commensurate with this responsibility is cancellation of Certificates of Citizenship by means of a comprehensive due process procedure upon determination of fraud or illegality in the issuance of Certificates. The Service also issues replacements if a Certificate of Citizenship is lost,

1972 — 1976



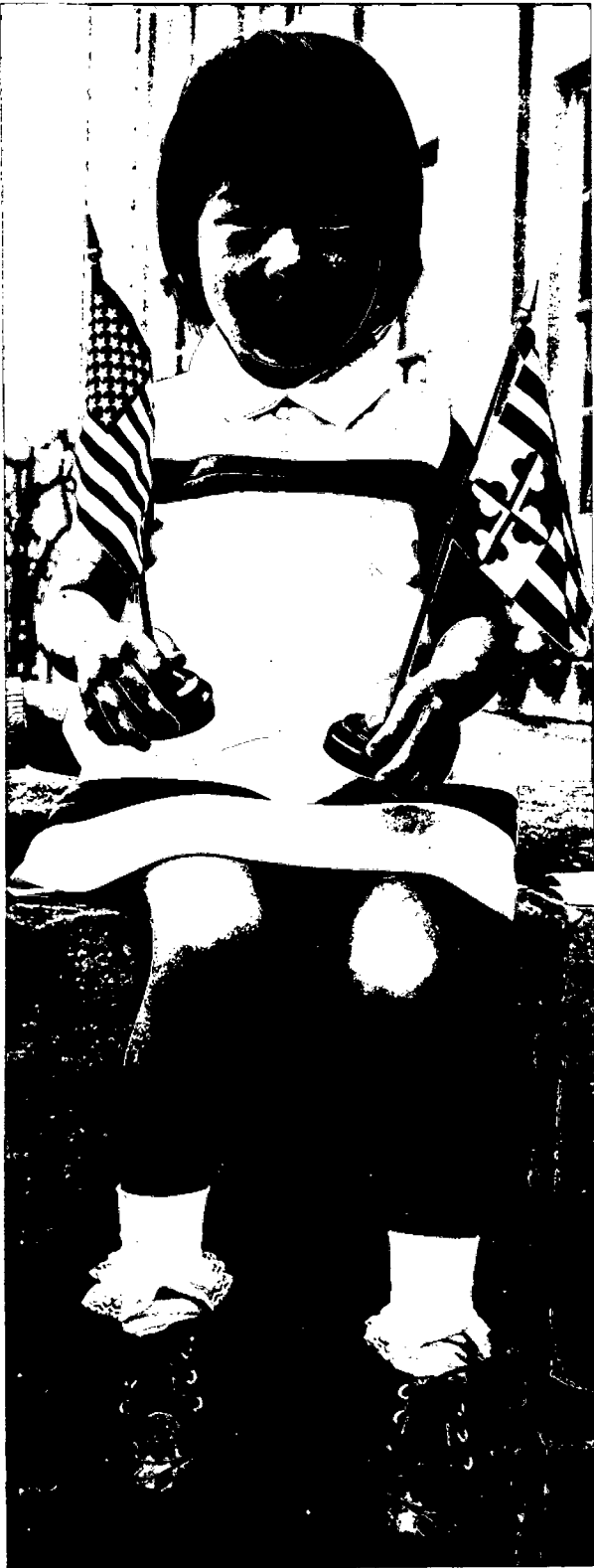
percent of the total naturalized during the fiscal year. Next, in terms of size and percentage, were spouses of U.S. citizens filing under the 3-year continuous residence requirement, totalling 15,138 applicants, or 11 percent of those naturalized. In addition, a significant number of servicemen (5,631) and children under the age of 18 (7,038) were naturalized pursuant to other available sections of the naturalization laws.

During the transition quarter, 40,261 applicants were naturalized in accordance with requirements for continuous residence in the U.S. for a period of 5 years. In addition, 4,374 persons fulfilled the 3-year continuous residency requirement for naturalization, and 1,513 servicemen and 2,054 children under 18 years of age were naturalized.

The quality of management and programming, establishment of the program priorities, and the efforts by the General Attorneys (Nationality) and supportive personnel must be credited with the continuing increase in production. The program priorities established by

the Commissioner emphasized the processing of applications for naturalization and the efficient utilization of available manpower. Low volume naturalization courts continued to be closed during fiscal year 1976 and travel was further curtailed to those active courts handling relatively few naturalization cases.

The Service provides expeditious naturalization in cases where factual circumstances and the statute permits special assistance. Servicemen, veterans, spouses of U.S. citizen servicemen, Government personnel, and employees of U.S. firms, and adoptive children of U.S. citizens as well, accompanying or joining them abroad, are a few of those benefiting from this assistance. Special consideration and assistance are also afforded applicants for naturalization who, for reasons of health or age, are physically unable to complete the processing and appear in court. In these cases, prior approval is received from the court for examination and naturalization at a designated location. For example, the 11-year-old great-great-granddaughter of Angeline

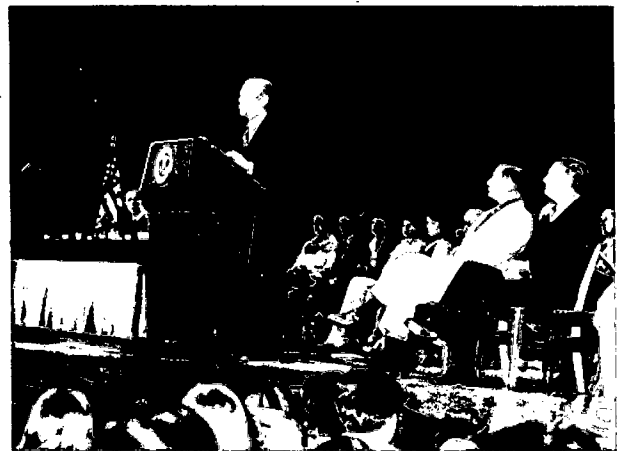


Congratulations are in store for this 3-year-old adopted Korean, following her naturalization at ceremonies in Rockville, Md.

Chimenti, born in Italy in 1875, wrote the President of the United States to request that Mrs. Chimenti be granted citizenship in celebration of her 100th birthday. Special arrangements were made by the Service with the court, and just 2 days after her centennial celebration, Mrs. Chimenti was examined and naturalized at the same time while she sat in her wheelchair.

Recognizing the importance of final naturalization hearings for those participating, the Service endeavors to make each a meaningful and significant event. Assistance towards this goal is enlisted from and, in many cases, volunteered by the State and Federal courts, bar associations, civic, fraternal, and educational organizations, area schools, veterans organizations and their auxiliaries. Many final naturalization ceremonies are held in conjunction with celebrated national commemorative dates. Each year Citizenship Day-Constitution Week, Flag Day, and Law Day are commemorated by numerous naturalization ceremonies in such diverse sites as the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion Music Center in Los Angeles, Calif.; the State Senate Chambers of the State Capitol in Honolulu, Hawaii; the Phipps Auditorium in the City Park of Denver, Colo.; and the front steps of the State Capitol Building, Richmond, Va.

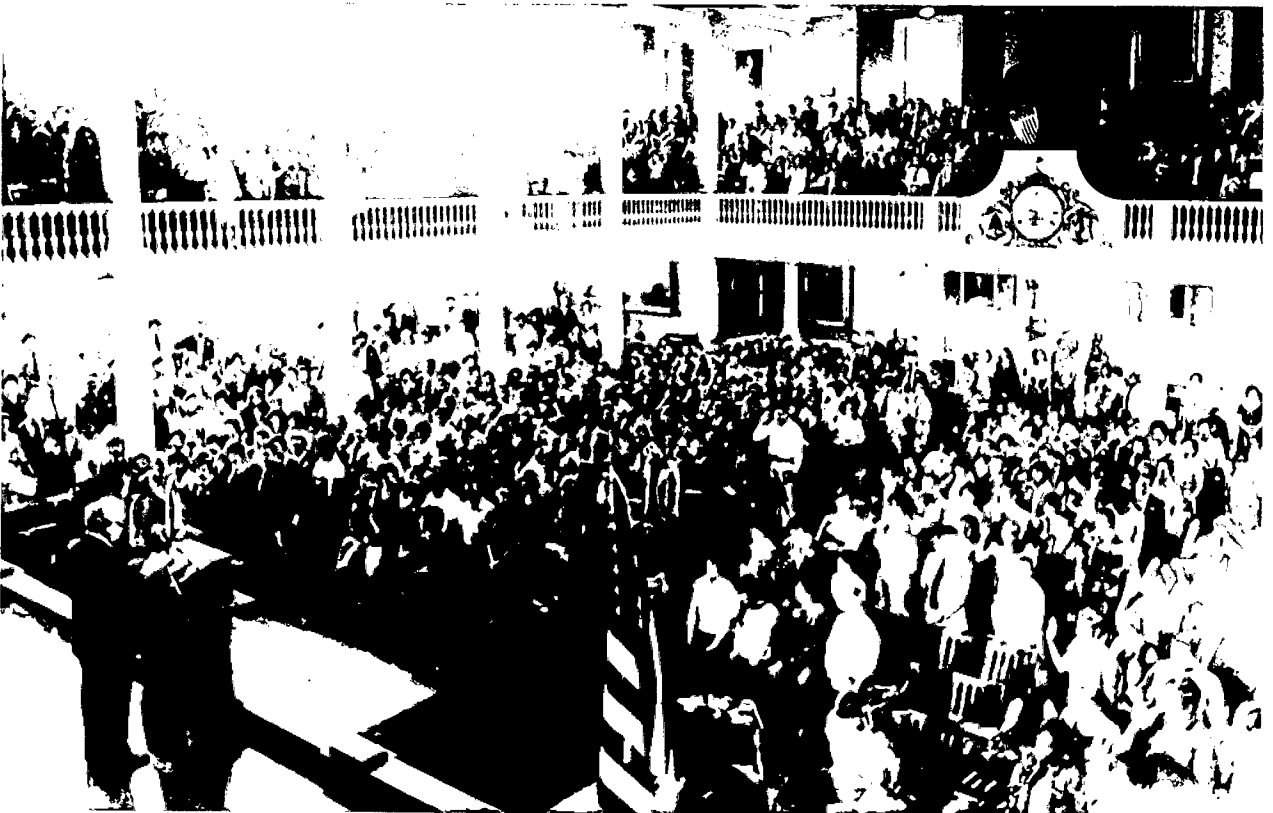
Initiation of the Bicentennial celebration began early for the Naturalization Division of I&NS. On July 4, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford spoke at the naturalization ceremony at Ft. McHenry in Baltimore, Md.—the birthplace of the “Star Spangled Banner”—with the Governor of Maryland, the Mayor of Baltimore, a Maryland Senator, and a host of representatives to the Maryland House in attendance. Subsequently, the President addressed a tremendous gathering at Miami,

Fla., on February 28, 1976, at a naturalization hearing. In response to a Presidential request, additional manpower was diverted to the Miami office to offset the large number of pending naturalization applications. Due to the excellent level of cooperation between the field offices and General Attorneys (Nationality), over 16,000 additional naturalization applications were completed within 90 short days.

The entire month of July 1976 was highlighted with naturalization ceremonies held throughout the United States as close to the actual celebration of Independence Day as possible. Simultaneously, 4th of July ceremonies were held in Thief River Falls, Minn.; Grand Forks, N.D.; Chicago, Ill.; Detroit, Mich.; Fort McHenry, Md.; and Charlottesville, Va., where President Ford spoke to the new citizens at Monticello.

During the course of the Bicentennial year, naturalization ceremonies were held in places never before imagined: court naturalization ceremonies held in "the cradle of American Liberty"—Boston, Mass.—aboard the U.S.S. *Constitution* (Old Ironsides); at Old North Church where lanterns were once hung to warn Paul Revere that British troops were arriving by land on their way to Concord; and in Faneuil Hall; with additional ceremonies held aboard the aircraft carrier *Guam* in Norfolk, Va.; and the battleship U.S.S. *Massachusetts* at Fall River, Mass.

Furthermore, by way of special recognition to those persons naturalized during the celebration of this country's 200th birthday, the bureau of Engraving and Printing designed naturalization certificates with the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration symbol superimposed upon it. This is the first time there has been any deviation from the issuance of the standard certificate of naturalization.

Naturalizations Denied

Not every applicant will achieve the goal of naturalization since many do not meet the requirements prescribed by law. Consequently, during fiscal year 1976, there were 2,231 unsuccessful applicants. A total of 110 petitions for naturalization were presented to and denied by the courts. The greatest number, however, were aliens who submitted applications but decided against filing petitions when informed that they lacked one or more basic requirements for naturalization. Thus, 2,121 saved the court filing fee of \$25, as well as the time and expense connected with the preliminary investigations, examinations, and final hearings in court.

During the transition quarter, there were 568 unsuccessful applicants. Of these, 544 decided to file petitions at a later time. For those that continued the naturalization process, 24 petitions were presented and denied by the courts. The accompanying table shows the number of cases presented and denied.

For those denied on grounds of moral deficiency, the naturalization statute recognizes the principle of reformation, with the petitioners able to establish their rehabilitation and eligibility for naturalization after passage of time. Accordingly, unsuccessful candidates were informed as to eligibility requirements, as well as to when they might renew efforts to become citizens.

Citizenship Education and Responsibility

While earlier statutes required a naturalization petitioner to exhibit only the ability to speak English, the Act of September 23, 1950, further required demonstrated abilities to read and write English, with limited exceptions. Additionally, a general knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of the history, principles, and form of the Government of the United States is required under the current law.

The Service has a statutory duty to assist prospective citizens in their educational preparations for naturalization. To this end, during fiscal year 1976, it furnished the names and addresses of 75,082 newly arrived immigrants to public schools conducting adult education classes, in order that invitations for enrollment in citizenship classes could be extended. In addition, the Service referred 197,786 aliens to schools or home study courses during fiscal year 1976.

As a result of these efforts, 80,111 candidates attended 3,543 public school classes during the fiscal

year, with 12,558 attending 2,529 classes during the transition quarter.

Furthermore, naturalization examiners visited citizenship classes on a continuing basis, providing prospective citizens with the opportunity to meet the examiners prior to the date of preliminary hearings and, to some extent, alleviate the tensions generated by the proceedings. The Service also distributed, free of charge, 103,781 Federal textbooks on Citizenship during fiscal year 1976, and 17,283 during the transition quarter, for utilization by applicants attending public schools or enrolled in home study courses.

As a further incentive to citizenship, the Service provides civic, patriotic, and educational organizations, as well as churches and similar groups, with 18 free films depicting the Nation's history, Government, and rights and duties of citizenship. A pamphlet, printed in both English and Spanish, is also distributed as a public service to explain, in simple terms, the requirements and procedures for naturalization.

DERIVATIVE CITIZENSHIP

As a result of the institution of program priorities, issuance of certificates of citizenship decreased for the second consecutive year, with 19,940 certificates issued by the Service during fiscal year 1976, and 4,206 issued during the transition quarter. This was due to the continued suspension of the procedure permitting alien parents, who are petitioning for naturalization, to apply concurrently for issuance of certificates of citizenship for their children, as well as the subordination of the processing of certificate applications to the processing of applications for naturalization, as defined in program priorities.

Since the 1966 amendment to the law permitting the issuance of certificates of citizenship in the Panama Canal Zone, Service officers are sent to Panama to conduct interviews and issue certificates of citizenship. During the past 15 months, over 400 certificates were issued, bringing the total to nearly 4,500 since the program's inception.

OTHER CITIZENSHIP ACTIVITIES

Applications for other important nationality documents are also adjudicated by the Service. During fiscal year 1976, 7,369 such documents were issued, with 2,063 additional documents issued during the transition quarter. These included replacement of certificates of naturalization and citizenship which had been lost,

mutilated, or destroyed, special certificates of naturalization for recognition as a U.S. citizen by foreign governments, certificates of naturalization in changed names, and declarations of intention.

Additional Service responsibility exists in the determination of claims to U.S. nationality where issues of possible expatriation exist. Recent Supreme Court decisions pertaining to the loss of citizenship have had great impact on these determinations. Consequently, each case must be considered in light of court decisions and many prior decisions had to be readjudicated.

NEW PROGRAMS

In fiscal year 1976, the Service first introduced the Paralegal Specialist Program in Miami, Fla., and Los Angeles, Calif. Six paralegal specialists were assigned to each location, after receiving 3 months of class training from an experienced General Attorney with additional on-the-job training being conducted. The paralegal program is in the process of being evaluated.

The United States District Court for El Paso, Tex., has instituted a new procedure to increase interest in the naturalization process. The court has allowed local television stations to televise mock proceedings immediately after naturalization ceremonies, an activity which has been well received by the public.

Public Information Office

The Service's Public Information Office continued to focus public attention on the Service in fiscal year 1976, with the Commissioner playing a key role in this effort. Commissioner Chapman spoke before 24 major organizations in 22 different cities explaining the immigration problems facing the Nation. Other officers carried this same message to scores of local groups through speeches and interviews with the news media. Press conferences were also held by the Commissioner in each of the cities he visited.

Two 1-minute television films were produced by the Service and distributed nationally, with one encouraging employers to hire only citizens or legal resident aliens. The second, which won prizes at international film festivals in Chicago and Illinois and an award for outstanding creativity at a national festival, depicted the joys and benefits of naturalization.

The Public Information Office stimulated media interest in immigration through speeches, press conferences, TV films, and regular news releases, and

worked with major publications in producing feature length articles about the problem. These included *Time*, *Newsweek*, *Parade Magazine*, and the *Reader's Digest*, which featured an article with the Commissioner's byline in October 1975.

To measure the effectiveness of this effort and to provide Congress with information concerning public attitudes toward the undocumented alien problem, a contract was awarded to the Gallup Organization.

In addition to public information responsibilities, this Office also stresses employee communications. All speeches by the Commissioner, press releases, 21 issues of the Commissioner's *Open Line* newsletter to Service employees, and regular publication of the *INS REPORTER* and *Bulletin* were distributed to I&NS offices. Several regions also published newsletters.

Such programs are expected to continue. Additional television films will be produced and distributed, and the Public Information Office will place greater emphasis on the service aspects of I&NS.

Management

ADMINISTRATION

The Administration Division has responsibility for furnishing fiscal support to Service operations; carrying forward programs in construction, space, communications, equipment, and procurement; and modifying or developing new procedures to improve efficiency, and to increase the productivity and effectiveness of management systems.

Engineering

The Engineering Branch is responsible for the management of all Service space and facilities, and extends to the management of communications and electronics programs. During fiscal year 1976, a new procedure was implemented for the design of border stations. A process was developed for the selection of an architectural firm in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Arts. The selected firm, chosen after review of 148 firms and a list of 6 finalists, was awarded a contract for the construction of new border stations at Boundary, Wash., and Scobey, Mont., based on the imaginative and efficient design presented.

The Southeast Regional Office was moved, under the aegis of the Engineering Branch, from Richmond, Va., to Dallas, Tex., and was redesignated the Southern Regional Office. In addition, the Engineering

Branch undertook responsibility for expanding an alien detention facility in the New York area, allocating \$0.5 million for the activation of improvements.

The General Services Administration (GSA) undertook construction of three new Service facilities, namely, the Marfa, Tex., Border Patrol Sector Headquarters; the Blaine (Pacific Highway), Wash., Border Station; and the Lukeville, Ariz., Border Station. In addition, that agency also completed a new border station at Nogales, Ariz., and initiated the construction for a new border station at Laredo, Tex. The planned construction of additional border stations on both northern and southern borders, as well as Alaska, are proceeding with GSA.

A program for the review and upgrading of all Service offices and facilities has also been initiated. Original efforts were expanded to include facilities at the Central Office, the Southern Regional Office, and the Baltimore District Office, in the attempt to present a better image and to design an environment which will facilitate Service operations for employees and the public alike.

The Service's Radio Communications System Replacement Program continued with the installation of new systems at El Paso, Marfa, and Del Rio, Tex.; Tucson, Ariz.; Havre, Mont.; and Spokane and Blaine, Wash., Border Patrol Sectors. Contracts were also awarded for new systems in the Livermore, Calif., and Miami, Fla., sectors. Replacement of these systems was necessary to maintain a reliable and rapid means of communication for field officers, thus ensuring their safety and providing operational mobility over a wide area. Additional equipment, including mobile radios, portable radios, test and ancillary equipment, was also purchased to enhance existing systems.

In conjunction with the Customs Service, an emergency alarm system, project "Life-Line", was installed at 40 isolated ports of entry along the northeastern border. This system provides a measure of safety for officers by ensuring prompt assistance in the event of an emergency at these ports.

The Service's Intrusion Detection Program continued with the installation of improved systems along the United States-Mexican border. These systems provide greater effectiveness of the Border Patrol in their enforcement efforts by enabling a more rapid and timely response to known intrusion over a wide area, as well as providing a source of intelligence on the extent of illegal penetration.

Finance

The Finance Branch is responsible for prescribing, publishing, and implementing Servicewide procedures concerning fiscal matters. This responsibility extends to collections, allotment, and expenditure control, as well as to the processing and approval of vouchers for payment. Accountability for Service resources is maintained in the records of the Finance Branch where reports concerning the status and utilization of the resources are prepared for internal and external management and information purposes.

During fiscal year 1976, 71,342 vouchers were examined, resulting in the approval of payment for all types of contractual obligations, taxes withheld, imprest fund replenishments, refunds, and claims totaling nearly \$212.6 million in expenditures. Collections of fees, fines, etc., exceeded \$14.7 million during the year, and collections from carriers of extra compensation for inspection duties performed by Service employees nights, Sundays, and holidays totalled over \$6 million.

General Services

The name of the Property Management and Office Services group was changed to the General Services Branch during fiscal year 1976, to reflect the dynamic changes in scope and direction from past years. During the year, the Service awarded several times the number of contracts awarded annually in the past, and departed drastically from formally advertised procurement to negotiated procurement. The nature of these new procurements involved complex negotiated solicitations for intrusion systems, automatic data processing equipment and services, research and development, and consultant services.

The continuing need for increased contractual support will remain at a high level in order to support present and future demands of Service endeavors to improve operations.

Management Analysis

In order to render the maximum amount of assistance to the operating divisions, the Management Analysis Branch has prime responsibility for administering the Service's Management Improvement Program, which is a continuous effort to control rising costs, increase efficiency, and improve public service. Numerous manpower, work simplification, and improved processing procedures were completed Servicewide during the period, resulting in general efficiency gains and substantial savings to the Government.

During fiscal year 1976 and the transition quarter, 11 "I", "N", and "G" forms were eliminated; 28 new forms were created; and 180 forms were revised. Fourteen forms for Central Office use were created and 10 eliminated. In addition, of the 50 suggestions submitted by I&NS employees under the Forms Improvement Program, half were adopted.

There were 26 new Servicewide recurring reports and 46 one-time reports approved during the period, with 10 recurring reports eliminated. Furthermore, 18 regular Administrative Manual Transmittal Memos were published, resulting in 24 Supplemental Distribution Transmittals.

INFORMATION SERVICES

The Information Services Division furnishes automated data processing systems support and service to I&NS operations, with responsibility extending to records maintenance, as well as the performance of statistical compilations and analyses.

Automated Data Processing Systems

The Automated Data Processing (ADP) Systems Branch has responsibility for the research, development, and operation of various automated systems in support of the records maintenance, statistical, and operational functions of the Service.

Among the many accomplishments of the Branch in fiscal year 1976 were the significant advances and improvements made with existing operational systems. A major project to convert the Service's Master Index System to a fully automated system was initiated. While only one-third complete, already significant benefits have been derived from system conversion, which will eliminate manual functions. For one, the purchase of existing Bunker Ramo terminal equipment rather than continuing the lease agreement will provide \$40,000 savings per year. Also initiated was a project to tie the Justice teletype terminals (JUST) in field offices into the Automated Master Index System.

In the nonimmigrant document control area, a contract was awarded to provide for keying the overflow backlog of Form I-94 Arrival-Departure Records, making it possible to keep the system up-to-date in order to provide accurate statistics and timely responses to inquiries. Also, system data was used to produce "overstay profile" information of use, upon refinement, to Investigations, Inspections, and visa issuing personnel.

In the Statistical Reporting System area, the Department of Transportation assumed responsibility for

coding, keying, and reporting passenger travel information from source documents provided by I&NS, resulting in a \$85,000 to \$100,000 savings in manpower and machine time that can be shifted to work which is more mission oriented. The nonimmigrant statistical coding form was converted from a punched card to a coding sheet form to save both coding and keying time as well as reducing forms, storage, and disposal costs.

The Service Lookout Book keying and file update processing system was brought in-house, providing a savings of almost \$7,500 per year; the advantages of more accurate and timely information; additional flexibility in special statistical reporting from this file; and increased interchange capabilities of machine language data with the Department of State. The computer capability of the Remotely Monitored Sensor Systems (RMSS) is being increased to automatically produce periodic reports in support of management and equipment utilization.

In addition to improvements in existing systems, the ADP Systems Branch also initiated the development of new systems and projects to provide improved information capabilities and increased savings in the future. Use of the Airport Inspections Simulation Model is being implemented; a system to report uncontrolled overtime utilization analysis was placed in operation as was a system for reporting and analyzing adjudications workload data; and support was provided to the Inspections Task Force. Cumulatively, these systems will supply improved management capability for Examinations resources.

Work was also initiated on development of a Financial Management Information System and a Position Accounting Control System, providing improved management support for all I&NS activities. Additionally, the Branch will continue extensive participation in the Program Information Requirements Study, the Data Communications Requirements Study, and other related efforts designed to provide the foundation for improved ADP support of I&NS activities in future years.

In summary, during fiscal year 1976, the ADP Systems Branch was directly involved with work resulting in tangible savings of at least \$150,000 per year, as well as other intangible and future year benefits.

Records Administration and Information

The Records Administration and Information Branch has a two-fold mission: (1) Under the Records program, it is responsible for maintaining records and related indices on immigrants, nonimmigrants, ex-

cluded aliens, and individuals wanted by other Government agencies. Material from these record systems is furnished to I&NS operating units and other Government law enforcement and security agencies. (2) Furthermore, under the Information Services program, it responds to personal, telephonic, and written inquiries regarding provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act, related laws, and regulations and procedures concerning the application of immigration and nationality laws. These inquiries are received from foreign Embassies, consular representatives, and the general public.

The Service is in the process of converting the Master Index from a manual to automated system, with completion scheduled during fiscal year 1978. In 1978, decentralized access by the Service's district offices is planned, with this decentralized, automated system furnishing rapid and accurate responses to record requests by field offices and other agencies.

Close to 4.8 million Alien Address Report Cards (Form I-53) were submitted and processed in fiscal year 1976, providing a centralized address index on aliens. Furthermore, over 10 million arrivals and departures were processed through the Automated Centralized Nonimmigrant Document Control System during the 15-month period ending September 30, 1976.

The efficient handling of records, which encompassed the disposal of 7,211 cubic feet and the retirement of 12,820 cubic feet, generated storage space equivalent to 2,671 five-drawer file cabinets.

More than 10 million inquiries, which came in by mail, by telephone, or by public appearances at information counters, were handled by Records Administration and Information offices throughout the Service during fiscal year 1976. This indicates a record high in the provision of services by these units.

Statistics

The Statistics Branch plans and administers the Service's statistical program, comprised of two major components—the Work Measurement Report System and alien data compilation.

The Work Measurement Report is the prime source of data encompassing the entire scope of Service activities. It is used by firstline supervisors and program managers as a management information tool for effective and efficient allocation of manpower and resources. The Report, depicting man-hours expended and work units completed, can be utilized in evaluating program effectiveness, estimation of operational costs, budget preparation, personnel action planning,

and overall measurement of productivity. Staff in the Office of Planning and Evaluation and Statistics Branch worked together in evaluating the utility of data presently collected for the Work Measurement Report and related reports. Data requirements will be determined for the development of revised report and reporting procedures which better address the management needs of the Service.

Statistical information relating to immigrants, non-immigrants, naturalizations, foreign passenger travel, alien address reports, deportations, and various other Service actions comprise the second major component of data collection services. Tables compiled from this data base are contained in this report, which is the principal publication of the Service.

Additionally, statistical information is prepared regularly for other branches of the Service, as well as for other Government agencies. Requests for data come in from many sources including Congress, foreign governments, publishers, private organizations, and the public in general.

PERSONNEL

Employee Development

The fiscal year 1976 Service Training Program, an activity of the Employee Development Branch, was marked by significant innovations and increased activity levels. To improve instruction quality, 80 new instructors were trained, and training coordinator positions were created for the major Service divisions. These coordinators, working with the Central Office and regional office training staff, plan and implement a variety of new supervisory, journeyman, and training courses, and update and facilitate existing training programs. For the first time, during fiscal year 1976, a Servicewide training budget was instituted, with \$1.6 million allocated for the program.

A new training accounting system was instituted on a Servicewide basis for the request, authorization, evaluation, and tracking of training activities. This system, meshed with the newly developed Departmentwide computer managed records system entitled the Justice Employee Training System (JETS), will vastly improve Service training program management capabilities.

An effort was initiated to determine the common training needs among the divisions of the Service, resulting in the implementation of the Immigration Officer Basic Training Course (IOBTC) for Investiga-

tors, Deportation Officers, and Immigration Inspectors. The concept of commonality training broadened the Service's outlook through contact with other Justice Department training offices as well as other Federal law enforcement agencies.

During the fiscal year, a total 3,738 completions were accomplished in Service conducted training programs, as compared to 1,711 last year. The 1976 tally includes 1,220 individual in-Service course completions in formal off-the-job classroom settings, primarily at the Service's Officer Development Center. The Service's Extension Training (home study) Program accounted for 2,518 of all off-the-job training completions. Also, 860 executives, managers, and specialists required training not available through Service resources. Of this group, 546 completed training at other Government or private sector training facilities.

Regional development and training activities improved, with the Eastern Region making noteworthy progress in in-house training capabilities. Supervisory training received priority attention, with program specialists conducting training in EEO, Labor Management Relations, classification, and Freedom of Information and Privacy Acts.

In the Eastern Region, each district and Border Patrol sector has one designated training coordinator to assist in course preparation and design, and to coordinate geographically oriented training needs with the Regional Training Officer. All training coordinators attended a basic Instructor's Training Course within 6 months of designation. They will also be serving as Upward Mobility counselors in locations which have been allocated formal positions in this area. This "double designation" will eliminate duplicate instruction in Training Administration and Laws, and in Career Counseling since these basic courses are needed by training coordinators and Upward Mobility counselors alike.

Uniform model 35 mm slide carousel audio-visual equipment has been purchased for each district, sector, and regional office in the Eastern Region to facilitate the exchange of slides and tapes. Training coordinators are receiving instruction in the use and programming of these machines.

Labor-Management, Employee Relations, and Safety

For the Labor-Management, Employee Relations, and Safety Branch, the highlight of the 15-month period occurred on the last day of the transition quarter with the signing of a new 2-year labor manage-

ment relations agreement. This agreement with the American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE), the National Border Patrol Council, and the National Council of I&NS Locals covers over 6,000 Service employees; establishes a new grievance procedure for bargaining employees; and redefines the relationship between parties for the next 2 years.

The first fulltime Health and Safety Manager was appointed by the Service, indicating the importance placed on this program. Coincidentally, the past year also marked the first time the Department of Labor (OSHA) has conducted an evaluation of the Service in conjunction with its annual evaluation of the overall Safety and Health Program of the Department of Justice.

With the inauguration of the Commissioner's Physical Fitness Program, the initial effort of Phase I implementation was directed toward the administration of physical exams to a limited group of employees. Over the next several years, the program will be greatly expanded to cover a large number of employees according to the availability of additional budgeted funds.

Position Management and Personnel Management Evaluation

As a function of the Position Management and Personnel Management Evaluation Branch, the Service participated with the CSC in an intensive study of Border Patrol Agent Occupation, which will continue into fiscal year 1977. The Study will ascertain the need for revision of the Border Patrol Agent classification standard and determine if an upgrading of the journeyman level to GS-11 is warranted. Representatives of the CSC and the Service have performed on-site, factfinding interviews and surveys in several sectors across the country to observe the Border Patrol in action, with the outcome expected to have widespread effect on the proper definition and description of this occupation.

Supervisory Border Patrol agents have already been upgraded, as an outgrowth of a landmark CSC decision on the reclassification of the firstline supervisory position to GS-11. The Service conducted a classification review of the supervisory positions and reclassified over 218 supervisory Border Patrol agents during fiscal year 1976. These reclassifications will have the bene-

ficial effect of creating a qualified cadre for the expected vacancies in 1978 due to mass retirements.

In addition to the Border Patrol Agent studies, the Service completed a review of the General Attorney (Nationality) positions and, which certification of the CSC, the General Attorneys (Nationality) were accorded upgraded journeyman levels to GS-14.

Concentrated Servicewide self-evaluation of human resource management was continued, with 8 Personnel Management Evaluation Surveys conducted under the leadership of the Central Office in fiscal year 1976. The surveys, providing a cross section of regions, districts, and Border Patrol sectors, were conducted in the Western Region at San Pedro, Calif.; the Southern Region at Dallas, Tex.; the Detroit, Honolulu, and San Francisco Districts; and the Swanton, El Paso, and Del Rio Border Patrol Sectors.

A more systematic approach to this Servicewide evaluation process was implemented with emphasis placed on in-depth employee interviews. All program areas of personnel management were probed in the interviews, with various strong and weak points surfacing. The information obtained provided managers with better insight and understanding of personnel management problems, and also aided the Branch in the shaping and refinement of Service personnel management programs.

A refined Personnel Management Evaluation System was also established at the regional level. The Northern Regional Office, with the assistance of the Chicago Regional Office of the CSC, initiated and formulated a prototype Personnel Management Evaluation System, which was implemented through surveys conducted at the Chicago and St. Paul District Offices and the Grand Forks Sector. This prototype is more systematic in concept than any previous efforts made at the regional level and can be used in all regional offices.

Steps have been taken to provide meaningful guidance and assistance in the resolution of problems and findings peculiar to each evaluation site through recommended and required actions at the Servicewide and regional levels. In addition, steps were taken to

refine a number of basic program areas demonstrated to be in need of improvement through the evaluations. The self-evaluations are proving to be a strong and beneficial tool in improving Service human resource management, providing improvement in the understanding gained and the problems corrected.

Staffing and EEO

A new merit staffing plan covering nonbargaining unit positions was developed, coordinated, and assembled by the Staffing and EEO Branch during fiscal year 1976. This included redesigning procedures associated with the existing Merit Promotion and Reassignment Plan, as well as the development of an entirely new appraisal document and the incorporation of overseas rotation, compassionate transfer, and hardship rotation policies of the Service. Implementation of this program is planned for fiscal year 1977.

A centralized training session on the Service Upward Mobility Program was conducted, with representatives from all regional offices as well as numerous district offices participating. This session was held in preparing participants for implementation of the formal Upward Mobility Program in fiscal year 1977.

Members of the Branch represented the Service at numerous conferences and conventions sponsored by various community and national action groups, such as the Urban League, Federally Employed Women, IMAGE, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, etc. A 2-day conference for I&NS Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) specialists was also held.

The EEO staff was involved in working on the Department of Justice EXPO '76, with several special sessions attended by the Commissioner, the Regional Commissioners, and the executive staff.

Two of the regional offices have established functioning EEO Advisory Committees and the remaining two regional offices are in the process of committee development. EEO complaint processing has been included in all supervisory training courses since March of 1976.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service had its beginnings on March 3, 1891, when Congress provided that there should be in the Treasury Department, under the control and supervision of the Secretary of the Treasury, a Superintendent of Immigration. In 1903, the Bureau of Immigration was established, and Immigration functions were transferred to the newly established Department of Commerce and Labor; in 1906, the Bureau of Immigration became the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization; in 1913, the consolidated Bureau was transferred to the new Department of Labor and divided into two bureaus known as the Bureau of Immigration and the Bureau of Naturalization; and in 1933, the Bureaus were consolidated as the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the Department of Labor.

On June 14, 1940, the Immigration and Naturalization Service was transferred from the Department of Labor to the Department of Justice after Congressional approval of a plan submitted by the President under a general reorganization act which had been passed in 1939. Under terms of the plan, the office of Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization and all powers and functions previously exercised by the Secretary of Labor relating to immigration and nationality were transferred to the jurisdiction of the Attorney General. Since June 14, 1940, the Service has functioned as a part of the Department of Justice under the direction of the Attorney General of the United States.
